FOUND FLOATING IN THE RIVER.

The Body of a Man Supposed to Be B. Nolan Furnishes Another Subject for the Coroner.

As H. Haggeman, a driver for the O. T. Company, was crossing the river from his home in East Portland yesterday morning, he detected an object floating in the middle of the river that looked as if it might be the body of a man. On rowing up to it, he found that his suspicions were right. It was the body of a man floating with the face downward, and from appearances, it must have been in the water a week, or perhaps longer.

Haggeman fastened the remains to his rowboat and towed them across to the foot of F street, where the body was tied to the dock by a pile-driver named John Stanfield. A police officer was apprised of the discovery, and he notified the coroner, who had the remains taken to the morgue.

Nothing was found on the pocket of the drowned man except a paper knife, a 5-cent piece and a pawn ticket issued to B. Nolan by J. Landigan, showing that \$4.75 had been advanced on a watch on the 13th of October.

An inquest was held on the body last evening, but no additional facts tending to throw any light on the question of identity of the man, or the cause of death, were elicited. Dr. Surman examined the body and found no marks of violence, so it was decided that the remains were those of B. Nolan, and that the cause of death was drowning, but whether accidental or suicidal could not be determined.

The body will be buried at the county's expense to-day.—Oregonian.
