CRIMINAL.

A DESPERADO'S SENTENCE.
SEATTLE, Nov. 22.—The Seattle Telegraph says: James Cleary, alias Frank Logan, alias John Logan, a notorious desperado, was yesterday sentenced by Judge Humes to 12 years in the penitentiary at Walla Walla. Logan, for that was the name under which he was committed, was brought up for trial on two charges, one for robbery and the other for assault with intent to commit robbery. He is the man who about three weeks ago attempted to hold up "Uncle Harris" at south Eleventh street and Yester avenue, and when the victim showed fight, knocked him down and beat him so badly that he was confined to his bed for several days. The same evening Logan held up John Oliver on south Ninth street.

Cleary, alias Logan, is no stranger to the police of this and other cities, and although only 24 years of age he has already served two terms in prison for felony. He was born in California. On February 12, 1885, he was convicted of petty larceny and sent to prison as Frank Logan. On December 12, 1885, he was convicted of burglary in the second degree and sent to the Folsom state prison for five years, and afterward transferred to San Quentin. He was discharged as James Cleary on July 16, 1890. Paddy Norton, who was with Logan when he robbed Oliver, was arrested by Detective Willard shortly after the arrest of Logan and taken before Judge Rivers, who ordered him to leave the city. Since then Norton has been away.

A JAIL DELIVERY THWARTED.
SEATTLE, Nov. 22.—A cleverly laid scheme at the county jail delivery was thwarted yesterday morning about 10 o'clock by jailer Farrar. It was such a one as would doubtless have led to a general delivery last night, and in any event four of the very worst criminals in the county jail would have escaped. The four in question are William Gleason, William Mooney, Thomas Farrell and John Morris.

Two or three days ago jailer Farrar, while in the jail, thought he could see the door created by the crumbling of dry lime or mortar. His suspicions were at once aroused and he came to the conclusion that the prisoners were planning an escape by trying to dig through the wall. He reasoned that unless the men could be caught in the act it would be next to impossible to get their tools. So Farrar watched his chances and once or twice a day would quietly slip down into the jail for the purpose of catching the men at work. However, he could not, but noticed suspicious movements of the prisoners in the south corridor of the jail, where the long-term prisoners are kept. This was particularly noticeable with regard to the actions of the persons occupying the two cells nearest to the east end of the jail.

Yesterday morning about 10 o'clock Farrar determined to raid the jail suddenly and if possible catch the men at their work. Accompanied by Sheriff Wells and Jones, quietly slipped down into the jail. They hurriedly unlocked the doors and rushed back to the two cells adjoining the east wall of the jail. Mooney and Gleason emerged from the cell next to the wall as the corridor door was unlocked. The officers rushed in and discovered a miscellaneous lot of nicely constructed tools scattered about the cell floor. Removing the bed clothing the work of the prisoner was laid bare. The east wall of the jail is of stone and brick. The thickness of the brick wall, which is on the inside, is about eight inches, and the outer stone wall about 18 inches thick.

With the tools at hand the prisoner had dug out the brick wall and pried every speck of mortar from around a huge rock the full thickness of the wall and no less than two feet in length. There was nothing left to hold it in place. All the prisoners would have had to do would be to shove out this stone. The aperture thus left by the displacement of the stone would have been large enough for two prisoners to have crawled through.

There is hardly a doubt had the jail not been searched yesterday but that at least three prisoners would have escaped last night. Doubtless others, if not a general delivery, would have escaped, for it is probable the prisoners could have unlocked the cell doors by some means.

Probably no more desperate men were ever confined in the county jail than Gleason, Mooney, Farrell and Morris.

MISCELLANY.

THE INDIAN SCARE—NO ALARM AT PORT LINCOLN.

MANDAN, N. D., Nov. 22.—Sheriff Burgenheimer this morning received a telegram from Simstown, stating that people were coming in from the Muddy and Heart rivers, having been warned by the Sioux Indians to look out for themselves. Sheriff has shipped forty guns to Simstown and Hebron. Captain Halloran, commanding officer at Fort Abraham Lincoln, maintains that there are no grounds for alarm.

AN HONEST MAN TO RESIGN.
BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 22.—Hon. Frederick L. Ames was seen upon the reported re-organization of the Union Pacific system. He admitted that it was true Adams was to resign. His successor has not been definitely named yet. Adams will also resign from the directory, leaving two vacancies which will be filled by election by Gould and Russell Sage.

MURDERED BY THE INDIANS.
PIERRE, S. Dakota, Nov. 22.—A telegram from Gettysburg states that seven persons have been killed by the Indians near Lebeau, and asks for the militia. No one here credits the report.

ALL IS QUIET.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 22.—Acting Commr. Belt received the following telegram from Agent Dixon: "Indians at Cow Creek and Lower Brule are under good control."

THE GOVERNMENT TO UNDERTAKE TO SUPPRESS THE GHOST DANCE.
OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 22.—A special to the Bee from Pine Ridge agency says: Two of the most reliable scouts in the government employ reported to General Brooke last night that 150 legions of Wounded Knee families, including some of the most desperate and treacherous redskins in this part of the country, have moved to White River, some twenty miles north of here and again begun the ghost dance. The dangerous work of bringing disturbances to time will begin Monday morning.

General Brooke received information from the war department and will certainly insist upon the suppression of the ghost dance at all hazards. Both commandant and agent are greatly chagrined and settled at learning last night that another lot of some 300 Redbud warriors had put in their appearance as if they had risen out of the earth, only 12 miles northwest of here and were preparing to establish a ghost dance. They have Winchester and they are loaded down with ammunition.

PETER JACKSON IN POOR CONDITION.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 22.—The steamer Alameda from Sidney brings the news that Peter Jackson and Joe Goddard fought an eight rounds draw at Melbourne Oct. 20th. Jackson was in poor condition.

RAILROAD MONOPOLIES AT WORK.
CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—The freight department of the Transcontinental association have decided to advance all the rates on the Pacific coast business. The high rates beginning Dec. 1st, 1890.

A CONTINUED BANK RUN.
NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 22.—The run on the Citizens Savings bank continued this morning. The bank officials say the run will be broken today. Payments made amount to nearly \$300,000.

ORIENTAL CAR WORKS FAILS.
CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 22.—The United States Rolling stock company was placed in the hands of a receiver today. Liabilities \$3,816,000; assets \$6,053,000. The failure was precipitated by slow collections and depression in the money market. This company is the largest builder of railway cars in the world. The company employs 2,200 men. Its cash payments to employees and for material, amount to \$600,000 monthly. Judge Blodgett of Federal court appointed A. Hegewich receiver. Hegewich is president of the works, and the judge was ordered the receiver to continue the works.
