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ASSESSMENT FOOTINGS MADE.

The Result Highly Satisfactory—Increase of \$1,337,521 over last Year's Net Valuation.

County Assessor Blackberry and his clerk have completed the footings of the tax rolls of Marion county and they will be at once turned over to the county clerk, who will carry out the taxes after the levies are made by the county court, which meets for that purpose next Saturday.

The work of assessment this year has been an important one and never in the history of the county has the assessor been forced to meet such determined effort for reduced valuations, increased exemptions, indebtedness, etc. There were at least ten men before the board of equalization this year endeavoring to avoid assessment to one that ever appeared at any time before.

In the face of all this Mr. Blackberry went ahead, determined to find all the property if possible, and assess it as nearly as practicable in line with the law's intent. He worked fearlessly and honestly and retired from the office with a feeling of having performed his duties conscientiously.

The result is an increase over last year in the net taxable valuation of \$1,337,521, the total for this year being \$7,654,950, to \$6,317,429 last year.

THE BLIND SCHOOL.—The blind school will open up again to-morrow. The vacancy caused by the resignation of D. B. Gray has not as yet been filled. In conversation with Gov. Penney a reporter learned this morning that there would probably be no man at the head of the institution. It is the intention of the board to elect another lady assistant to aid Miss McFadden. The choice has not yet been made, but will probably be made this evening at the meeting of the board of education. There is but little doubt but Miss Olive M. Capwell, of Canby City, will be the choice of the board, as she is the chief applicant for the position, and is highly recommended. She is a well known educator of Eastern Oregon.

CROWDED SCHOOLS.—The directors of the Salem public schools are all what to do with the pupils. All the school buildings are full to overflowing and others are asking for admission. Last night there were 1024 pupils registered, against 779 at the same time last year, an increase of 245 over last year. The directors are endeavoring to secure another building this afternoon that may be used until the North Salem building can be completed. At their meeting this afternoon the trustees elected A. W. Long, of Silverton, to a position in the school. Mr. Long is a young man of three years' experience in teaching.

GREAT CROWD.—Gideon Steiner, the State street fish and poultry man, had in the pavilion during the fair a coop of beautiful "Jongolian" pheasants, which attracted about as much attention as anything in it. They were on the sidewalk at his place of business yesterday and were viewed by every passer-by.

KICK AGAINST SMOKING

In the Lobby of the Postoffice, and a Pen for the Ladies, God Bless 'Em.

EDITOR CAPITAL JOURNAL: Seeing that the JOURNAL is always ready and willing to maintain the right and condemn the wrong, I would like to speak about what I believe to be a great wrong. Saturday evening as is usual ladies and gentlemen gathered at the postoffice waiting for their mail. Some ladies had come early and taken their places at the delivery window, but before delivery time came, men's pipes, cigars and cigarettes had encircled the few women at the window, and a regular smoke-house was the result.

Those near the doors could get enough fresh air to breathe, but soon I noticed one of the ladies making a great effort to break her way through the crowd, and I tell you it took an effort to get through. The woman was deathly pale, and as she came out she looked as though about to faint, when some young gentlemen took her arm and assisted her across to Weller's corner, where she remained 15 or 20 minutes for recuperation, before being able to proceed homeward.

This torture at the postoffice is almost unbearable and reminds me of the boy and frog story—while the boy was having so much fun sticking the frog full of pins, the poor frog had no one to sympathize with him. Just so with sick men and women who wish to go for an evening walk to the postoffice these delightful evenings, where all ought to have the right to go without being smoked to death. I believe if this woman had been compelled to inhale that cloud of poisonous smoke five minutes longer it would have about killed her.

Why is it that some men do not care for the rights and pleasures of others, not even of women? I have never yet seen a woman at the postoffice make it disagreeable for the men in any way. They always come neatly dressed, sweetly perfumed, and with smiles that should charm the ugliest smoke puffer that comes. But then some men won't do right unless they are forced to do it.

The whole play of a "Night Off," is well proportioned, and calculated to produce more fun to the square inch than any play it has been the privilege of a Salem audience to witness in a long time.
