MISCELLANY.

LATEST FROM THE INDIANS.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 28.—The war department has received numbers of dispatches from the west of the Indian trouble, all indicating an improvement in the situation. General Brooke says every hour lessens the strength of the disaffected. Little Wound has come in to the Pine Ridge agency, and his brother braves are following him. Short Bull, of the Rosebud agency, one of the most troublesome of the number of five hundred lodges, returned to Pine Ridge Tuesday.

OLD-TIME SCOUTS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—Buffalo Bill's eyes glowed with a fierce light as he thought of the immediate prospect of taking an active part in the campaign against the Indians of the Northwest. His reputation as a scout during former Indian troubles has led to his selection in a somewhat similar capacity, in the present strained situation, by Gen. Miles.
