AT THE CANNERY.

While waiting for the delayed south bound train yesterday morning a JOURNAL reporter dropped in at the Salem cannery for a few minutes, and seeing that the cannery was not operating inquired of Mr. Bird, the foreman, if that part of the establishment had shut down for the season. The reporter was informed that it had, and so that is practically true. The statement seems to have been denied, so the reporter called on Mr. Wallace at the cannery this morning when the matter was explained. He said that a little of their contract fruit came in yesterday afternoon and that the cannery would run for a couple or three hours either this or to-morrow afternoon and that probably a few men would find work in the cannery one or two afternoons a week for the remainder of the month, but that that part of the establishment had practically shut down for the season.

EXAMINING THE BRIDGE.

An Engineer and Diver Making an Investigation of the Pier Foundation—Report to-morrow.

County Commissioners Grimm and Watson went to Portland Tuesday afternoon to see if they could not succeed in finding a competent engineer and diver to come and investigate the leaning tower of Pismo standing in the river and by courtesy called a bridge pier.

Their way was made easy by the previous work of Mr. J. H. Albert with Engineer Lederle, and the latter gentleman obtained for them the services of Mr. C. A. Homan, an engineer of skill and experience, and of Mr. C. C. Follett, a diver who has had long years of practice and who is at present in the employ of the Union Pacific railroad in charge of their bridge at Portland. These gentlemen and Mr. Follett's son Charles, who is also well versed in water lore, arrived here last evening ready for action.

This morning at an early hour Engineer Homan, Mr. Follett and son, Commissioners Grimm and Watson, proceeded to the bridge and as soon as they had everything prepared, which took quite a while, they commenced operations. A JOURNAL reporter met Mr. Homan prior to launching for the middle of the river, and learned that not until some time to-morrow would he be able to give any information of a definite character, as he would give out no opinions or speculations until he had finished a thorough examination and then he would make a formal report to the county court.

The bank of the river gave resting place to a good many interested spectators, of all ages and classes, among them being Judge Stouffer, of Polk county, who watched the proceedings from that vantage ground. The remarks and theories were as varied as the crowd. Several intelligent gentlemen ventured to express the belief that the foundation was all right and that the "lean" was caused by building it that way, as it is said there was no plumb line used in the construction, but that it was put up by the eye. This theory was knocked out by a gentleman standing by, who was evidently one of the bridge builders, who said that there was a clock set on the pier which recorded the settling process to the thirty-second part of an inch, and that a few days ago this instrument had told of a lean of eleven inches at the top.

There was one conclusion all Salem citizens present agreed upon and that is that these high priced engineers and divers could have been used to good practical advantage in the early stages of pier building, while it is now feared the work has passed beyond their usefulness.

The report of Engineer Homan will be awaited with much anxiety and the JOURNAL hopes to be able to give it to the public to-morrow.

Deeds Since Last Report—Civil and Criminal Cases—Henry Palsky Acquitted, Etc.

56 M. Michael, J. A. Carson, Geo. H. Burnett, vs Geo. H. Jones et al., Timon Ford; motion for leave to issue execution.

In this case the jury brought in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff Michael on every point.

Granted until to-morrow to file motion for new trial.

State vs Henry Palsky on indictment for larceny from a store.

The jury in this case were out only a few minutes when a verdict of acquittal was returned. Timon Ford and W. H. Holmes conducted the defense and did it with great ability and good management. The circumstances looked a little dark against the accused, but the facts have to be beyond cavil before a jury will convict this term. In this instance Henry Palsky, of Gervais, an old French soldier of the Crimean war, was accused by a farmer named Dubois of stealing a pocket-book and \$22 out of his pocket, while he was trying on a new suit of clothes in McKinley Mitchell's store. The constable with a search warrant found in Palsky's room a pocket-book which Dubois identified as the one he had lost, but at the trial Palsky swore he had had the pocket-book twenty years and his son identified it as one long in the family. The jury could not see enough in the case upon which to base a conviction.
