## MARKETS.

**WHEAT.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 2.—Wheat, buyer '90, \$1.35; season \$1.41.

## CRIMINAL.

**GAVE HIMSELF UP.**  
CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—John Bruck, the millionaire manufacturer and contractor, who assaulted and seriously injured E. E. Sweeney, gave himself up. It is thought Sweeney will die.

**TRAIN ROBBERY.**  
Tiffin, Ohio, Oct. 2.—A bold express robbery was committed on the Cincinnati, Sandusky & Cleveland railroad, south of here this morning. The Adams Express messenger was held up by masked men, armed with revolvers. A safe was ransacked. The loss is supposed to be several thousand dollars. The robbers have escaped.

**THE DETAILS.**  
Immediately after the train left Urbana, two masked men with cocked revolvers entered the express car and compelled the Adams messenger, A. L. Scudder, to throw up his hands. They tied him securely and robbed the safe of its packages, containing several thousand dollars and other valuables. While at work a brakeman attempted to enter the car and was shot at by one of the robbers. He gave the alarm and the train slowed up to give an opportunity to capture the robbers, but they jumped from the train just as it was entering West Liberty and disappeared in the darkness.

**IN THE PAY OF GERMANY.**  
PARIS, France, Oct. 2.—Madame Bonnet, the woman who was arrested at Cannes on suspicion of being a German spy, has confessed she was in the employ of the German government at a monthly salary of three hundred francs and traveling expenses.

**A DYING KING.**  
THE HAGUE, Oct. 2.—The death of the king of Holland is hourly expected.

**\$7,500,000 FIRE.**  
SYDNEY, N. S. Wales, Oct. 2.—A very destructive fire occurred in this city last night, entailing a loss of one million, five hundred thousand pounds sterling.

**A SENSIBLE VIEW.**  
BRUSSELS, Belgium, Oct. 2.—The independence of Belgium says: The adoption of the McKinley tariff bill insures the failure of the World's fair at Chicago, as it will be a hopeless expense for Europeans to send exhibits there.

## POLITICAL.

**FOR SHERIFF OF COOK COUNTY.**  
CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 2.—Ex-Congressman Frank Lawler has been nominated for sheriff of Cook county.

**IDAHO GIVES A DECIDED REPUBLICAN VICTORY.**  
BOISE CITY, Idaho, Oct. 2.—In complete return from seven counties out of eighteen in the state have given Sweet, republican candidate for congress, fifteen hundred majority. The rest of the state ticket is republican by about the same majority. The legislature will probably stand thirty-three republicans to nineteen democrats.

## STATE.

**WORK RESUMED.**  
PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 2.—Work is to be resumed at once on the Astoria & South Coast railway. A contract has been let to a Chinese firm here for the grading of seven miles out from Hillsboro and at Astoria to another Chinese firm for the grading of several miles up the Lewis and Clark river. Fourteen miles of steel rails are due from Pennsylvania.

**A PORTLAND RENEGADE WILL GET A DESERVED ROASTING.**  
PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 2.—The Evening Telegram publishes an article in which S. Monroe Hubbard, a resident of this city, well known throughout the state, confesses to be the party who has been in correspondence with the ocean bureau discouraging a recount of the state. This confession is substantiated by letters in his possession received from Supervisor Porter. The article charges Hubbard as being a mental imbecile and imputes his motive to a desire to get even for his discharge as enumerator on the ground of incompetency.

**OBJECTS TO THE KNIGHTS.**  
NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—A circular has been issued by Vice-President Webb of the New York Central, in which it is stated that the company objects to its employees being Knights of Labor.

**YOUNG MORMON PROSELYTES ON THE WAY TO SALT LAKE.**  
NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—There arrived yesterday on the steamer Wyoming thirty-two young mormons. This morning the authorities tried to induce them to forego the intention of becoming mormon proselytes. Of the girls, Karen Sylvesterson, by name, who acted as spokeswoman for the party, frankly acknowledged that they were all willing to be one of seven or eight wives and were fully aware of the principles of mormonism. The girls are all young and some of them remarkably pretty. The entire party will proceed on their journey to-morrow.

Charles McElvanie is sentenced to be electrocuted at Sing Sing, Nov. 17.

Henry Ellis, a Spokane Falls sport, was shot by J. C. Hoefler, a rancher, near that city, in a quarrel.

The Washington republican canvass opens to-night.

Two women were sentenced at Port Townsend to pay \$100 a piece for keeping houses of ill fame. A man who rented rooms for such purposes, was also indicted.

Rains threaten to injure the California grape crop.

The Spokane Exposition commenced on Oct. 1st.

C. I. Helm, the noted stockman of Ellensburg, has just arrived from France, bringing 16 head of the finest grade of horses, including 10 thoroughbred Percheron stallions, two thoroughbred mares, one of which took the second prize at the Paris exposition, two thoroughbred coach mares and one thoroughbred stallion. The most valuable animal of the lot was the two-year old trotting stallion, Wilson Boy, by Pocahontas Boy, dam Miss Wilson. This colt just took the first prize at the New York inter-state fair.

Samuel Howard, a flier for the Puget Mill company of Utsalav, was killed Sept. 30th, by being hit with a piece of timber.

Angus McDonald, conductor on the Puget Sound and Gray's Harbor road, near Kamille, fell between the cars of a logging train Sept. 20 and was instantly killed, being mangled almost beyond recognition. His head was completely severed from his body and rolled down an embankment. Both legs were cut off.

## NORTH PACIFIC NEWS NOTES.

### OREGON.

A proposition has been made to Baker City to establish a distillery there, provided twenty-five acres of land are donated.

The fruit exhibit at the Southern Oregon district fair held at Jacksonville has been sent to the Portland Industrial fair.

W. H. McBride, a druggist of Adams, Umatilla county, sold liquor to Indians on a prescription. The United States district attorney holds that the law has been violated.

Carloads of potatoes from Eastern Washington, billed to Nebraska, were seen at the depot a few nights since. One good turn deserves another. Last year Nebraska shipped potatoes to this country, and now we are shipping potatoes to Nebraska.—E. O.

The inefficiency of Chinese labor on sections is proven by the action of the Union Pacific, which is discharging its coolies and employing white men instead. Nearly all the section employes on Roadmaster Peters' division are now white men.—E. O.

Our marshal should see to it that homes left standing tied out of doors all night on our streets without feed or water are promptly taken in hand and cared for, and their owners are as promptly arrested for cruelty to animals. Some men in this world are heartless enough to starve a dumb brute and allow it to suffer with cold, while they roast their skins and fill their hides with whiskey.—Primeville News.

Now is the very time when a pilot schooner is most needed outside with pilots on board. The German four-masted ship Renee Rickmers was standing off and on for three days, looking for a pilot. Other vessels had a similar experience, and as many vessels are now on the way here, it is very essential that they must be met outside. It is hoped the commissioners will soon be able to have a schooner in service.—Astorian.

One of the largest tugs in the coast service went off the marine ways at Eureka last Monday. It is the tug Resolute, owned by the Oregon Pacific railroad company. She cost \$45,000. She was framed in this city of eastern timber. Her bottom is covered with copper. Her engines are of 380 horse-power and were built in Philadelphia. The dimensions of the Resolute are as follows: Length, 105; breadth, 20.7 feet; depth, 9.8 feet, tonnage, gross, 91.50. She is commanded by Captain Charles J. Luckey.—Astorian.
