OREGON CLIPS.

J. W. Bishop, 10 miles east of Lebanon, has found promising coal croppings on his land and experts say a good vein can be struck at a depth of 50 feet. He offers a half interest in the property to anyone who will develop the mine.

It is said that the Santiam Paint company, composed of Salem capitalists, is about to establish a paint factory at Lebanon for the manufacture of 350 barrels of paint per day.

Morris Mosher, aged 15 years, was drowned in the Abiqua river not far from Silverton last Wednesday while in swimming. His 13-year-old brother had a narrow escape while trying to save him.

It is gleaned from the Gervais Star that two Gypsies were arrested for peddling without license and were made to comply with the law. That harvest is well under way and the farmers are well pleased with the yield of grain, as it is far above the average they expected. That a new bank is expected to open there soon. That the people are going to club together and buy an organ for their town hall. That a spark from an S. P. engine set a big stubble fire south of town a few days ago and caused a good deal of work to put it out.

The Independence West Side says: J. Dornisier threshed 70 acres of wheat for F. L. Linch which yielded 2740 bushels. Part of the land has been in cultivation for over forty years.

David Spencer, aged 40 years, was instantly killed a few days ago at home near Ashland, by the black and tackle of a hay fork falling on him with terrific force, while unloading hay at his barn.

From the Woodburn Independent it is gathered that several immigrants are there looking for homes. That there is talk of a brickyard. That a boy named Pleurd had his arm broken by jumping from a wagon while his team was running away and his little brother narrowly escaped being killed. That James Holcomb, who went to Colorado two years ago is back, accompanied by his father, brother and a friend, all going to remain and get homes.

That Mrs. Eliza Thomas, of Butte Creek, was thrown out of a cart and bruised about the face and arms. That Wm. Broyles lost a \$50 horse by lung fever. That Jacob Ogle took charge of the postoffice last week. That the walls of the new bank building are up 30 feet and only the finishing work now remains undone.

The Valley Record tells of a smooth fraud who bilked many of the housewives of Ashland by selling them a patent arrangement represented as an absolute preventive of coal oil lamp explosions, and an agency in making the oil last several times longer than ordinarily. An investigation proved the "invention" to be only a capsule filled with common sand.

A bold attempt at chloroforming Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Wallace, of McMinnville, was made a few nights ago. Mr. W. awoke before the drug had taken a good hold and thus saved a probable robbery. The chloroform is supposed to have been introduced by means of a sprayer through the mosquito bar of the window.

The McMinnville Reporter says: Mr. J. J. Henderson, who is the largest wheat grower in Yamhill county, his acreage being between five and six hundred, has completed threshing the crop. The result is an average yield of 38 bushels an acre, machine measure.

How Do Women Kill Time? The poor, innocent man who asked this foolish question was answered by a woman writing to The Washington Star in this definite and withal rather overwhelming manner. Let it be understood that, with a family consisting of herself and husband and two children, she lived in a house of nine rooms, keeping two servants. Besides the above I nursed two children through measles, twice cleaned every nook and corner of my house, put up seventy-five jars of pickles and preserves, made seven trips to the dentist's dyed Easter eggs, polished silver, and spent seven days in helping nurse a friend who was ill, besides the thousand and one duties too small to be mentioned, yet taking time to perform. SCHOOL FUND APPORTIONMENT.

The Amount Each District Will Receive of School Fund Interest in Marion County.

The total number of children returned is 7,948 and the allotment from the state is \$1,524.00, making \$1.45 each.
