BOTH LEGS BROKEN.—A short time after the JOURNAL went to press Saturday afternoon "Uncle" Jimmy Reardon, a well-known old resident, became the victim of an accident whose only pleasing feature is that it did not terminate fatally. He was helping to unload a car of lumber for Henry Schomaker, near the Salem flour mill, and was standing on the car, when the lumber commenced sliding. Instead of stepping to the end of the car, he threw himself forward on the pile, grabbing it with his hands. This brought the whole pile over on him, catching his feet and carrying him backwards and downwards until his shoulders struck the boxing of the car axles, the lumber tumbling down over him and pinning him in that awful position. The man working with him thought he was killed and was so frightened he did not dare proceed to relieve him from his dreadful imprisonment, but called help from the freight depot, who soon extricated him, only to find him unconscious. In half an hour he revived, but his lower limbs were so badly bruised he could not use them. He was conveyed to the residence of Mrs. Rachel Wait on Front street and a doctor summoned, who found that in each leg the small bone, or fibula, was broken, above the ankle. Of course he was badly hurt all over, but these were the only breakages and in a young man would not be serious, but Mr. Reardon is along toward 70 years old and cannot stand many such accidents. He is resting easy today and doing well, maintaining that cheerfulness for which he is noted. He will have the best wishes of all for speedy recovery. As soon as he is a little better he will be moved to the residence of his nephew, John M. Chase, south of the covered bridge.

FROM MINNESOTA.—John Gibson and his nephew, Jas. McDonald, from Steele county, Minnesota, have been busy engaged to-day unloading the cars of horses, wagons and other household effects with which they have just arrived from the Gopher state. Among the property brought are nine head of finely bred horses, with which they intend to swell the exhibit at the state fair next week. They were met at the depot by their old neighbor, John Colgan, who came out last spring, and when asked by a reporter if he had gone back, replied: "Not much; after I once got a good look around here, you couldn't get me back there again." They are energetic people and their energy will receive ready reward in these parts.

NOB HILLS VS. SALEM.

Bats are Crossed Between Them to the Defeat of the Nobs in a Tedious Game.

One of the largest crowds of the season was at the Highland grounds yesterday afternoon to witness the game between the Nob Hills, of Portland and the home team. The visiting club is called the next best in Portland to the league club, consequently there was much interest and speculation in the result. The club is composed of gentlemen, mostly well-behaved young men, most of them of excellent Portland families, and they are good ball players, though the outcome would indicate that they are not meant for the Salem boys.

The latter did superb work yesterday, with the exception of Morgan, who was out of luck, and out of place on second. Leveque in the box was unostentatiously praised, while McCarthy was if possible better than ever. Cooney in left field, was an especially strong player, making several difficult turning catches. Jay Smith made two of the best bats ever made on the ground, one a straight three-bagger before the ball was fairly chasing him; the other sending in two men, and himself making a home run. Shortly Howard was not quite up to the standard of "old reliable," but got there in good shape. Crosby made a fine first and Sammy Booth maintained his reputation at third. Williams, a stranger, did fairly well.

Bellinger, of the Nobs, is a strong pitcher and is well caught by Fabel but the latter cannot throw, which is a great drawback. "Oakley," of second, was the fun of the game. The contest was interesting up to the close of the third inning, the score standing 3 to 2 in favor of the Nobs, but after that it was a draw until the last half of the seventh. At that time the Nobs were 12 to 3 out during that inning the boys got wild and the Nobs ran in five tallies, but that was all they got, while the home team made four more, closing the ninth inning 16 to 8. THE RECOUNT.

Supervisor W. F. Boothby, of the census recount, stated to a JOURNAL reporter who called on him at the board of trade rooms, that nothing definite could yet be given, but he would telegraph to Special Agent Leland, at Portland to-morrow morning, asking for permission to give the facts to the press. The JOURNAL will ascertain the facts at the earliest moment possible. Were it not for what seems to many a clumsy law in regard to announcing the results, the essential facts could be given to the public to-night. There are two or three enumerators in the field this afternoon and probably the last one will not be in before eight or nine o'clock to-night, though the bulk of the population were given in to the supervisor before noon today. Mr. Boothby asked the reporter to announce that they had made every effort to find every person in the city, and many have been missed by the enumerators they would confer a favor both to the city and to the enumerators by reporting at the board of trade rooms in the new clock tower as "New Central" over W. H. Conrad's clothing store on Commercial street.

MORE HOSE.—Several of the firemen have been heard to complain since the big fire Saturday night that the two engines need more hose. The recent fire was a block and a half from a cistern and after a hose was attached to the nearest hydrant there was not enough left to supply both engines until No. 3's came from north Salem, while at that time every minute meant dollars' worth of property destroyed. Another source of complaint is that the connections between the cisterns and mains are too small. After the engines had pumped about an hour from the cistern at the intersection of State and Commercial streets, it was necessary for one to pull up and move to the cistern at the intersection of Court and Commercial streets. It might be well for the proper authorities to see that the pipe used to connect the new cistern now being built with the mains be of sufficient size to avoid all such complaints.

FROM LANE COUNTY.—Mr. M. Wilkins, of Lane county, came up on the delayed overland train this morning and stopped over to see about space for the exhibit from his county. Mr. Wilkins says the attendance and exhibits of all kinds will be good from Lane county. He starts to-morrow for Chicago to attend the meeting of the committee on arrangements for the world's fair. Mr. Wilkins is well acquainted with the interests of Oregon and will look out her advantage there.

Gov. Penneyer has had a request from him for a specimen, and in reply a piece of Oregon menziantha has been sent him, by Mr. Scott, of the Churchill Manufacturing Co., which will without doubt prove as fine as anything grown in Uncle Sam's broad domain.

THE STATE FAIR.

A Kick Entirely Peculiar to the Source—Politics Has Never Entered the Management.

The following editorial is found in the Portland World, and is copied for the purpose of showing its falsity and absurdity:
"Brother Flagg, of the Forest Grove democrat, hits that institution known as the Oregon State Fair a well deserved lick. He says that it is a republican institution, gives its patronage to republicans, advertises almost exclusively with republican papers, and as such should be patronized by republicans only. That no democrat should attend it any more than he would a republican caucus. Let every democrat stay at home. Democratic publishers pass this along the line."

The state fair is controlled by the Oregon State Board of Agriculture, composed of a dozen directors, and the personal knowledge of the writer enables him to pick out five prominent democrats from the list, viz: T. G. Richmond, of Polk; Wm. Gallogway, of Yamhill; R. E. Rybe, of Multnomah; T. L. Davidson, of Marion; and J. B. Keeney, of Umatilla, a pretty strong working minority if such thing was required, but it has not been, as the writer is reliably informed by an old member of the board that the question of politics has never entered into its deliberations nor into its appointments; nor has that question ever been brought to its attention in an official way except by the present governor of Oregon who during last year's meeting is said to have made the remark that he would begin to appoint democrats on that board—that it was time.

The assertion that "its patronage is given to republicans" has no foundation in fact. The politics of one patronized or employed is neither asked nor cared for, and one fact that will show this to be true as far as democrats are concerned, is that the two principal assistant marshals of the grounds each year have been democrats—Wayne Williams, of Independence, and Oliver Arel, of French prairie. The list might be prolonged including lady clerks, gate keepers, painters, carpenters and others employed around the grounds, and the directors residing here assure the JOURNAL the only question ever asked is as to fitness and competency.

As to advertising: While the exact data is not at hand in this office, the writer knows that last year the democratic papers throughout the state of any recognized circulation, received their share; such as the Benton Leader, Albany Democrat, Jacksonville times, Eugene Guard, the Coos Bay paper, the East Oregonian, the Prineville paper and probably others, the expressed intention of the secretary at that time being to put the limited means in his hands where it would be most influential in bringing out a successful, prosperous fair.

The above plaintive wail is unworthy such a man as Mr. Noltem, and its only effect could be to injure an institution in which the people of the whole state are interested and the success of which is one of the best advertisements Oregon can receive in the East, where such fairs are the jealous pride of the people.

The word will be given and all can get aboard as fast as possible, the first getting a seat, in the opinion of a competent judge, to secure the prize.
