LAST OF THE OLD CHIEFS.—On

the 4th inst. the old chief, Adams, died at his residence and was buried at the Kelchis cemetery on the 6th. His age is doubtful but is supposed to be between 80 and 100 years. 'Twas he that fought the great war between the Tillamook tribe and the Clatsop and Chinook tribes for the capture of a maiden who belonged to the Tillamook tribe and had been captured by the Clatsop and Chinook Indians previous to this great battle. The battle took place on Elk creek, at a place called the Bald Hill, in Clatsop county. He was buried in all the pomp and usages belonging to a wild tribe. The chief warrior on the Clatsop Indian side was Chief Catast. Catast, the chief last referred to by the Watchtower, departed to "the happy hunting grounds" a few years ago. Old Adams is the last chief of a very eminent tribe of Indians, which were closely related to those of the Catast tribe. The last named tribe, and especially Catast, has by far the more romantic history of the two. How old Catast was when he died no one ventures to say, for he was very old when the settlers of the early forties came to Clatsop county. He was old enough to remember many of the incidents of the wintering of Lewis and Clark on Clatsop plains, in the winter of 1804 and 1805. Catast, while a very severe master of his own tribe, and murdered six or seven wives and was feared and hated by every Indian in Clatsop, was yet very kind to the white settlers. This fact alone prevented his tribe being placed on a reservation. When the question of having the Indians placed on a reservation, Chief Catast got on his white horse, (for he always rode a white horse), and called on all the settlers and told them that it was not his, nor his tribe's wish, to go to a reservation. A council of the people was called, and Catast himself being present, when R. M. Morrison, one of the earliest pioneers addressed the assembly, and told them of the kindness shown them by Catast, on their arriving there when they were at his mercy, and that he was then unwilling to oppose the wish of the chief, so the Indians were permitted to stay where they were. That tribe has never to this day been on a reservation.

DETHRONED MIND.—S. F. Tice,

who was brought down from the southern part of this county a few days ago on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, was adjudged insane yesterday and committed to the asylum. Tice is an old man and has been living by himself for some time, and doing odd jobs here and there wherever he could find anything to do. He has not been very strong either in body or mind, and the excitement of the recent trouble with Steel, and the arrest and confinement in jail have dethroned his already weak reason. Tice was a soldier during the rebellion, and was in the battle near Springfield, Missouri, when Gen. Price was driven out of that state by the Union army under Gen. Lyons. Gen. Lyons was killed in the struggle there, and a handsome monument marks the place where he fell. This battle ground, known as Wilson Creek, is one of the most sacred spots on Missouri soil, and has the largest and neatest kept cemetery in the state. Hundreds of persons visit the place every year.

THE COOKE MYSTERY.

Further Details About the Disappearance in Chicago of a Young Salemite.

The whereabouts of Dr. Clinton Cooke is still shrouded in the deepest mystery, and among the latest on the subject is the following dispatch in the Morning Oregonian:

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—The local papers are making something of a sensation over the disappearance of Dr. Clinton Cooke, the young physician whose office is on West Madison street. It is stated that he left the office last Thursday night ostensibly to attend a patient, and has not been seen since. Dr. Cooke is a native of Salem, Or., and came here several years ago and attended the Rush Medical college. A drug clerk, who last saw him, says he seemed extremely nervous and took bromide to quiet his nerves before he went out. No trace is yet found of him. One of the local papers says he has been despondent ever since Lillie Rogers, a young lady of Portland, Or., broke their engagement. Another paper says that the lady's name was Elizabeth Alma, and that she lives in Iowa now. Still another says he was worried by financial matters and some of his friends fear suicide, and others say he wandered away while suffering from temporary mental aberration. There does not seem to be much ground for the belief of foul play. The police have the matter in hand.

Concerning the apprehensions manifested in the above, his friends and family feel in no way alarmed, for he was considered a very clear-headed, resolute young man who would not give way to despondency or become the victim of mental aberration or suicide. Moreover, if either was the case there would certainly be some clue left to trace his whereabouts. Neither is the supposition of financial trouble plausible, for only six weeks ago he wrote his parents that he was doing fairly well, and had just invested in a new \$75.00 operating chair. Furthermore he has had the financial backing of a wealthy relative in New York, who has also reported him as having a bright future, concerning his engagement to Miss Rogers, whose full name is Elizabeth Alma Rogers (nick-named Lillie), and is the daughter of E. P. Rogers, the Southern Pacific passenger agent at Portland, we are permitted to say that it was probably a fact. This engagement, if it existed, was broken off last March. At that time the young lady visited Chicago to witness his graduation, and declared her feelings in the matter, to which he became fully reconciled. All manner of theories are indulged in by his family here, but none which either give much further comfort to their fears or give cause for further alarm. They can but quietly await developments, and hope for the best.

A PURE LIFE.

Investigation by JOURNAL reporters at Salem, at the request of the Associated Press for any facts that might lead to some explanation of his mysterious disappearance, all shows that his life was upright and blameless. It cannot be learned so far that he had any love affairs, or social or business entanglements. This information was promptly wired to the Associated Press by the JOURNAL, of which is its accredited day representative at Salem.

He got out of his wagon hitched his team and went into the store where he sat down for a few minutes until medical aid could be summoned. In the few minutes required for the doctor to get there he lost control of the entire left side of his body. He was taken to the boarding house of Mrs. Wait at the foot of Court street, and at noon he was resting easy. Paralysis is always dangerous in any form, so the doctor was unable to say how serious the case was. Miss Magee drove home to inform the family of the sad accident. Mr. Magee will remain here in town for a few days.

STREET CAR LINE.—The Capital City street car company will begin to-morrow to put in their track along the side of the horse car line. The work will be begun at the present terminus of the electric and continued on the north side of the State street line to Commercial street, where it will cross over to the east side and continue on that side to the Willamette hotel. The Salem Street Car company are having a switch put in on the corner in front of Ladd & Bush's bank to connect the State street line with that on Commercial street on the south, which will make a Y at that place.

LATEST ABOUT THE BRIDGE.

The Ablest Engineer on the Coast Sent For—"The Contractors' Theory."

The JOURNAL has pursued a conservative course in relation to the bridge that is being built at Salem, but it has never failed to call attention to whatever appeared of a questionable character in regard thereto. It has not gone so far as to suggest how things should be built, nor adopted any plan of pier as its own. It has favored placing the responsibility for the erection of a good bridge upon the public authorities, and giving the people all the light possible on the subject.

THE CONTRACTORS' THEORY.

One of the firm of contractors was seen and declared that the plan they were operating on was that they were building a bridge under the orders and directions of the county courts. They would do just as they were told, and took no responsibility.

JUDGE WALDO'S OPINION.

A reporter saw Judge Waldo at the bridge this morning and ascertained him on what he thought of the bridge. He stated that he yet had confidence in the pier, and he believed that it would prove all right yet. He further stated that the sixteen feet of timbering under the piers was liable to shrink and some being green when put in would shrink the most under the immense weight of the pier, and that on each of the base would make considerable difference at the top some eighty feet above. He said while he had belief in the bridge and the pier, he and the commissioners were conservative in allowing the work to go on until the matter was an assured fact—that all was right. Judge Stauffer, of Polk county, was here yesterday and met Judge Waldo and the commissioners of this county, and it was decided to send for Engineer Thielson, of Portland, but this morning when the reporter saw Judge Waldo, Mr. Thielson had not been heard from, though he had been sent a telegram yesterday afternoon. If Mr. Thielson comes on the base of the pier will be thoroughly examined, and the counties interested will have the work proceed according to his instructions.

NO MONEY PAID.

Now that Engineer Thielson, of Portland, has been sent for to superintend the work superintended by Mr. Granbuhl who had it superintended by Mr. McCoy. It is interesting to note what the superintendency so far has cost and what it will cost in the future. So far not a dollar has been paid. Supts. McCoy or Granbuhl and there are no bills on file by these gentlemen.

GRONDAHL DISMISSED.

It is reported that engineer Grondahl has been discharged. He was the consulting and constructing engineer employed by the two counties to supervise the new Salem steel bridge.
