A WORTHY OFFER.—Hon. T. McF. Patton has kindly offered two prizes to the pupils of the public schools in this city for excellence in examinations. The awarding will be made for correctness of answers, orthography, neatness and general arrangement of the papers. The Commission Stands by the People.

VERDICT IN THE LAKISH WRECK CASE.

The Derailment Theory Not Sustained—A Rotten Bridge.

(From JOURNAL Extra Edition, 17 p. m., November 21.)

REPORT OF COMMISSION.
In the matter of the wreck at Lake Labish, upon full investigation of the above matter it was found that two reasons were assigned for the wreck to wit:

1. That a rail had been removed from the track by parties unknown.
2. That the weakness of the structure and the age of the trestle was the cause.

The commission dismisses the first theory.
They decide no satisfactory evidence of the first contention and it is dismissed without comment.

On the second reason they find a preponderance of evidence shows that the train went upon the trestle at 8:15 p. m. at the rate of twenty miles per hour.

That the brakes were suddenly and firmly applied which caused the structure to give way 600 feet from the North approach, throwing down the entire structure.

That the structure was faulty in the following particulars:
The bents, considering the nature of the ground, it being boggy and spongy, were too far apart.

The ties were too widely spaced.
The guard-rails were in a state of decay and but few of them properly fastened.

They were so frail as to afford no safeguard.
That much of the timber in the bents, especially the caps and sills, had more or less decayed.

That the bents were not securely away-braced.
That some of the piles supporting the bents were unsound.

That many of the stringer bolts had been allowed to become loosened.
Therefore, for these reasons the structure was found not to have been sufficiently strong to sustain the weight and impact of moving trains under such conditions as present themselves on any road and at any time.

The commission will notify the railway company that the entire trestle must be rebuilt at once.

SOCIAL DOINGS

Receptions—Dances and Literary Circles—The Week's Work in Society Quiet.

MRS. RAMBORGER-HAMMILL.
One of the victims of the Lake Labish disaster who is at The Willamette hotel is Mrs. Dr. Hammill, of Philadelphia. Mrs. Hammill is not only the wife of a physician, but is herself a doctor of dental surgery of high standing in her native city, Philadelphia, and is well known to the profession not only in this country but also in Europe. Mrs. Dr. Hammill has the honor of being the first woman to receive the degree of "Doctor of Dental Surgery" in America, and is considered the pioneer lady in the profession. The Illustrated Sidney News, under date of June 7, 1890, has the following to say of this eminent woman: "When at the age of 15 Miss Annie Ramborger decided to adopt this profession, she found herself surrounded with difficulties, among the greatest being that she was penniless. An uncle, however, generously enabled her to complete her course. She literally learned her way through what she termed 'a howling wilderness of men.' At the Pennsylvania College of Dental Surgery her application was received with hesitation, but she was allowed to pay her matriculation fee. Her earliest and most implacable enemies were her fellow students. They declared—first, she would cause them to cease smoking; second, she being a woman and attending the lectures with them she would deprive them of the full explanation of the human organism. She overcame all objection by saying 'science knows no sex' and went on with her studies. The students prepared a petition asking that she be expelled. She drew up a counter petition, which had as many signatures as her opponents'. The faculty weighed the matter and expelled her, whereupon she appealed to the board of trustees, and the battle was thrown into court. There she received justice, Judge Kerle deciding that if she were not allowed to pursue her studies the college would be closed by order of the court.' The decision of the court settled the question and she finished her course under varied trials. At the age of 19 she passed her final and rigid examination and stood second in a class of thirty-four. An attempt was made to withhold her diploma until she was 21, but she overcame this and graduated with the highest honors. She immediately opened an office in Philadelphia and soon surrounded herself with innumerable friends and a growing practice which was bringing her in the handsome salary of \$5000 a year. Among her patrons were Postmaster General Wainwright's family. A little more than a year ago she was married to Dr. Hammill, of Philadelphia, and on the same day they sailed for Europe and since that time have been making a tour of the world. They visited nearly all the countries of Europe and spent some time in Australia. They arrived in San Francisco about two weeks ago on the steamer Zealandia from Sydney, and sailed from there to Portland, and were on their way to Southern California to spend the winter, but were delayed by the fatal disaster of Lake Labish on Nov. 12. Mrs. Hammill is a very pleasant lady, but is badly injured in the spine. She expects to get satisfaction from the railroad company before leaving.

POP CORN SOCIABLE.
A number of the young people of the city met at the W. C. T. U. rooms on Court street last evening and enjoyed two hours in a very pleasant manner. A short program was rendered, consisting of instrumental and vocal music and recitations. After the program was concluded eating pop corn and pulling candy were the order, and were very enjoyed. The ladies have very comfortable quarters in their new rooms in the building just east of the Unitarian hall, on Court street. In their reading room is a very good library of books, besides some good periodicals.

CHURCH SOCIABLE.
A sociable for the children especially, was given at the Congregational church last evening. Games, plays and other amusements were indulged in, to the content of all who were present. A short program was rendered, of which the most attractive part was a vocal solo, by Mrs. J. H. Strickler; a recitation, by Miss Mae Boase and a solo by Miss Elith Harris. An abundance of pop corn was disposed of, and in an excellent style.

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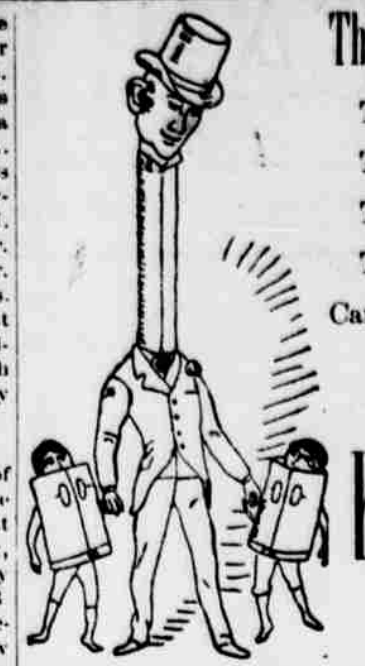
