OREGON. Marshfield is to have electric lights. The street cars run to both depots at Corvallis now.

Jacob Helm is putting up five tons of saw kraut at Cornelius. The S. P. R. R. has now all steel rails between Portland and Astland.

A citizen of East Portland has an old almanac published in Oregon City in 1848.

R. E. Case, one of the proprietors of the Oregon hotel, Portland, was arrested Friday for stealing \$88.75.

The Benton County Prison company have contracted for 18,000 pine trees to be delivered by Dec. 15.

A brass band with over twenty members, has been organized at the Oregon Agricultural College.

\$5000 was left from the Admission Day fund which will be divided among the orphan asylums of Sa. Francisco.

Hallowe'en was not celebrated in Eugene this year. The officers made it too lively for the boys last year.—Guard.
