WASHINGTON NEWS.

EXTENDING APPROPRIATIONS.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 12.—The
committee on appropriations re-
ported a joint resolution extending
until August 29th appropriation for
support of the government not pro-
vided for in general appropriation
bills already passed. The joint res-
olution passed.

ANTI LOTTERY.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 12.—The
House anti-lottery bill was
favorably reported to the senate and
will certainly pass.

PERSECUTIONS OF A RENOWNED
MILLIONAIRE CONTINUE.
NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—Edmund
Yates in his cable to the Tribune to-
day says the cowardly persecutions
of Mrs. Mackay continue. The de-
tectives and experts employed by
her solicitor have so far been un-
successful in their efforts to trace the
offenders, but a clue has at last been
obtained. If the suspicions are con-
firmed a criminal libel case of extra-
ordinary interest may be expected.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 12.—
Nicholas Luning, a well known
capitalist, died last night of heart
disease. He has been a conspicu-
ous figure in San Francisco business
circles since 1849. His wealth is es-
timated at between fifteen and
twenty millions.

THE ERIC GETS INTO CHICAGO.
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 12.—The
Chicago and Atlantic railroad was
sold today under foreclosure
sale for \$5,000,000 to a representa-
tive of the Erie road, which thus se-
cures entrance into Chicago.

MONMOUTH, Ill., Aug. 12.—Salva-
tor defeated Tenny in a race for the
champion stakes to-day. Time,

THE NEW YORK & HUDSON RIVER
RY. STRIKE ABOUT ENDED.
NEW YORK, N. Y., Aug. 12.—At
the Grand Central depot this morn-
ing there no longer existed even
the substance of a strike. Passenger
trains are coming and going to all
appearance with their usual regu-
larity.

AT AN END.
NEW YORK, N. Y., Aug. 12.—The
strike on the New York Central is
practically at an end. The leaders
in the strike are still defiant and talk
mysteriously about some important
move to be made which will allow
them to retire from the fight with
flying colors upon a basis of a com-
promise with the railroad officials.

MISSIONARIES DEAD.
AUGUSTA, Maine, Aug. 12.—The
sad news has just been received of
the death of Warren J. Harris and
Frank Gates, missionaries at Sierra
Leone, Africa. Harris is a son of
General B. F. Harris of Augusta.
Both were young men and stood
very high in their work.

THE PRESIDENT AND NOTABLES AT
THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT.
BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 12.—The day
opened perfectly for the Grand Ar-
my demonstration. It is estimated
that there are one hundred thou-
sand and strangers in the city. Shortly
after eight o'clock this morning Sec-
retary Tracy, Vice-president Morton
and General Sherman arrived. A
little before nine o'clock Pres. Har-
rison arrived, and with the govern-
or and state delegation and party
took carriages and rode over a por-
tion of the route of parade to view
the decorations. After this inspec-
tion drive the president took his
place on the grand reviewing stand.

At 11:30 a. m., the line was for-
med, the departments being ranged in
the order of seniority. Illinois led
by Commander-in-chief Alger,
with a full staff of six hundred men,
mounted by the 11th Mass Cavalry,
headed by a corps of mounted police,
rode to the head of the Illinois de-
partment. The band struck up
"God Bless Soldiers," and at the
command of the leader the greatest
military street march witnessed in
Boston began the march. At one
o'clock only six departments, those
of Illinois, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania,
Ohio, New York and Connecticut,
had passed out of Commonwealth
Avenue. General Alger reached the
reviewing stand at Adams square
at 1:45 p. m. It is expected that it
will require five hours for the pro-
cession to pass a given point.

PARAGRAPHS.

James Powers, a boiler maker who
came to Seattle recently from Van-
couver, B. C., died in a miserable
lodging house yesterday morning of
alcoholism.

The English government has in-
formed Cardinal Rampolla, papal
secretary of state at Rome, that it is
impossible for England to receive the
papal envoy or to send a minister to
the Vatican.

A volcanic eruption is now taking
place in Shelby county, Indiana,
caused by natural gas explosions.
Ten acres of land are torn up in the
vicinity of Waldron. The river bed
is rent with great fissures, and water
is pouring down into the earth, leav-
ing the bed dry. Geysers in various
places are throwing mud, grass and
water to a height of fifteen feet, and
the whole surface of the river is a
flame. Great noises are heard from
the earth, and the road which runs
alongside the river is sunken ten feet.
Great excitement prevails through-
out the country.

John Baxter, of Orville, Cal., ac-
cidentally shot himself while hunt-
ing last Saturday.

Four companies of troops from
Little Rock and Fort Reno are en-
route to the Chickasaw nation, to be
distributed at the polling places on
election day, next Wednesday.

The fight which has been contem-
plated between the Canadian Pacific
and Pacific Mail and Oriental Oc-
cidental steamship lines has been
declared off. Manager Rice of the
Pacific Mail Co. left San Francisco
to-day for Portland to meet a repre-
sentative of the Canadian line to ar-
range terms of peace.

About 5 o'clock yesterday evening
Dolph Gibson shot and instantly
killed Albert Neyland, the result of
family feud, Neyland having killed
Gibson's brother some time ago.
