MARKETS.

MISCELLANY.

THE REAL ESTATE LITIGATION. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25.—The suit of the A. A. Commercial company was transferred from the superior court to the United States circuit court. The suit is brought to recover \$100,000, the value of 4158 sealings, alleged to be appropriated by the defendants. The North American Commercial company succeeded the Alaska Commercial company in the lease of the seal islands from the United States and took possession this season. The plaintiffs allege that the sealings in question were on the island from last year and the defendants had no right to them.

ACQUITTED. WHATCOMB, Wash., Nov. 25.—The Gary sisters, who were arrested here and tried for passing counterfeit money, were acquitted yesterday. They immediately left for Portland.

WAS ONCE A RICH MERCHANT. SEATTLE, Nov. 25.—The Telegraph says: The first Hebrew ever known to serve in the chain gang in this city is now doing service with the twenty or thirty other unfortunates in charge of Captain John Kelley. His name is Gustave Leon and he is serving a thirty day's sentence for vagrancy. Leon is about 40 years of age. He has a brother, a business man of this city, a painter and glazier, doing business on West street.

Leon has seen better days. In fact, he claims to have been a wealthy merchant at one time in one of the leading towns of Southern Texas. He says he was at one time worth \$50,000 having accumulated that sum in the dry hide business. Fortune's reverses reduced him to his present pitiable condition. The authorities think Leon is somewhat impaired in his mind.

INDIANS MUST STAY OUT OF CANADA. WINNIPEG, B. C., Nov. 25.—Private information received from the Dominion capital is to the effect that military forces here are ordered to be in readiness to proceed to the international boundary, to prevent any American Indians from crossing into British territory or invading British India to join the uprising.

ENDOWS BOOTH. NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Rev. Dr. McGlynn in his lecture to the Anti-Poverty Society in Cooper's institute last Sunday evening, discussed Gen. Booth's "In Darkest England" and his plan for the reformation and relief of the poverty-stricken and sin-stained people of London. Booth's estimate is that they constitute one-tenth of the population, and he proposes to relieve them by the judicious expenditure of money in bettering their condition. Dr. McGlynn said he approved most heartily of Booth's work and hoped he will succeed. Some of the Catholic bishops in England, he said, were enjoying incomes which should be devoted to this work.

TACOMA'S NEW COUNCIL. TACOMA, Nov. 25.—The city council at its meeting started to fulfill party pledges 16 of the police, force being disposed, among them. Inspector Todd and Capt. McKay, popular men, who had been retained by Dillon and who are recognized as good officers. A new set of fire captains has also been appointed. The committee on finances reported fixing the annual salaries as follows:

Mayor, \$3000; members of council, \$800 each; city controller, \$3000; city treasurer, \$4000; city attorney, \$2500; police judge, \$2000; members of the board of public works, \$2400, each; city physician, \$2000; chief of police, \$2000; chief of fire department, \$2000; harbor master, \$1200; health officer, \$1200. The report was laid over until the next meeting. The rules to govern the council were presented and referred to the judiciary committee. Saturday afternoon of each week is the fixed time for regular meetings. Ex-Mayor Rice and the ex-councilmen presented a paper certifying that on the 25th of October, the council by resolution had, through a purchasing committee, contracted to purchase a certain real estate for park purposes on South Sixth street, between Yakima avenue and I street. It was placed on file. The office of police clerk was created and the salary fixed at \$1000 per year.

A MYSTERIOUS DEATH. MAY'S LANDING, Nov. 25.—Ten or twelve days ago, G. W. Fay, who is a well known druggist of Hamilton, N. J., was found to be afflicted with an abscess of the brain, complicated later on with dropsy, and Tuesday night he was pronounced dead by attending physicians. At the time of his death his limbs were terribly swollen and his face was much discolored. Thursday morning members of his family were surprised to find the swelling had entirely disappeared and a healthy look had come back in his

face. It was a strange manifestation, but on that day, as no other signs of life appeared, his family was induced to have the funeral take place and the body was taken to the cemetery for interment. The funeral sermon was preached and the final arrangements were all completed. When the coffin was opened, the face of the dead man was so life-like that the family refused to allow the burial to take place, and insisted that the body be taken back to the house again. This was accordingly done, and now the family is awaiting further developments.

REPROBATE WITNESS FINED. CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 25.—In the case of Chas. Connellman, the howl of the grain firm of that name, who refused to answer the questions of the National grand jury in regard to the alleged receipt of rebates and cut rates from Western railroads, Judge Blodgett in the Federal court this morning rendered the decision that Connellman must answer. He was taken before the grand jury again, and again refused to answer. His release under a writ of habeas corpus and if refused will appeal to the supreme court of the United States. The point involved is of the utmost moment as, if witnesses cannot be compelled to testify the interstate commerce law will become practically a dead letter.

WILLING FOR THE PEOPLE TO DECIDE. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 25.—Something of a sensation was created in political circles yesterday morning, by the publication of a letter from William Fishback, at Fort Smith, addressed to United States Senator James K. Jones, in which the writer makes a novel proposition. He says, as they both desire to go to the United States senate, and as there is a growing sentiment all over the country that the people should have a voice in the election of their senators, he proposes that they agree to leave the choice between them to the people of the state, and that they join in the request to the chairman of the state central committee to appoint a date upon which the democrats of the state shall hold primary elections and indicate by their votes which one of them is their choice. Senator Jones is in Washington. His friends are generally opposed to the proposition.

FINANCIAL. THE HOP MARKET. PUYALLUP, Wn., Nov. 25.—The following record of sales last week is from the Commerce. It shows the prices being paid: Monday George Rose and Herman Klaber bought the balance of A. Spooner's crop, 68 bales, choice, at 30 cents. Wyckoff & Kennedy sold 35 bales Monday, to George Rose, extra choice, at 31 cents. Saturday Herman Klaber representing the Uhlman's had orders to buy about 300 bales, but the order was countermanded Tuesday morning.

At the Puyallup depot Monday a Seattle lawyer slid in a dozen bales of off-color but fair hops, and offered them to the highest bidder. Herman Klaber took them at 15 cents. Tuesday Knox & McGowan bought 70 bales choice from Ed Young at 32 cents. Same day the Puget Sound brewery bought five tons from H. P. Oliver at 32 cents.

WALL STREET FAILURE. WALL STREET, Nov. 25.—The suspension of J. C. Waldron has just been announced in the stock exchange.

ANOTHER. MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 25.—T. S. Allen & Co., one of the oldest cotton factor firms in the South, has failed. The announcement caused a great sensation. The firm claims to be able to pay dollar for dollar.

FAIL FOR A MILLION. NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 25.—Richard S. Allen & Co., bankers and commission merchants, made an assignment. Liabilities one million.

SAVINGS BANK IN TROUBLE. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25.—Judge Murphy to-day issued a temporary order restraining the Dime savings bank from continuing business and appointed A. L. Guttererson receiver. The bank commissioners allege the bank has violated the provisions of its charter and ask that the charter be revoked.

STATE.

OREGON IMPROVEMENT COMPANY IN THE HANDS OF A RECEIVER. PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 25.—In the United States District Court this morning a decree was granted, appointing Joseph Simon, of this city, receiver of the Oregon Improvement company. The bonds were fixed at one hundred thousand dollars.

THE CAUSE OF THE APPOINTMENT OF A RECEIVER. PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 25.—In the United States circuit court this morning Elijah Smith and Prosper W. Smith, of New York, through their attorneys, made an application for the appointment of a receiver of the Oregon Improvement company, organized under the laws of Oregon. The application sets forth that in order to secure the credit of the company under the present financial

situation it is necessary that a receiver should be appointed. TOO MUCH WASHINGTON SPECULATION. PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 25.—Owing to the condition of the money market it is impossible for the Oregon Improvement company to renew loans. For the past year the company has been engaged in the purchase and development of railroad lines in Washington, causing a large outlay of money. The liabilities of the company are about two million dollars.

FOREIGN.

THINKS IT BEST TO RESIGN. LONDON, Nov. 25.—Parnell informed several members of the National Liberals yesterday of his intention to resign. There was a private conference in the afternoon between Parnell, Davitt and other Irish leaders, at which it is understood, that the consensus of opinion was the controversy over the divorce would cause a split between the Liberals and Nationalists. Upon this decision being reached, Parnell, it is stated, resolved to resign in order to prevent his personality being the cause of danger to the prospects of Ireland. It is not expected this outcome of the affair will satisfy Irish public feeling, but it is considered by nearly all the Irish and liberal leaders to be the best solution of the difficulty from a political point of view.

PARNELL WILL NOT RETIRE. DUBLIN, Ireland, Nov. 25.—Freeman's Journal says that the report that Parnell is to retire is absolutely without foundation. The Express states that Gladstone hinted to Parnell that it would be better for the cause if he did not attend the coming session of parliament. Parnell's friends say they will not allow him to absent himself.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 25.—At a meeting of the Irish Home Rule members of parliament to-day, Parnell was unanimously re-elected chairman of the Irish parliamentary party. It is announced that Parnell will retain the leadership at the express desire of his followers.

REALIZING OF THE QUEEN'S SPEECH. LONDON, Eng., Nov. 25.—Immediately after the commons was called to order to-day the queen's speech was read.

A MOST HORRIBLE PRACTICE. VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 25.—A reporter saw several Chinese digging the corpse of a Chinaman out of the cemetery. One of the crowd took a knife and stripped the flesh off of the bones of the cadaver. The bones were put into a box and the flesh tumbled back into the grave. The corpse was that of a man who died about three weeks ago. The terrible smell around the cemetery, complained of lately, was thereby accounted for. The whole matter was published in the papers here and created great disgust and horror. It is said by the authorities that the Chinamen cannot be proceeded against as they got a permit from the government to exhume the bodies.

RAILROAD MATTERS.

Is the East Side Road to be a Transcontinental Line.

It is now stated on good authority that the Oregonian railways, formerly known as the East and West side narrow gauge, which were some time since bought by C. P. Huntington have been sold by him to the Southern Pacific. It has been considered, says the Oregonian, as a foregone conclusion, ever since the Southern Pacific acquired the Oregon & California lines, that the narrow gauge would be absorbed into its system, but when Mr. Huntington purchased them and it was understood that there was a disagreement between the Huntington and Stanford faction, and it was given out that Huntington would change the narrow gauge roads to standard gauge and extend the East side line from Silverton to Portland and from Coquille across the Cascades and southeastern Oregon to connection with a transcontinental line, it was supposed that the Oregonian system and the Southern Pacific would remain separate. In railroad matters, as in other things, it is always the improbable which happens, and some arrangement has been affected by which the Oregonian lines have passed to the Southern Pacific. What effect this may have on the extension of the East side is unknown. The track from Woodburn to Coquille is being made Standard-gauge, and the rails are secured to take the place of the light ones now on the line. The Southern extension is graded to Springfield, where it is only separated from the Southern Pacific by the Willamette river, and the track from Coquille to Springfield will be laid with sixty-pound steel rails, but whether the road will be extended from Springfield over the Cascades or not remains to be seen. The extension from Silverton into Portland has been surveyed, and a great deal of time spent in securing a good route and right-of-way, but work on that end of it, which was to have been built this fall, and used as a suburban railway, has not been commenced. Whether the Southern Pacific, having connection with the Oregonian line at Woodburn, will deem it advisable to build a line from Silverton into Portland or not, is impossible to say.

The widening of the gauge between Woodburn and Coquille will be completed in a few weeks. Probably the sale of the Oregonian roads to the Southern will be a good thing for all concerned and there have been so many stranger things happening in railroad circles of late, that the sale will surprise scarcely anybody.—Albany Herald.
