But they did not parley nor heed the threat, but shot out under the tent and ran for life to neighbors, not far off. They had recognized the ruffian and told the camp what had happened. The men gathered and a dangerous disposition existed for a short time, but they finally sought him out and gave him very short notice to leave that part of the country and keep a safe distance away. The only mistake they made was in not donating him an overcoat that would make him look like a shanghai rooster.

AT THE OPERA.—Ward's Comedy and Specialty company gave a fine play last night at Reed's opera house, though they were not greeted by as large a house as the character of the play demanded. THE STATE RECOUNT.—Many of the towns of the state are loud in their efforts for a recount of the whole state. Salem now having had justice done her, would like to see the whole state receive a similar treatment, though it is the opinion of some that she should not step in, demanding the state to be recounted, unless it is the prevailing opinion of the entire state, that a new count is advisable, which seems to be the broad view, according to the country papers.

A SMALL WRECK.—There was quite an excitement at Woodburn yesterday afternoon, caused by a collision between a freight train on the Southern Pacific and a mixed train on the narrow gauge. The freight was backing up and ran into the mixed train which was standing across their track. A car loaded with wheat was knocked off the narrow gauge track and completely demolished. Otherwise the damage will not be very heavy. It is not learned which road is to be blamed for the accident.

OREGON STATE FAIR.

The Second Day's Proceedings Start off Well.

THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE EXHIBIT.

Fair Notes—Full Details of the Races—The Grand Pavilion.

A GRAND PAVILION.

As the sun went down last evening there were yet a few finishing touches necessary to place everything in the pavilion in its proper place, but this was all completed during the night, and this morning a dazzling scene presented itself.

Stepping thro' the main entrance the eye is at once riveted by the array of really beautiful art work, which is this year the wonder and admiration of every visitor who has a vision at all for the beauties of nature as reproduced by the skill and genius of the artist. Many scenes, symbolical and realistic, have been selected for the work of the brush, the execution of which on canvas shows the thorough sympathy and spirit working through the hand and eye. There are several pastoral scenes, where the grazing cattle, the cranes, the trees, the rippling stream, lend slight effort for the imagination. Landscapes of various description are wrought with remarkable precision and beauty of color blending.

The amateur connoisseur of the JOURNAL feels a little diffidence in attempting to describe the grand array before him and longs for the same power of pen as is possessed by several of the artists with the brush so as to do the subject justice.

Mr. Elsie, of Portland, has two large paintings, valued at \$600 each, one the Yukon glaciers, and "the last of the tribe," a lone tepee surrounded by a few sickly looking Indians. They are finely executed.

Miss Mary K. Allen, of this city, has some beautiful works, "Katie on the Rhine," the prayer of Hagar, the separation, an autumn scene, and a mirror surrounded by a wreath of roses above to the left. This last attracts much attention, as indeed all her work does.

Mrs. Wm. England has several fine pieces on exhibition, the best of which is perhaps the bunch of snowballs, which seem to be growing in all their purity; also a bunch of roses and a statue, but indeed, as one bystander remarked, "Mrs. England never does any such work poorly," and her whole collection is meritorious.

Prof. Clyde Cooke has a large landscape with figure, also a Bavarian winter landscape which are of a very high order.

Miss Craig, of the University, has some grand portrait work, in which she excels. Remarkable among her collection is a portrait of Mrs. England, which is most lifelike. The drapery is executed in peculiarly excellent style. Her conception of the month of May is also grand, as is the face of a dead girl; in fact the numerous portraits from her hand are the objects of genuine admiration and praise.

Miss Anna McNary has a beautiful list on exhibition, the most attractive being a painted screen, which is finished in the highest style suggestive to art or genius; she has also a beautiful mountain landscape, the coloring of which is very appropriate and pleasing. Her several other entries are equally meritorious.

Mrs. Chapman has a very creditable collection, noticeable among which are two panels—landscapes—and a nest of oranges painted from nature.

Mrs. Willis E. McElroy has several beautiful pictures, one marine being exquisite in design and execution.

Mrs. Dr. J. N. Smith exhibits a grand marine scene, also some carnations and some peaches. These separate works are only a part of her prize-worthy collection.

Miss Kim shows two study heads of Bavarian peasants that are exceedingly fine.

Mrs. Claude Gatch has a most engaging group of pictures and fancy work. Among the finest is a long panel showing a girl picking daisies, which has real artistic merit, as does all her work.

Miss Ella Dearborn exhibits a beautiful water color.

Mrs. Dr. Richardson has a marine scene—the Rocks of Nantucket—which is very fine.

Warren Gilbert, a small boy, son of Postmaster Gilbert, shows some very creditable work from his brush, which gives promise of a talent that can be ripened into a certainty of fame.

Miss Stella Cannon and Miss Holverson have some beautiful work, including painting on china-ware, which cannot be surpassed.

There are two very pretty ornamental designs, the work of Henri Jaquet, of France.

Many of the exhibitors in this interesting department have been misled in this rough sketch, the excuse is a terrible rash and not intention, and the reporter will be glad to include hereafter those who have been omitted.

This will prove one of the features of the fair much admired and of great value, as it will show the people of the state that their Agricultural College is doing something practical.
