PARAGRAPHS.

A FARM MACHINERY TRUST. CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 28.—The local papers say that threatening machine men of this country are forming a trust, known as a temporary organization, formed by representative men in that business, and that very soon articles of incorporation will be filed, covering a combine, with a capital stock of at least twenty million dollars.

IS PARNELL MAD?

His Case Repudiated by Gladstone and Morley.

ATTEMPT TO FORM AN ANTI-PARNELL FACTION.

The Home Rule Party Bent in Discard by Parnell's Action.

PARNELL'S MANIFESTO TO THE IRISH PEOPLE

was issued Nov. 28, and charges that the integrity and independence of the Irish parliamentary party has been sapped and destroyed by the wire pullers of the Liberal party in England. He declares that Gladstone and Morley claim the right to put a veto upon the Irish party's choice of its own leader in parliament, and that it would be fatal to Ireland's interests to concede this, and an abandonment of Parnell to his enemies. Parnell then proceeds to recite the history of his relations to Gladstone and the cause he now considers in peril.

GLADSTONE RESISTS PARNELL'S CHARGE OF BAD FAITH.

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 29.—Gladstone has issued a reply to the Parnell manifesto, in which he denies the statements made by the Irish leader, in regard to the retention of the Irish leader in the Imperial parliament for the settlement of the land, or agrarian difficulty in Ireland, the control of the Irish constabulary and appointment of judiciary in Ireland.

PARNELL'S VERSION DISPUTED.

Gladstone says he will not apply a single epithet to Parnell, not being his judge. He believes, however, that he showed by his course in the matter of the special commission appointed to investigate the charges made against Parnell, growing out of the Pigott letters, that he had no indisposition to do Parnell justice.

Gladstone and Morley both dispute Parnell's version of the negotiations between them in regard to Home Rule and other matters concerning Ireland and they will at an early date repudiate his statements. Sexton and Healy are taking the opinion of each Irish member of parliament, as to the advisability of organizing a movement for an alliance of the anti-parnellites with Gladstone.

TRUTH ATTACKS PARNELL.

In an interview to-day Henry Labouchere, M. P. and editor of the Truth, said it would be charitable to suppose Parnell mad. It was impossible to suppose that a man with any honor or patriotism would issue a manifesto so dishonoring to himself and so injurious to his country's cause.

GLADSTONE FAVORS INDEPENDENT ACTION.

In conclusion Gladstone says he always held both in public and private that the Nationalist party of Ireland ought to remain entirely independent of the Liberal party of Great Britain. For him to propose any measure except such as Ireland could approve, on lines already laid down, would be fatality as regards himself, and treachery to the Irish nation, in which, even by the side of Parnell, he can claim to take an interest.

A Battle in Court.

Justice Parkes' court Tuesday afternoon was the scene of a glory battle between J. L. Guilford and J. H. French, two well known and influential citizens of Unatilla county.

The case of J. L. Guilford vs. J. M. Hammer, a suit for the recovery of \$40 was on trial, and Mr. French was called on the stand as a witness by the counsel for the plaintiff, J. C. Leasure.

"You are interested in this case, are you not?" was asked.

"Yes."

"You have employed counsel to defend this action?"

"Yes."

"That is all."

The defendant's attorney, W. M. Ramsey, then asked the question, "why are you interested?"

"Because the defendant is an honest old man," was the answer, "and I believe the plaintiff to be dishonest."

Mr. Guilford sat silent and unmoved, and when called to the stand answered with composure the questions put to him; but when court adjourned he approached Mr. French and asked:

"What authority have you to call me dishonest?"

"Your neighbors say so."

"You're a d—n liar."

"Smack!" went French's hand on Guilford's cheek, and the two old gentlemen went at it hammer and tongs. The floor was soon strewn with a wreck of overturned chairs, tables and spittoons, and the walls were bespattered with the blood of each combatant. They were separated, however, by Constable Peck before either sustained any injury beyond the pale of amica and sticking-plaster. "Honors were even."

The democratic convention was called to order by the chairman, Dr. T. L. Golden, with Geo. B. Gray acting as secretary. The following delegates were present:

First ward—P. H. D'Arcy, by F. J. Smith; John Gray, D. J. Fry, Dr. Jeffries, C. A. Chapman.

Second ward—Dr. Golden, M. H. Rowley, W. J. Polly, Ed. McAfee.

Third ward—Geo. B. Gray, I. F. Burt, C. H. Humphrey, G. G. Van Wagner.

Fourth ward—A. N. Bush, by John Whitley; T. B. Walt, J. Neville.

P. H. D'Arcy was unanimously nominated for city mayor. John Chase, John O'Shea and Chas. A. Gray were nominated for city recorder. The first ballot stood, Chase, 8; Gray, 8; O'Shea, 1. The second ballot was: Chase, 8; Gray, 5; and O'Shea, 2. Chase was declared the nominee. Hugh Thompson was made the unanimous choice for city treasurer. W. D. Mohney was elected by acclamation as the candidate for marshal. John Gray was elected chairman of the democratic city central committee.
