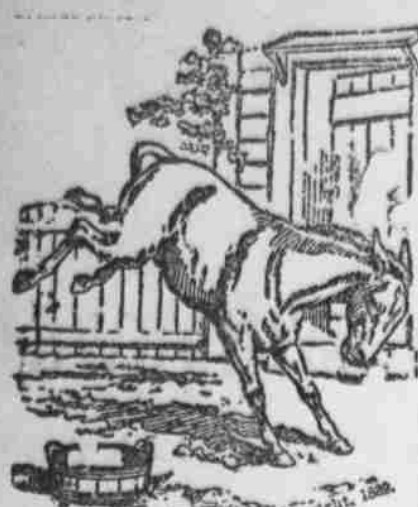




LATEST TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

A WILD LEAP.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28.—Stephen Brock, of St. Clair county, Ill., jumped from a rapidly moving New York train, yesterday afternoon, and was at once followed by his little daughter Lelia. The father was instantly killed, but the daughter lived a few hours. No cause can be assigned for the deed. They were bound for Germany. On the father's person were found checks for 12,000 marks.

OLD PARTY REVIVING.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 28.—The national greenback convention convened here last night. About 50 people were assembled, and outside of Indiana, New York sent the largest delegation, sixteen in number.

ODD FELLOWS' TEMPLE.

SEATTLE, Aug. 28.—The cornerstone was laid yesterday of the grand temple of Odd Fellows, to be the home of Seattle Lodge, No. 7, the largest and wealthiest lodge in the state. The ceremonies were conducted by Judge J. F. Miller, noble grand of the lodge, who gave an address of welcome.

LAND OF MID-NIGHT SUN.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—From information received by the schooner Arago, which arrived from the north, it is learned that the revenue cutter Rush was at St. Paul's island, August 15th. She is not making any seizures, but is simply ordering sealers out of Behring sea, under threat of seizure. In every such case the sealers have left Behring sea. The Corwin had not arrived at Unalaska when the Arago left.

FARMERS' CONGRESS.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., Aug. 28.—At the second day's session of the national Farmers' congress yesterday, Hon. W. F. Mark, of Indiana, delivered an address condemning the protective tariff policy as hostile to the best interests of the country.

NEW STEEL CRUISER.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Aug. 28.—The official trial of the new cruiser Santa Barbara occurred in Santa Barbara harbor and resulted in a successful trip of over four consecutive hours, during which time the cruiser made an average speed of 19 and 51-100 knots per hour and won the premium of \$100,000 for her builders.

The trial board has forwarded a dispatch to Washington stating that the average speed of the San Francisco was 19 7-10 knots.

WHO GOT THE RATONS?

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—The Indian bureau has just received the report of A. T. Lea, who has been engaged in taking the census of the Sioux tribe of Indians. When he completed the census of the Indians on the reservations in South Dakota, he found that there were 5160 men, women and children located there.

As the Indian office for the last several years has been distributing rations for a population of 7500, naturally the inquiry arose as to what has become of the other 2334 Indians and their rations. This query was put to Indian Agent Wright, who reported each quarter the number who drew rations, and in reply he asked to be allowed to take the enumeration himself. At this enumeration only 125 more Indians were found than in Lea's count. He thereupon accounted for the discrepancy by stating that an epidemic among the Indians last year had taken off a large number. The Indians, however, report only nine deaths during the year. An investigation will be made which will probably involve Agent Wright in some trouble to account for the discrepancy.

ORDERED TO HONOLULU.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Orders were yesterday issued for the flagship Charleston which has just arrived at Seattle, from Honolulu, to return immediately to that port, to assist in protecting American interests in the Hawaiian Islands. This action is based upon Acting Rear Admiral Brown's report of the serious aspect of affairs in Hawaii at the time of his departure from this country.

IS IT A HAMBURG?

Cult-shin shoes are advertised by a shoe manufacturing firm in the east. This is certainly a novelty in footwear. The leather is said to be made from the hides of young horses and colts and is a comparatively new product. It was first finished in Hamburg, Germany, about fifty years ago, but like all new products it met with opposition. The peculiarity of the colt skin is that part known as the "shell," a formation found only in the family of horses. This shell is a muscle, in a flat sheet, spread over the colt's rump, between the hips and tail, extending down to the legs, making a piece of oval form, about two feet long and one and one-half feet wide in the widest part. This muscle grows firmly to the grain below; it is a flamed like tissue, in combination with it. The hide has four layers of muscular skin, which, with the shell gives the horses the tremendous pulling power that makes the animal so serviceable to mankind.

This shell if properly tanned and shaved clean of its sinewy matter, a most difficult task, makes the best wearing leather in existence and proves the theory of the old time shoemakers, "that only leather of a long fibre will wear," to be a mistaken one, as the shell has no fibre. In this it has a decided advantage

over calf skin with its fibres; the breaking of any one throws additional strain upon others and a break in the leather soon follows.

Experiments have demonstrated that the shell will wear two or three times longer than calf skin. It possesses another great advantage, being the nearest waterproof of any leather made. The fineness of texture permits it taking a richer polish than calf and it is therefore better adapted to the dress shoe, while its great strength and wearing qualities eminently fit it for bankers, business, professional, railroad men, etc. Another great advantage, it keeps its shape almost as long as it will hold together.

All these claims are made for colt skin shoes. The question now remains, where at present prices of colts and young horses, do all the colt skins come from.
