ASSAULT WITH A SHOTGUN.—Burgess Rutledge was brought up from Clear Lake saw mill yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Wain, on a complaint sworn out by Jack Arland. The little episode took place last Saturday. Rutledge keeps a boarding house at the Clear Lake saw mill. Jack Arland has been here in the city for some time and has from all appearances been doing but very little. He has also put in some time about the mill and his stay has not been received very willingly among the neighbors, and especially by Mr. Rutledge, whose domestic felicity has been disturbed by Arland more than once. Saturday he approached Arland with a single-barreled, breech loading shotgun, but was prevented from doing anything rash by the bystanders. Arland had Rutledge arrested and he was brought to this city and given a hearing before Justice Goodell. He was bound over to appear to-morrow at one o'clock, with bonds fixed at \$100, which he furnished. Arland, the chief prosecuting witness was held in a like sum and being unable to furnish the same was committed to jail. The people of Clear Lake are in sympathy with Mr. Rutledge.

THE HEN PROBLEM.—Admiral Isbell of North Salem is the first to report on what he does to make his hens lay. He has about 50 hens—old enough to be layers and is getting about one dozen eggs a day. He feeds twice a day and gives them sour milk. He also gives bran in the milk once a day. He supplies lime and oyster shells in abundance. The latter can be had free gratis from nearly any restaurant. His hens have only a very small place to run in and would lay more if allowed more freedom. He has bought \$45 worth of feed since last April. The hens have paid for that, paid for themselves and have supplied the family of four with eggs and have eaten a great many. He carried a basket of 21 dozen eggs to market to-day that brought him \$6.30.

COUNTY TAXES.—Sheriff Croisan and his deputies are busy collecting taxes for the current year. The first payment of this year's taxes was made on the 14th of October and since that date \$10,000 have been paid up to Dec. 1st. For the first two days of this month \$2,500 were paid making in all something over \$13,000 paid to the sheriff of this year's taxes. The total amount to be collected is \$162,697.75. The collecting has hardly begun yet. By the first of January a large portion of the entire amount will be in the hands of the treasurer.

CITY COUNCIL.

The City Legislature Meets in Regular Session—A Light Attendance.

But few members of the council meeting met last night and but little work was transacted after the usual routine of reading the minutes and bills, the committee reported favorably on the petition of Wm. Bush, who claims his damage was done to his wagon by falling into an open ditch on the streets made by the water company. The committee recommended that the council pay the bill and that the same amount be deducted from the water company.

The committee to whom the matter of purchasing a hose cart for the Capital Engine Company reported that they had made an investigation assisted by the chief engineer of the fire department, and that they had made the necessary measurements and found that both the houses of the engine companies were too small for a hose cart to be stored in the rooms. The committee also suggested that in their opinion it was not advisable to change the buildings now used to give room for carts. They recommended that some repairs be made on the Capital hose cart and that it be used this winter. No further action was taken in regard to the matter.

J. H. Campbell, the contractor for construction of the Mill creek bridge, asked to be relieved from the contract owing to the place having been changed for the bridge. His release was allowed and bids were ordered invited. Campbell was allowed \$73.88 for material on the ground. The city surveyor was ordered to submit plans and specifications.

Mrs. A. A. Wheeler was granted permission to erect a woodshed on her property, 315 Commercial street.

W. N. Ladine asked for the remission of taxes on a certain mortgage held by him.

Before the council was called to order the question of the city bonds was brought up by Mayor Williams. He said the treasurer had asked that the bonds be turned over to the county that they might be sold. Councilman Hirsch said that he saw nothing wrong in the bonds being signed, but he thought it well to keep them in the hands of the city and that no interest be paid on them until they were actually sold and the money was received for them. Councilman Gray said if they were signed and turned over now to the county the city would have to pay interest on them from the time they were issued, which was in October and the buyer would only receive interest from the time the money was paid to the county. In that way the county would get several months interest on the money at the expense of the city. No action was taken in regard to the matter, nor was any order granted by the council for the mayor to sign them and turn them over to the county.

A special meeting was ordered for Thursday, to officially announce the result of the recent city election, and to do any other business that may need immediate attention from the council.

The council then adjourned, to meet at 7:30 p. m., Thursday evening.

The woolenmill store is having such a good trade in their home-made clothing that it is difficult to keep up their stock but so far they have been able to supply all customers. People appreciate that kind of goods.

HIGH LICENSE FOR LEBANON.—At a late meeting of the city council of Lebanon the saloon license was raised to \$1000 per year. One saloon has already been closed as a result, and it is understood that another will close as soon as its license expires. This will leave only one saloon, which will do a thriving business. A law and order club has been organized to see that the ordinance is enforced.—Albany Herald.

DOG SALMON.—Salmon were going to the valley last week, caught up near Elk City, that looked as though they were rotten. This shipping such fish ought to be stopped. Let our legislature at the coming session forbid the catching and selling of rotten dog salmon.—Yaquina Post.

JERREYS GO WELL.—Supt. Miles has conclusively proved that cattle raising pays abundantly well in the Willamette valley. Seven years ago he invested in seven Jersey cattle. Yesterday he made his last sale of sixteen head at an average price of over \$75. Since he first invested he has sold over \$5000 worth of Jersey cattle.

AGAIN.—Frank Wrightman, deputy tax collector, again reports heavy returns from Aurora, having collected over \$2000 there on Monday. This is the best precinct to which the collectors go for coin.

The bishop drew a deeply interesting picture of the contrast between our own favored schools and the poor schools of the East. No girls of any age are found in these schools, there is an appalling lack of order, poverty is everywhere prevalent and the whole system of training stands to stultify rather than develop the man. And beautiful and eloquent tribute of respect and love for our flag was given by the speaker, at the close of which he sang the following stanzas, composed by himself on the shores of Lake Galilee. BOARD OF TRADE.

A Scheme for a Railroad to the Sea Discussed by the Salem Board of Trade.

The Board of Trade met yesterday afternoon in adjourned session. The main business before the meeting was to consider the matter of conferring with gentlemen from Newport in the interest of a railroad from Salem to Newport via Kings valley, the Luckiamute, Rock Creek and Siletz Indian Reservation. W. T. Wilber, secretary of the Kings valley and Newport railroad company addressed the board. He said that a road across the proposed route would pass through a country rich in resources for the entire distance. On leaving Newport the road would follow Rock creek through fine timber of spruce, fir and cedar, and would pass within easy access of excellent granite quarries and would then reach the fertile valley of the Siletz Indian reservation.

Mr. Wilber stated that from the head of the valley on the west side of the Coast range the valley, the head waters of the Luckiamute on this side, could be reached by fifteen miles of road with a one per cent grade, whereas the O. P. has a 2½ per cent grade through the mountains. He stated that seventy-four miles of road would span the distance from Salem to Newport by this route. He spoke of the splendid water power of Rock creek and the abundance of timber that covers its banks. On the Luckiamute are copper mines, which assay 20 per cent by a test made by Mr. Wilber himself. The country through Kings valley and down past Independence is too well known to the people to need comment by me, said Mr. Wilber.

After Mr. Wilber closed his address a number of questions were asked him in regard to the surveys he had made. He said the cost of making a permanent survey would be about \$7000, and that the object of his being here was to make some arrangement to give the people along the proposed line an opportunity to subscribe for the making of this survey.

A committee was appointed by the president of the board, consisting of T. H. Barnes, Wm. Peck and J. H. Albert to look into the matter.

The secretary gave his report for the month just past which shows the board to be in an excellent condition and are doing a good business. The following gentlemen were voted to membership under the suspension of the rules: E. E. Wild, Geo. F. Smith, A. T. Yeaton, Geo. M. Becker, John H. McNary, Geo. Hoey, T. J. Cronise, John Knight, Louis McLean and G. Steiner.

A communication was read from the national Board of Trade, which has headquarters in Penn., asking that the Salem board join the national board. The initiation fee is \$125 and annual dues \$30 for the first 100 members and \$5 for every fractional 50 above 100. The matter was laid over until next meeting.

Nothing further has been heard from the Hudson manufacturing company.
