FOREIGN.

A MUCH-HERALDED DISCOVERY ABOUT CONSUMPTION PROVES A FAILURE.

BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 15.—Dr. Koch has ceased to make experiments in the cure of Tuberculosis and consumption and it is presumed that his method has proven a failure.

DILLON AND O'BRIEN FLY TO FRANCE, BUT THE GOVERNMENT WILL NOT ALLOW THEM TO REMAIN.

PARIS, France, Oct. 15.—The daily "La Presse" this morning said: "Dillon and O'Brien, the Irish Land Leaguers, after their flight from Tipperary, took passage on a sailing vessel, which landed them at Lac-Surmer, on the coast of Normandy. They passed Sunday night at the residence of Monsieur Raffalovich, a banker, whose daughter is the wife of O'Brien. They returned to Paris last night and their address in that city is a secret. If any news is received from America favorable to the Irish interests, or their mission to that country, they will start for New York at the end of the week. If it becomes manifest that it is their intention to remain in Paris, the government will request them to leave at once."

DILLON AND O'BRIEN HAVE NOT BEEN IN FRANCE.

PARIS, France, Oct. 15.—Rumors are in circulation that Raffalovich, and members of his family, declare that Dillon and O'Brien have not been in France, and assert that they have sailed for America.

TO A HIGHER COURT.

The Venerable Justice Miller Quietly Passes From Earth.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Justice Miller, who was stricken with apoplexy last Friday afternoon, quietly passed away to-night, dying at eight minutes before 11 o'clock. As was predicted, the end was peaceful and painless. He did not for a moment return to consciousness after the night of the fatal stroke. To-night there was little change until about 10:30 o'clock, when a change for the worse came. From that time respiration grew shorter and it was evident that the end was at hand. His family were called to the bedside and his physicians did all that mortal power could do, but at eight minutes before 11 he ceased to breathe. No definite arrangements have been made in regard to the funeral.

Samuel Freeman Miller was born in Richmond, Ky., April 5, 1816. He was graduated at the medical department of Transylvania university, Ky., in 1838, practiced for a short time and afterwards became a lawyer. He was strongly in favor of emancipation and did much to favor that cause, and although he took no part in politics, the course of public affairs induced him to remove in 1850 from Kentucky to Iowa, where he became a leader of the republican party. He was offered and declined numerous offices and devoted himself to his profession, in which he took high rank. In 1862 he was appointed by President Lincoln associate justice of the United States supreme court, which position he occupied at the day of his death. As an orator he possessed unusual ability, and in recognition of his merit he was chosen to deliver the oration at the constitutional centennial celebration at Philadelphia. Justice Miller, by common consent, has been regarded the strongest man on the supreme bench ever since he took his seat thereon. On two occasions he was selected chief justice by the appointing power. President Grant decided to nominate him for that office, but it was argued it would be an affront to Justice Noah H. Swayne, who had served longer than Justice Miller, and as a compromise Morrison R. Waite was chosen. During Mr. Cleveland's administration the question of promoting Justice Miller was seriously considered by the president when Chief Justice Waite died, but he was persuaded by his party associates, who decided such a course unwise, and Melville W. Fuller was appointed chief justice instead. Justice Miller has always been a strong authority on constitutional law, which line he has a reputation second only to that of Chief Justice Marshall. He has been the legal adviser of presidents of the United States on many intricate questions, and it is probably true that no American jurist ever stood so high in the estimation of the leading men of both political parties. He passed the time limit of 70 years in 1886, but never gave any indications of a desire to take advantage of it, nor indeed, was there any reason why he should. He has been as vigorous, physically and mentally, as most men are at 50, and has constantly done his full share of work on the bench.

PARAGRAPHS.

The police census completed yesterday show New York City's population to be 1,410,715, an increase of 197,214 over the government figures.

Commodore Charles L. Huntington, commander of Pensacola navy yard, died at Saratoga yesterday afternoon.

A. M. McRae, secretary and treasurer of the Security Loan and Savings company, St. Catherine, Ont., has disappeared, together with \$25,000 of the society funds.

The 6-year-old son of George Aldrich, a mechanic of Washington city, while playing with matches set fire to a crib in which his two baby sisters were sleeping, and the little ones were burned to a crisp.

The strike of dock laborers in Limerick ended in a victory for the men.

A destructive fire at St. Helena, Cal., yesterday morning consumed property to the amount of about \$18,500.

The sheriff of Fremont, Wyo., has captured another murderer by aid of his famous blood-hounds and Indians.

A crusade against the liquor traffic has been inaugurated in an Indiana town by using dynamite to blow up drugstores and saloons.

The death is announced of Marchioness Castellane, grandniece of Talleyrand, who influenced him to become reconciled to the church of Rome.

Le Soir states that 250,000 bottles of champagne, valued at \$400,000, were sent to New York from France on speculation to forestall the operations of the new tariff law.

English and German iron and steel men have broken up into parties, under the guidance of a local committee, and are visiting points of interest in and about Chicago.

Canada has removed the export duties upon spruce and pine logs, and also upon shingle bolts of pine or cedar and cedar logs capable of being made into shingle bolts.

A preliminary meeting was held Monday evening in London by the Americanist congress, and the sessions were formally opened the next day. The trial history of America will be a subject of research.

The Telegraph house, at Sacramento, an old frame building, was burned early Monday morning. John Collins, one of the boarders, lost his life in the flames. The fire caused damages of about \$6000, half insured.

A new scale of wages has been inaugurated at Great Falls Montana, by labor unions, and the result is a general strike. Governor Toole was asked to send troops, but as there has been no violence, can see no reason for so doing.

Major General Miles has been detailed as a member of the commission to negotiate with the northern band of Cheyenne Indians on Tongue river reservation, Montana, and with the band of northern Cheyenne Indians on Pine Ridge reservation, South Dakota, for a modification of the treaty.

Another one of the six prisoners who broke out of the county jail at Eugene last February, has been recaptured near that city.

In the state senate of Vermont yesterday Justin S. Morrill received 27 votes for United States Senator, and Edward J. Phelps one. In the House Morrill received 157, Phelps 18. Both houses will meet in joint session on Wednesday and formally announce the election of Morrill.
