MOONLIGHT WEDDING.—The most romantic wedding that has ever been recorded in the history of Salem took place Saturday evening, about 8 o'clock in the open street near the northwest corner of the court house square. The principals of the romance were F. W. Hunaker, of McMinnville, and Mrs. Lulu W. Martin, who was granted a divorce from James Martin at the circuit court. From some cause she married Mr. Martin three years ago though Mr. Hunaker was the man she loved. Her parents favored her marrying Martin in preference to Hunaker, so she yielded to the wish of her parents rather than her own love. The ceremony was performed by Justice M. E. Goodell in the presence of two witnesses and was solemnly pronounced under the glare of the electric light.

STILL THEY BLAST.—The work of blasting off the top of the pier that was have been for a bridge over the Willamette at this place is slowly but definitely being carried on. It will soon be down to the level of the old stub of the cylinder pier which yet remains as a remnant of the first bridge. The attraction is growing less and the indignation and contempt stronger every day. The few who now go down to the old wreck soon become disgusted with such a plan for a bridge. The contempt and derision uttered by the business men and those who stop for a moment on the bank of the river is enough to discourage the workmen who are paid to tear it down. What developments will yet appear can only be conjectured.

MORE MISCHIEF.—The mischief workers were out again Friday night and went through their program without molestation. There is no complaint made except by persons whose gates have been torn off and some of these complain to the JOURNAL because police supervision has not over-ridden the perpetrators. Another complaint comes that a band of small boys toward the north end of Commercial street are in the habit of throwing beans at passing ladies, knocking on neighbors' doors and otherwise working great annoyance. Parents should watch these latter and keep them in doors or make them behave themselves.

ALMOST DESTITUTE.—The family of N. O. Hickel, tenants in the old Mansion house on Liberty street are reported in destitute circumstances. The father is a laborer who was engaged on the bridge, but he has not had steady work. Two small children have died of scarlet fever, and now the mother is reported sick. Some claim the disease is diphtheria. A reporter of the JOURNAL visited the premises and believes there is an opportunity for some of our benevolent people, if they have not already embraced it.

A SELECT READING.—Miss Jennie M. Long, formerly of this city, but now of Portland, is booked to give one of her select readings in the Masonic Temple in that city Tuesday evening, Nov. 4, under the auspices of the King's Daughters of Trinity parish. The reading is given in the aid of the Good Samaritan hospital. The people of the metropolis may expect a literary treat.

FULL OF PEOPLE.—Saturday seems to have been an unusually bustling business day. Notwithstanding her wide streets and broad sidewalks, there was hardly room for the numerous vehicles and pedestrians to pass each other on the streets and walks of Salem. The number of strangers did not seem to be unusual, though several strange countenances were among the number who were keeping the merchants busy. Some of the Eastern men, who have heard so much about the rain in this state, were heard to inquire if this was that rainy Oregon where the sun was not seen for a whole six months. On being informed that this was certainly the place, he was heard to say to himself, "This is the place for me." Many persons are now flitting out that the Willamette valley is a favored land. Soon such days as last Saturday seems to have been will be an everyday affair. Salem will be full of people every day.

WHY IS IT SO?—It was noticed yesterday, and the same occurrence has frequently happened before, that a freight car is allowed to stand across the side walk at the intersection of Trade and Commercial streets. This is quite annoying to persons passing in their best clothes to be compelled to go around in the mud to get past a car that could as well stand a few yards to one side or the other. It is not known who is to blame for this offense, but certainly those who leave the cars there should have some respect for the rights of those who may chance to pass, or rather desire to pass, on the walk. Everyone appreciates the convenience and benefit of having a railroad to the city, and we want more of them, but even our greatest blessings may be converted into annoyances. There is little necessity of any thoroughfare being blocked up half the time, and especially on Sunday when there is a heavy travel.

TWO DEATHS.—The friends of Mr. and Mrs. Hickell will be grieved to learn of the death of their two little daughters. The youngest, a baby two weeks old, died Saturday and was buried Sunday. On Saturday last May, aged three, complained of feeling unwell and Sunday night she also died. The funeral occurred this afternoon and the remains were taken to the Odd Fellows' cemetery. Mr. Hickell and family came to Salem from Denver, Colorado, last June, and he has been working on the bridge since that time. They have been staying at the Mansion house in North Salem. The death of the two children of scarlet fever is especially painful as they were the only children.

MORNING IN KINDERGARTEN.

How the Budding Generation is Deftly Educated in the Beginnings of Knowledge.
 Tacoma Globe: Miss Ione Dunlap is in charge of the Tacoma kindergarten, and she has some twenty-five little pupils who study and learn all the forenoon under the most delightful conditions, and without realizing that studying and learning are anything else than play.

A kindergarten is the only place on earth where any considerable number of healthy children between the lively ages of three and a half to six years may be seen in a state of absolute peace, quiet and unbroken enjoyment for any considerable period of time. It would probably be a revelation to a good many mothers who are kept on the rack from morning till night with one, two or three little youngsters to see how Miss Dunlap gets along with a score or more of them with ease and facility. Unfortunately no practical moral for the relief of a good many over-worked mothers is to be drawn from the interesting exhibition, so far as any lesson is taught of how to do it by leaving the children to themselves, for Miss Dunlap is very closely occupied herself for the three hours of the forenoon in keeping the children interestedly occupied for the same period. Still this phase of the exhibition is extremely interesting and instructive as a spectacle of the accomplishment of an apparent impossibility.

Military rule and routine govern the kindergarten, although the children don't know it. There is a regular program for every day, the variations of which are made and limited to the minute. But there are so many variations, and each of them has a constantly new interest, that nothing could be farther from the childish idea than that it is being ruled by the strictest regime, so gently and deftly is it applied. The kindergarten system utilizes the most prominent "bumps" of the childish mind, imagination, curiosity, imitation, affection, and love of novelty; and aims to train these in such directions as to round and develop systematically the budding character of the future men and women. A course in the kindergarten may be pursued to what may be considered the "finished" stage of two years. It may still be of great advantage to the child if it is not so long as that, and it may be extended to two or three years. Indeed, Froebel, whose study and enthusiasm have developed the kindergarten to its present state of elaborate perfection, maintains that the world and the people in it would be a great deal better off if the teachings and principles of the kindergarten were pursued all through life. The unity and harmony of everything in life is its essential philosophy; the cultivation of the powers of observation and broad development of mind and body are the chief objects that it seeks to attain.
