STATE.

THE ORPHANS' HOME AND HOSPITAL. THE HERALD SAYS: ALBANY, Oct. 3.—The contract for the lumber to be used in the construction of the \$6,000 hospital at this city has been let to the Santiam Lumbering Co., and the material will be on the ground in a few days.

IMMEDIATE BENEFICIAL WORKINGS OF THE TARIFF BILL. PITTSBURG, Pa., Oct. 3.—One result of the passage of the tariff bill with its tin plate clause will be the establishment of an immense tin plate factory at an early day in Baltimore by a company of Eastern capitalists with a capital stock of \$7,000,000.

CATHOLIC CHURCH ROW. CLEVELAND, Oct. 3.—The trouble that has recently been brewing between Bishop Gilmour and J. J. Groves, editor of the Catholic Knight, which Groves claims is the official organ of the Knights of St. John, and which the bishop denies, has culminated in the bishop's publishing decrees of the third council of Baltimore. These decrees permit canonical punishment of publishers who make hostile attacks upon church authority.

DEATH OF A PROMINENT AMERICAN IN SANDWICH ISLAND. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 3.—Advice from Honolulu state that Chas. N. Arnold, a well known hotel keeper on the island, a native of Pennsylvania and a member of Geo. DeLong Post, No. 45, G. A. R., died of aneurism of the heart, Sept. 24. Arnold has of late been employed in the department of public works.

CONTESTING A WILL. CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 3.—The will of the late John Crear, which disposed of an estate of \$3,000,000, much of it charitable and religious institutions of this city, will be contested.

BRITISH CONSULS MUST NOT ASSIST AMERICAN COMMERCE. WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 3.—The British vice consul at Los Angeles in his report to his government recently praised horses raised in Southern California. He expressed the opinion that the British army could be well supplied with horses from this source. The Yorkshire Post editorially says these consular reports are intended to give information to the people of England as to the demand for their products, instead of conveying to foreigners information as to how they can crush British industries, and offers the advice that the sooner Lord Salisbury stops his publication the better.

OVERSIGHT OF LOTTERY MAIL. WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 3.—Asst. Attorney General Tynor, under direction of the post master general, has prepared a circular letter to post masters containing instructions for their guidance in the treatment of "lottery matter" and the recent anti-lottery act. It is very explicit in instructions and all those post masters to examine all unsealed matter, but forbids tampering with sealed matter.

HARRISON'S TRIP. WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 3.—The preliminary details of the president's western trip are now arranged, subject to slight changes. The president leaves Washington on Monday and will come west as far as Topeka Kansas.

RESULT OF GAMBLING. FRESNO, Cal., Oct. 3.—Jack Smith shot and instantly killed Percy Williams this morning in the bedroom of the Hughes Hotel. The trouble arose over a game of cards.

EXPRESS ROBBERIES CAUGHT. CINCINNATI, Ohio, Oct. 3.—The manager of the Adams Express Co has received letters from the general manager of the Cincinnati, Sandusky and Cleveland railroad, saying that two of yesterday's train robbers are in jail at Bellefontaine and the road's detectives are after the third one.

EQUINOCTIAL STORMS. LONDON, Eng., Oct. 3.—A terrific gale has prevailed in the North Sea to-day. Five vessels have foundered.

NO CONVICTION LIKELY. LONDON, Eng., Oct. 3.—The hearing in the case of Slavin and Mc Auliffe took place to-day in Lam both court. The counsel for the Crown said if a contest between men was declared unlawful, the persons who arranged and abetted the fight should be also prosecuted.

Wheat at Chicago is firm at 96 1/2. Wheat at San Francisco is \$1.25 per cent to day. There is no dairy exhibit at the Portland exposition. The foreign hop market grows more favorable. The republican ticket swept Seattle clean. Hanlan has again been defeated by Tecmer. Theaema will hold her charter election Oct. 18. The democrats concede Idaho to the republicans by 1000 plurality. The Comte de Paris and party arrived at New York this morning. At Dayton, Tenn., 1200 miners have struck against a proposed reduction. Pleuro-pneumonia has been discovered in a ship of Canadian cattle landed at Dundee. The coffin trust bill is declared dissolved on account of the anti-trust bill passed by congress. The Fresno Examiner estimates the grain crop of that county at one million boxes. Prof. Plummer, of Tacoma, states there are trees near the foot of Mt. Ranier 670 feet high.
