WEINHARD BREWERY BOYCOTT. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9.—General Secretary Fuhrman, of the brewery workmen, received a telegram from Portland, Or., stating that Ambruster, one of the men sent to Oregon to push the Weinhard brewery boycott, had been arrested at the instance of the brewery men.

THE COUNCIL OF FEDERATED TRADES will be asked to endorse the boycott and also one of the Anheuser-Busch brewery, of St. Louis.

A TACOMA DEVELOPMENT SCHEME. TACOMA, Oct. 9.—The following has been organized: Proposals to organize the Tacoma Development Association with a capital stock of one million dollars divided into 10,000 shares of a par value of \$100 each.

THE OBJECT OF THE COMPANY shall be to encourage and assist the location of manufacturing industries and other enterprises in the city of Tacoma and vicinity, provided, however, that no part of the funds or the property of the company shall be given away or employed in the active prosecution of any business.

Subscriptions to the capital stock of the company may be entered in cash or in real estate. Cash subscriptions shall be paid upon call of the board of trustees as required for the purposes of the company; provided, that no more than 5 per cent of the par value of the stock shall be called in any one month; and provided, that when any person shall have paid up 50 per cent of his total subscription, certificates of full paid stock shall be issued to him for one half of the stock so paid.

Real estate given in payment of subscriptions to the capital stock shall be at once conveyed to the company by warranty deed with approved title and shall be taken at a valuation to be thereafter fixed by a board of appraisers who shall be appointed by the subscribers to the capital stock, provided, however, that any person conveying said property shall at any time within thirty days after the valuation thereof is fixed, have the privilege of withdrawing said property and substituting therefor a cash subscription of an equal amount.

A stock subscription blank was appended to the proposal, divided into property and cash subscriptions. Five minutes after \$30,000 in real estate and \$10,000 cash, was subscribed and \$50,000 more was promised for the Tacoma Development Association.
