

PARNELL'S WAR.

Will He Lead His Party to Victory?

MCCARTHY'S COMMITTEE ORGANIZED.

Ireland Ablaze With Excitement—The Two Wings Moving.

MCCARTHY'S APPEAL.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—Justin McCarthy, as chairman of the Irish parliamentary party, has addressed a circular to all Irish members, including Mr. Parnell, summoning them to meet at 2 o'clock to-day. The first business to come before the meeting will be the selection, by ballot, of a consulting committee of eight. Many of the McCarthy party are much embarrassed for funds, as they have relied on their quarterly checks for £50, which are just coming due. As these checks will probably be withheld by Parnell, it is likely that the needy members will be paid temporarily from the fund raised last night for the establishment of a paper.

The anti-Parnellites are discussing the advisability of having O'Brien and Dillon return via France, in which country a convention could be held for the purpose of obtaining their advice before they submitted to arrest and imprisonment. G. C. Hooley, P. O'Brien, Carey and Mahon are still at sea as doubtful. This makes the Healy-McCarthy strength fifty and the Parnellites thirty-one.

ABLAZE WITH EXCITEMENT.

Ireland was ablaze with excitement to-day, many public meetings being held and the split in the party being the universal topic of conversation and discussion everywhere. The mass meeting in Phoenix park, Dublin, was not so large as had been anticipated. In fact it was not at all a formidable gathering in point of size, though it was quite turbulent. It was distinctly a party meeting, Healy and other opponents of Parnell were burned in effigy. Judging from the bitterness of the denunciations against them, they would have been burned in person had they been present. So far as returns have been received to-night, most of the impromptu meetings last night convened today were in Parnell's favor, and in more places than Dublin the chief enemies of Parnell were figuratively destroyed by fire.

REMOVAL.

Since the Parnell-Gladstone disruption, any number of queer stories are afloat. One is to the effect that when Parnell and Gladstone were negotiating an alliance, Mrs. O'Shea played a part. She and Gladstone took dinner at the Thomas hotel, and the dinner had a favorable effect on the old man. Another story is that O'Shea was offered £20,000 to leave the country before the divorce trial. He refused because he thought the money would not be forthcoming. In this he was mistaken. The mayor of Cork, after hearing of the secession of the majority from the nationalist meeting last evening, telegraphed to John O'Connor as follows: "Ireland will not allow England to select her leaders. This right belongs to Ireland. The Irish people will not stand Gladstone's dictation."

CAREER IS CLOSED.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The Cork Examiner says Parnell's English career is closed. The Examiner thinks Parnell is overrated as to his ability to secure the return of men to parliament to take the places of members who oppose his leadership. Parnell will be accompanied on his coming tour through Ireland by the most active of his followers. Before his departure from England to Ireland he will issue a manifesto to the people of latter country which will be signed by his supporters.

HIS CAMPAIGN.

DUBLIN, Dec. 9.—During the coming week Parnell will make an address here at Cork, Limerick and Waterford.

ANTI-PARNELLITES MEET.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—In response to a call issued by Justin McCarthy, leader of the anti-Parnell section of the Irish party, the wing opposed to Parnell, assembled to-day to further consider a line of policy to be adopted. The committee was appointed to assist McCarthy in deciding the future action of the party. An adjournment to 2 o'clock to-morrow was then taken.

LABOR.

THE AMERICAN FEDERATION.

DETROIT, Mich., Dec. 8. Eighty delegates of the American Federation of Labor assembled here this morning. They were welcomed to the city by the president of the board of council, men in the absence of the mayor. President Gompers of the Federation responded, and Gompers then delivered his annual address.

FOREIGN.

STATE ADVICES FROM THE ORIENT—TERRIBLE FATALITIES.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 8.—The steamship China arrived this morning from China and Japan, bringing Chinese advices up to November 13th and Japanese advices to the 21st. The details of the blowing up, Nov. 24, of the Government Powder Mills at Tat Ping Foo are meagre, but agree in stating that

three hundred lives were lost and all houses in the vicinity wrecked. Fifty persons are said to have been at work in the mills at the time of the accident and of their remains only two limbs have been found. The cause of the explosion is unknown.

One-half of the city of Pa Chow in the Province of Anhwei is reported destroyed by fire, originating from another powder explosion.

SHIP FOUNDERS. BRUSSELS, Dec. 8.—A fishing smack arrived at Ostend says the ship Villi Danvers has foundered at sea. She had on board one hundred men and apprentices. The government has received no advices of the disaster and does not believe the report.

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FINANCIAL.

Windom Declares Money is Being Hoarded.

CONTINUATION OF FINANCIAL STRINGENCY.

The Delameter Collapse a Serious One—Barb Wire Trust.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The Evening Sun prints a report of an interview on the financial situation with Secretary Windom, who says: The Treasury Department is doing all it can to relieve the present stringency in the money market and will continue on the same policy. The financial stringency he says is not the contraction of currency. The Treasury has put out over \$100,000,000 within the last nineteen months with no appreciable effect and he thinks that money is being hoarded. MAY DRAW ON THE RESERVES. The one hundred millions in gold held as a legal tender reserve will never be disturbed with his consent. He might possibly call on the \$24,000,000 deposited in national banks, but he does not think this would be a very popular proposition at the present time.

THE DELAMETER FAILURE.

MEADVILLE, Pa., Dec. 8.—Reports continue to come in of new sufferers by the collapse of the Delameter & Co. bank. A banker of this city said to-day that a cautious estimate of the liabilities would not be less than \$500,000 and they may reach \$800,000. There is nothing positively known about assets, but the most sanguine do not hope for more than 50 cents on a dollar. The whole city is restless and excited.

BARBED WIRE TRUST.

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—The representatives of all the barbed wire manufacturers in the United States met this morning. The object of the meeting is to form a trust and raise the price of barbed wire one cent a pound.

DROGGED DOWN BY OTHERS.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 8.—Roberts, Cushman & Co., importers of hatter's materials, made an assignment this afternoon. Mr. Roberts said that the failure was not caused by the tariff but was the work of several firms who had dragged them down. Liabilities and assets are unknown.

MISCELLANY.

SUFFERINGS IN DAKOTA.

PIERRE, S. D., Dec. 8.—Governor Fletcher confirms the reports of destitution in South Dakota. He declares that boomers are trying to conceal the fact. He goes on in detail to say that in seven counties an account of loss of crops, through droughts for the past three years farmers are destitute and will starve unless aided. Aid is being contributed by citizens of the state, but he thinks a general appeal should be made.

SNOW AND COLD IN OKLAHOMA CAUSE GREAT SUFFERING.

WICHITA, Kan., Dec. 8.—Snow in Oklahoma and the surrounding Indian territory now lies from six to twelve inches deep. Such inclement weather was entirely unlooked for and it reaches settlers unprepared. Great numbers of people and stock are in almost destitute circumstances and a continual cold winter will work terrible havoc among them. The government appropriation for relief of the destitute was expended some time ago, and they do not know where to look for aid.

Comments On The Message.

"This scheme should be resisted determinedly and uncompromisingly by every democrat. If necessary every means of obstruction should be resorted to in congress. Preserve the liberty of the people and put down the republican conspiracy to destroy them."

It is as quiet and confident as if there had been no election since that in which the president and his party had been deliberately instructed by the people with the charge of the government. It is a message eminently fitted to recall the republican voters of 1888 to the sense of their responsibilities and to remind them that the national policy for which they then declared deserves their unwavering support."

For literary and forensic merit it barely reaches mediocrity, while politically it is a purely partisan plea in extenuation of the course of the administration and the congress which the people have just decisively condemned."

N. Y. Sun: "The principal thing in President Harrison's message is the zealous recommendation that the Force bill should be taken up and pressed through congress. There is little need of any further argument upon this subject. This bill is simply revolution. Its one purpose is to continue the dominant party in power, and to this end its promoters are willing to destroy local self government, to overthrow the rights of the citizens and of communities, and to change the republic of free elections into a concentrated party despotism."
