THE BOARD OF TRADE.

Census and Other Matters to be Considered at a Special Meeting To-Night.

The board of trade met in adjourned session last evening, but a small attendance caused an adjournment until next Monday evening.

In the matter of our census, it will be remembered the board requested Senator Mitchell a week ago to procure a copy of the enumeration, and in answer to this request, President Wright this morning received the following dispatch from the senator:

"The mayor must make application for a copy of the names of the persons enumerated, according to section 23, of the census act of March 1, 1889. If the mayor, on behalf of the municipality, will wire me a request, I can obtain a copy of the names."

Pursuant to the above, Mayor Williams sent the following dispatch to-day to Senator Mitchell, over his official signature:

"Send us names enumerated of all four Salem precincts. Pending the procuring of the copy above contemplated let every person procure the names of those known to be or supposed to be missed in the enumeration and hand them in either to the board of trade rooms or to the JOURNAL office, that a comparison may be made and definite information reached for the guidance of the department."

If you have any doubt about yourself or your neighbor being counted, it is an easy matter to write out the names and hand them in. This business has been talked about a good deal now let us have action. If you think your neighbor does not read the paper, speak to him or her about this and ascertain who has been omitted. JONES.—At her home in Stayton, Sunday, August 10, 1890, Polly L., wife of J. M. Jones, aged 97 years.

Mrs. Jones was among Oregon's early pioneers, having come across the plains by ox-team conveyance in 1833. The family settled in Lane county and lived there until 1861, when they moved to this county and have since resided at Stayton. She was stricken with paralysis a few years ago and has been entirely helpless since that time. Her husband, who is about 70 years old, survives her, also one daughter at Stayton, two at Palouse, Wash., one at Portland; one son, Newton, who has been living in Salem some months and another, Rev. T. L. Jones, at Grant's Pass. Next received word of the death yesterday and went up to attend the funeral, which occurs to-day, she being buried in the Stayton cemetery. She was an excellent woman, kind, charitable and of consistent christian character.
