A FAILURE.—Judge Boise was occupied in hearing the case of habeas corpus of Jas. Oswald. As was published in the JOURNAL a few days ago Oswald is here from Illinois and endeavored to take the girl back with him, but she was detained as a witness against Steneman. She was put under bonds of \$500 and being unable to furnish them was placed in the charge of Sheriff Croisan. Yesterday Oswald, who seems to be seeking for Steneman's release, had a writ of habeas corpus issued against Sheriff Croisan, demanding the release of his daughter. Judge Boise did not see fit to give up the witness, so she was remanded to the custody of the court house authorities, where she will remain until the grand jury meet.

DWELLING BURNED.—I. J. Price who lives in the Red hills a short distance west of Turner, lost his house and almost all the household furniture by fire Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Price was away from home at the time and the flames got such a start that Mrs. Price was unable to save anything of much value. In addition to the house, a woodshed and granary containing about 400 bushels of grain was consumed. The fire took its origin from a flue. It was not learned whether there was any insurance on the building or not, but it is thought that there was not. The loss will fall heavily on Mr. Price.

SPRAINED ANKLE.—Miss Viola Mann, a student of the East Salem school, met with a painful accident yesterday afternoon. While going into the basement of the building where the pupils collect after the noon hour to march to their session room, she fell on the incline, which had been made slippery by the falling rain, and received a badly sprained ankle. A cat was called and she was taken to Byron Harritt's, where she and her sisters have been boarding. Her parents live in Polk county, near Zena. She will probably be taken home in a day or two. She will necessarily be out of school for some time.

SEPTEMBER MAILS.—The total number of pieces of mail handled by carriers the month of September, was 35,202. Local postage paid (stamps on letters mailed at Salem for city delivery and paid by local publications) \$61.84. Delivery by carriers, 111 registered letters, 13,565 letters, 1572 postal cards, 10,194 newspapers. Collected by carriers, 34 local letters, 82-7 mail letters, 93 local postal cards, 476 mail postal cards, 586 newspapers. The sale of stamps, cards and stamped envelopes for September amounted to a gross sum of \$1048.37.

BAD ENOUGH.—It is said that Albany is soon to have a new and complete water system from the Santiam river. According to the Herald it is surely needed. It has the following to say of one of the pumps which has been supplying the city with water: "The second pump got its water from Calapooia river, and immediately above where the water was pumped out are two cemeteries and a slaughter house, and the Calapooia street sewer and several drains empty into the stream that supplied our water."

A BILK.—A timber locater named W. A. Cahorn, who has been cruising in this country for some three months past, has made himself scarce and left the country. There is no doubt but that the country is better off without him, but the men who located are out from \$10 to \$40 each as the result of his allurements and their own ignorance. Cahorn had a partner by the name of Welch, who has also disappeared.—Eugene Register.

SLAUGHTERING DEER.—Parties coming down from the mountains report that deer is being slaughtered by the wholesale on the McKenzie about 25 miles from Eugene. No one can object to settlers killing venison for subsistence, but the butchering of deer for their pelts should be prohibited.—Eugene Register.

OCTOBER FIRE.

Brewery Damaged by the Flames Last Night—Good Work by the Fire Companies.

At 10:30 o'clock last night the wild peals of the fire alarm broke forth announcing that property was in danger. The fact was soon made known that the brewery of Klingler & Beck, on Commercial street, was on fire. The fire was discovered by A. J. Basey, who had driven his cab up to Jay Smith's livery stable to put up his team. He immediately turned in the alarm and in short notice both fire companies were at the fire and three good streams were playing on the flames.

The fire originated in the roof of the malt kiln, which is a wooden building in the rear of the big brick of the above company. This part of the building has besides the malt kiln, considerable barley which was damaged by water. The kiln contained about 60 bushels of malt, valued at about \$200, which is now almost worthless, but the barley can be dried and used yet. The fire department did efficient work in subduing the flames, for had the fire got into the brick it would have been a difficult task to save the livery stable of Ellis & Whitley which adjoins the brewery on the south, and the big Willamette hotel which is on the north. It is only when the situation is duly considered that the work of the fire companies is fully appreciated.

The building is fully covered by insurance. There is an insurance of \$500 on the building and \$600 on the stock in the Royal Insurance Co., through Gilbert Bros. agents, and \$875 on the building and machinery in the Lancashire and Hamburg-Heidelberg companies, through Boise & Manning.

The building will be replaced by a substantial brick in the rear future. The lower part of the building is uninjured and the loss will not be so heavy as was at first supposed. \$1000 will probably cover the actual loss.

DANCE AT MACLEAY.—Company 1, second regiment O. N. G., of Macleay, will give a grand ball at their hall to-morrow evening. The boys of the Waldo hills have repaired their hall and fixed it up in attractive style. The success of the dancing parties of company 1 heretofore will assure them a good crowd from Salem. MORE SUBSTANTIAL.—The Western Union telegraph company are having some new and larger poles put on Commercial street. The old poles are becoming so burdened by the numerous wires that they are scarcely able to bear the strain now put on them.

A RARE PAINTING.

Miss Lutilda Kirn, of this city, has just completed a painting of rare excellence and one that will doubtless attract its share of attention at the exposition in Portland for the next few weeks.

The center part is a beautiful French plate mirror forty by sixty inches in size. Around this is a mat ten inches wide, and on this the artist exercised her skill. The design is holyrook and other garden flowers entwined with morning glories and honeysuckles. Around this mat of art work is a mahogany frame several inches wide. The French plate glass of this painting was cut to order in San Francisco, and it was the intention of the artist to have had the picture completed in time for the state fair, but owing to the delay in getting the glass and frame here, she was too late. The picture will be taken down to Portland probably tomorrow. Miss Kirn is a Marion county girl. Her father, Fred Kirn, lives a mile or so from Gervais. She was educated, with the exception of a year spent in Germany, in Salem and Portland, and seems to be a natural artist.

SOME PEOPLE JUST THAT WAY.—But yesterday morning some people were complaining about so much dust, and this morning the same persons are talking unkindly about mud. They are not "Websters," however. The native Oregonian has learned long since that there is no place this side of Paradise where the weather is so competent to take care of itself as in Oregon; nor can a place be found where the mud and dust, or the rain and the dry weather, come with greater regularity and with better results. The country does not need rain for several months in summer, nor is it wanted by the people; during the season of harvest and hop-picking heavy rains would do great damage. This year harvest was late as was the picking so the rains came several weeks later than usual. Were ever a people more favored? Yet how many fail to fully appreciate it.

JUMPED TO HER DEATH.

A Lady Patient at the Asylum for the Insane Goes out of a Fourth Story Window.

Dr. Harry Lane, superintendent of the asylum for insane, and his corps of assistants were thrown into an unusual flurry of excitement last evening by Miss Mary E. Seal, aged about 30 years, a patient from Eugene City, jumping from a fourth-story window about five o'clock in the afternoon and sustaining internal injuries and a shock from which she died some three hours later.

Miss Seal had been an inmate of the asylum some six months and had been watched very closely at all times as the tendency of her disposition was suicidal. But she had her rational times and was a steady helper in the sewing room, where she made herself very useful. The authorities of the institution had given her a leave of absence to visit her relatives at Eugene, from which she had just returned, and resumed her work in the sewing room. At the time mentioned she evaded the watchfulness of the attendant under whose care she was and succeeded in reaching the fourth story, where she entered the apartments of some of the hired help, whose windows are not guarded by screens. Her absence had been reported to Steward Irwin and that officer succeeded in tracing her whereabouts, but just as he went into the room she made a rush for the window, caught the sill and jumped out. Mr. Irwin being only able to catch a handful of her dress as she disappeared. She struck on her feet on the hard ground beneath, with the result already mentioned, death ensuing about eight o'clock last night.

Dr. Lane came to the city this forenoon and notified Dr. Stott, of Gervais, the county coroner, who came up by team and is now holding an inquest. This is one of those unfortunate cases where blame cannot justly be attached to any person. The most vigilant care had been exercised with Miss Seal, but the natural acuteness of this class of persons will sometimes outwit the most thorough system of surveillance and such was the case in this instance.
