ACCIDENTS.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPE OF PASSENGERS IN A RAILROAD WRECK. REDAING, Pa., Oct. 25.—The Reading express this morning ran into three loaded coal cars a half mile from Potomac. The coal cars were filled. The locomotive was derailed, and the tender telescoped the smoking car. The escape of the passengers from death was miraculous. Joseph Markowitz on one of the coal cars was killed.

WASHINGTON.

THE BEHRING SEA FISHERIES DISPUTE.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—The statement is telegraphed from Canada upon authority of British members of parliament that it has been resolved to submit the Behring sea fisheries dispute to arbitration. This is premature so far as it may be taken to imply a completed agreement on the part of both governments. Learned correspondence on the subject is still in progress, but there is hopeful signs that a satisfactory settlement will be reached at a comparatively early date.

RECEPTION TO THE MEMBERS OF THE IRON AND STEEL INSTITUTE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 25.—The members of the Iron and Steel Institute who have been on a tour through the South arrived in Washington this morning. They were taken to the patent office, where they evinced much interest in the details of the American patent system. They then visited the postmaster general and called on the postmaster general. The program for the day includes visits to the other executive departments, with a reception at the white house at 5 o'clock to night and a promenade concert at the Arlington hotel.

MISCELLANY.

GOVERNOR HILL IN THE SOUTH. CAMERON, W. Va., Oct. 25.—Governor Hill and party left Wheeling this morning, over the Baltimore and Ohio. They were to have stopped at all the stations between Wheeling and Harper's Ferry to allow the governor to make addresses. The program, however, was interfered with by a collision at Mountsville, resulting in a slight damage.

TIMELY RESCUE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal. Oct. 25.—The tug, Relief, yesterday relieved the schooner Sylvia, which was in distress at Port Reyes. Had the tug arrived half an hour later the schooner would have been destroyed and several lives lost.

FIELD FOR ROBBERY.

BOONVILLE, Mo., Oct. 25.—H. B. Hines and F. C. Hoffman, who are supposed to be the persons who robbed the Missouri Pacific at Otterville a short time ago, were held by a grand jury in the sum of \$2000 each.

THE ITALIAN CONSUL AT NEW ORLEANS DISAPPEARED WITH THE GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 25.—In the Progresso Italiano a dispatch from Washington, stating that the Italian delegation there, upon receiving official reports from the Italian consul at New Orleans, called the attention of the state department to the proclamation of the mayor of New Orleans, which they claim is an unjust accusation. Blaine is said to have telegraphed the governor of Louisiana regarding the matter.

The Boston Globe thus speaks of Clara Morris: The appearance of Miss Clara Morris in her new play, "Renee de Moray," drew a large and brilliant audience to the Globe Theater last evening that crowded the house from orchestra to the gods' gallery. It was a critical and appreciative audience, drawn by one of the few great actresses this age has produced. There can be little doubt that Clara Morris will be accounted the greatest histrionic genius among actresses that America has ever produced. In Forrest, the elder Booth, Davenport, in Edwin Booth, McCullough, Lawrence, Barrett, and others that might be named, the list of actors is notable; in actresses few have reached greatness, and of these in native histrionic genius that asks nothing of the decorative properties, Clara Morris must be conceded to stand alone. If she were to play on a bare platform, devoid of stage accessories and costumes, she would make her hearers forget everything save her intense magnetic, dramatic realism. It is doubtful if a specific line was ever given to her costumes, save in the most incidental manner. They are always in exquisite taste, but so subordinated to her art that we forget them, as she does. Nor were any petty tricks and subterfuges of advertising brought into play. There is no need. DELIGHTFUL READING.

The people of Salem have long known that Miss Margaret Clouse Scriber possessed surpassing eloquence, but they were not prepared to find them so perfect and completely pleasing as they proved to be last Tuesday evening before the large and select audience at Reed's opera house. Her first selections were from James Whitcomb Riley, "That old sweetheart of mine," and "The Usual May," but these were only preludes to the really delightful selections afterward. "The Acute-battle Doctor," a translation from the French, wherein a prominent Parisian circus clown became the means of resuscitating the little dying son of a poor mechanic, gave fine opportunity for the play of her powers in the variety of expression and deep feeling. This brought forth storms of applause, as did also "Mr. Pickwick's Dilemma," familiar to all readers of Dickens, but clothed as in life by Miss Scriber's inimitable rendition. "The Portrait," from Owen Meredith, was also pleasingly given, but "Mr. Brown has his Hair Cut" capped the climax, and though it was the last piece on the program the audience insisted on an

encore, as in her previous selection. It is a prideful fact that Salem can boast of an educationist in Miss Scriber equal, if not superior, to any who has appeared here from any quarter. Miss Scriber's program had other attractions not the less appreciated. Miss Hally Parrish and Mr. James H. Ross opened the evening's entertainment in a duet "If Live and Love Thee," the sweet soprano of the one and the rich baritone of the other, chiding in the most charming manner. Miss Parrish also sang two solos and responded to an encore, the audience being delighted to hear their old favorite once more. Mr. Ross was in excellent voice and his solo, "Calling," set the house wild. "Jimmie" tried to dodge an encore but the crowd would be there clapping yet if he had not come out and given another stanza. Miss Pearl Scott accompanied in her usual faultless manner. It can be truly said that a more enjoyable evening has been rarely spent at the opera house, and Miss Scriber can well be proud of her complete success.
