THE EXAMINATION.—The examining board have completed the work of looking over the papers of those who sought teachers' certificates at the recent examination. Of those applying, nine received first grade certificates; ten, second grade; nine, third grade, and only one failed to secure the requisite standing to be entitled to teach in the public schools. The public examinations for teachers in Oregon are now properly becoming a thorough test of the abilities of those desiring to teach. For many years the examinations in this state were much lighter than in California or Washington, and the tendency was strongly in favor of poor teachers. The natural result would be to drive the competent teachers to those states where better wages were paid. Those easy times for teachers to obtain certificates are happily past, and with a better grade of certificates better wages are paid to teachers.

JIM COLEMAN'S VOTE.—"Crazy Jim," the Chinaman, concluded that he wanted to be all "samie Melician man" yesterday and went over to the polls and asked to vote. A young man standing outside told him he could vote for 25 cents which he willingly paid. He then marched into the polls and told the Judge that he paid "two bitty" and that he wanted to vote. After sporting with him for a while on the supposition that it cost five dollars to vote in Salem he was told to go. Upon this being dealt with he became very angry and went out and demanded his 25 cents from the first man he met, but this man being wholly unacquainted with the circumstances was surprised at such a strong proceeding. When the boys had all the fun out of him they cared for he was given his money and he left the polls thoroughly disgusted with American politics.

Hendricks, of the Statesman, is captain of the Fossil company. "Ham" Hendricks is well known in Salem where he lived for several years. He was at one time city editor of the Statesman when Gen. W. H. Myers managed that paper.

Dearborn's bid was \$1,310.75 and Patton's \$1,495.05. SALEM'S MAYOR.

From a Printer's Boy to the Mayorship of the Capital City of Oregon.

Peter H. D'Arcy, the mayor elect has a personal history that is worthy of being an example for ambitious boys. It clearly shows that integrity sustained by honesty of purpose will be crowned with success.

The subject of this sketch was born in Brooklyn, N. Y., and when but two years old came with his parents to San Francisco, and after living there two years they removed to Portland and remained there but a short time when they came to Salem in 1859, and when this city was scarcely a town and Oregon itself was in its infancy, and P. H. D'Arcy had scarcely of school age.

His parents were not wealthy at that time and the war times of the sixties and for some time following the civil war, times were hard in the new state of Oregon, and young D'Arcy, ambitious to obtain an education, was subject to some trials, but not being afraid of work he overcame these difficulties by attending school during the day and working papers in a newspaper office at night. He there also learned the art of printing and increased his earnings by setting type at night after he had spent the day in the school room as a student. He was educated at the Willamette university, and then studied law with Boise, Willis and Stratton in this city, and was admitted to the bar in Dec. 1876 in a class which was composed as follows: P. H. D'Arcy, Judge R. S. Bean, J. R. Bryson, W. R. Blyen, T. H. Crawford, Judge L. B. Stearns, Chas. Hewitt and Luther B. Ison. Since he was admitted to the bar his labors and the practice of his chosen profession have been in this city. He has seen Salem grow from a country village to a prosperous city of twelve thousand inhabitants, and he is not a stranger to the needs of the city.

NEW DIRECTORS.—At the last meeting of the stockholders of the Capital City Railroad Company directors and officers were elected for the next year. P. S. Knight, M. L. Chamberlin, T. H. Wilson, David Simpson, O. E. Krause, G. W. Webb and Geo. B. Gray were chosen directors. David Simpson was elected president, T. H. Wilson secretary and Ladd & Bush treasurer. Chas. E. Robinson was elected manager. Mr. Robinson is a practical motor man, having had five years' experience in conducting electric motor lines. He thoroughly understands the workings of the various complicated machinery of such an institution and his services are valuable to the company. The company are doing a good business on their line, and early in the spring will make some important extensions of their road.

A LIVE QUESTION.

The subject for discussion before the Alka-Hesperian society, on next Friday evening, will relate to the Farmers' Alliance. This is a subject of considerable moment in political circles, and one of immense importance to every member of the commonwealth. The main planks in the alliance platform as given in the "Forum" for November are: 1st. The free coinage of silver. 2d. The sub-treasury plan, or the building of warehouses wherein the farmers may deposit cotton, wheat, corn, oats or tobacco, receiving in return a treasury note for 80 per cent. of their value. These treasury notes are to be legal tender for debts and receivable for customs. 3rd. Government ownership of all railroads, telegraphs and telephones. 4th. The prohibition of gambling in stocks. 5th. The prohibition of alien ownership of land. 6th. The abolition of national banks. 6th. The amendment of the constitution so as to provide for the election of United States senators by the people. The society invites every one that is interested in these questions to be present, and gives them the privilege of the floor if they wish to take part in the debate.

The Enormity of Drunkenness.

A GRAND SCHEME.

A Two Million Gallon Reservoir to be Built on Fair Mount Park.

The Salem Water company have made arrangements with the people of Fair Mount Park, whereby the company will erect a reservoir, with a capacity of two millions of gallons to be supplied by a ten-inch main. This will assure a steady reservoir pressure, and much of the complaint of insufficient pressure will be abated.

Fair Mount Park is several hundred feet above the level of the city and a reservoir of that capacity will be a fine thing for the city. A short shut down of the pumps would not effect the water supply in the least. The company are undertaking a magnificent scheme, but nevertheless they expect to accomplish it during next summer. Early in the spring they expect to begin their work of improving the system, and before the summer is over, they will have expended \$50,000. Every nook and corner of the city will have a network of water pipes.

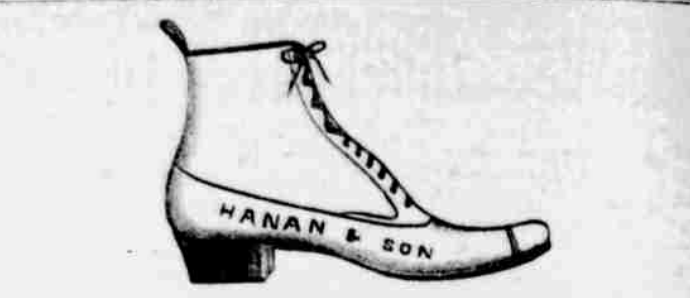
