AN INVITING PLACE.—Amos Strong has now one of the cleanest, most inviting and comfortable restaurants and dining parlors on the coast. From the moment you enter the door an air of cheerfulness and pleasing effect surrounds you. The front room combines office and salesroom. It has a cement floor nicely laid off in squares and can be always kept clean. The heavy shelving cornices and other work are not yet gilded and varnished as they will be, but enough is done to show the final effect. The next is a commodious dining hall, ceiling fifteen feet high, decorations and papering the most artistic, and no person can sit down there without soon having a good appetite. Back of this are rows of private boxes, four on either side of a hallway, on one side arranged with sliding doors so that the four can be thrown into one, allowing for a continuous table and accommodating a good sized party. Back of these are the toilet rooms, then the kitchen, where two of the finest ranges made are set up, supplemented by an immense steamer. Over the cooking apparatus is an immense steam catcher carrying it to a ventilator, thus saving the other rooms from its disagreeable presence. Then is the bakery fitted up completely for that business, then a large store room and then an ice room. All the main rooms are lighted by skylights, and by electricity at night. It has a seating capacity of one hundred. There could not be anything neater or pleasanter throughout and the determination is to run the house in accordance with appearances.

GRAND OPENING.—Mr. A. I. Wagner, lessee of The Willamette, having gone through the tedious and expensive labor of thoroughly refitting and refurnishing the house in a manner befitting a first class hotel equal to any on the North Pacific coast, has appointed to-morrow evening for an opening dinner and reception, cards of which have been sent to all the representative business men of the city, inviting themselves and ladies, and one of the most thoroughly enjoyable affairs of the year is expected. The opening has been delayed a few days by reason of a mistake in the shipment of silverware, whereby a breakfast service was sent instead of a dinner service, and the mistake had to be corrected. The arrangements for the opening are, dinner from 5:30 to 8:30 and reception, 9:30 to 12. The reception will include a ball and a general social time. Tickets are placed at the nominal sum of \$3.00 per couple. Elaborate preparations are in progress and the dinner menu will be of the choicest order. The JOURNAL begs to acknowledge the receipt of complimentary courtesies. This will be an excellent opportunity for the people of Salem to acknowledge an appreciation of the efforts of Mr. Bush to give us a first class hotel in every respect, and also to give to Mr. Wagner that encouragement and assurance of friendly feeling that go so far to make it pleasant for new men casting their lot among us.

BAD SEWERAGE.—The alley sewer running from the north through Marion square to connect with the Marion street main sewer is likely to prove troublesome. It runs through two blocks, one of which is Marion square and only one family north of that has made connection with it. It is very evident one family cannot keep a sewer running and the consequence is, this one is stopped up, with very disagreeable and sickening results. What to do is the question. Some say that the committee on health and police should examine into the matter, declare the present condition of things a public nuisance and force those whose property abuts the sewer to connect with it. Others think for the present the sewer will have to be extended to the Capital Mills ditch and let in water from that to flush it out—the distance from the end of the sewer at present to the ditch being very short. Really, something should be done. Those who connect with the city sewers are contemplated by the city in providing the improvement are entitled to protection, and such unwholesome accumulations as exist in this case should be guarded against.

EXPLOSION IN SEPARATOR.—Last Monday evening while threshing on Mort Savage's place on Howell prairie an explosion occurred in G. W. Woodworth's separator. The straw took fire but serious results were prevented by the prompt action of the engineer, who threw a belt and ran the engine up to the separator, using the engine hose to put out the fire. The straw had considerable fern mixed with it and the probability is that the explosion was caused by the spontaneous combustion of fern dust, just as explosions occur in flour mills from the accumulated flour dust.

BASEBALL OUTLOOK.—The Salem baseball club is not disbanded and there may be several good games played here yet this season. All there is of it, the management have released McCarthy and Cooney and will proceed to fill their places as soon as possible, finish the season and lay by for the early spring. Manager Jay C. STAYTON ITEMS.

This thriving town is situated on the north side of the North Santiam in the county of Marion, and is about one and half miles north of King's station, on the O. P. railroad. This town was originally laid out by Rev. D. S. Stayton, some 25 or 30 years since, and has been kept up in more or less prosperous condition up to the present time. Mr. Stayton built a large saw mill and also a carding machine, which formed the nucleus around which the town was built. Stores, and then a grist mill and furniture and chair factory were erected. Blacksmith shops, meat markets, livery stables and hotels, all arose as they were demanded, until the town became noted all over this country for its business thrift, and now is one of the most prosperous places in the county of Marion. Its location is grand and beautiful, being situated on a beautiful plot of ground sloping towards the south with a mild, clear and sparkling stream of water running through the middle of the city, from east to west, which is known as the Santiam and Salem water ditch, which supplies water to run almost all the mills and manufacturing establishments in the city of Salem. And as to health there is no place in Marion county that can excel it.

There are many fine residences in this place, and to show what they have done in the last six years I will state that they have built two large churches that would be a credit to a larger city; and this summer they have built a large school house at a cost of \$20,000, which is now almost ready to be occupied. In conversation with Prof. W. B. Adams, I learned that the school directors were going to furnish the school with the latest and most improved seats and appliances that can be obtained at a reasonable cost. Prof. Adams is now busy grading his school and will soon be prepared for efficient work. There will be near two hundred scholars attend this school during the next winter; because this school building they have built a large town hall at a cost of \$20,000, which is to be used for all public gatherings, and I believe the upper chamber is to be used by the Masons and Odd Fellows, for their meetings. So the public can see at once that there is an amount of public spirit manifested by the citizens of Stayton, when they can build two such large buildings in one summer as they have the present season. With many kind wishes to the citizens of Stayton I close this imperfect sketch.
