MARKETS.

FINANCIAL.

FREE SILVER.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 10.—There are possibilities of the passage of a free coinage bill now on account of the stringency of money, that did not exist a short time ago. There is no doubt but what a large number of conservative men in both houses of congress, who last summer opposed free coinage will feel that the demand for more money must be met by some kind of legislation, and the only way out will be to pass a free coinage measure, or at least to throw the silver now on the market. Some of the best financiers in congress are considerably worried over the situation, and look for something to develop within the next four or five days, which will make legislation of some kind necessary. If this contingency arises it will, of course, set aside the consideration of the election bill, and probably result in its ultimate postponement and defeat.

GREAT COTTON MILLS CLOSED.
FALL RIVER, Mass., Dec. 10.—The great American Print Works will shut down at the end of the week, indefinitely. This is one of the largest cotton goods manufacturing plants in the world.

MINES CLOSED.
WILKESBARRE, Penn., Dec. 10.—Owing to continued quietness in the coal trade and large stocks, with no immediate prospects of being able to market them, the coal department of the Lackawanna railroad system has ordered a definite closing down of all mines in this vicinity. The order took effect this morning and will throw thousands out of employment and cause much suffering.

WASHINGTON.

LANDS PURCHASED.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 10.—Secretary Noble has received the following telegram from Chairman Crow of the Indian commission at Crow Agency, Montana: "The Crow Indians in full council to-day have sold the lands west of the Divide on Price's creek and an adjoining strip on the southeast to the Big Horn, fifteen miles wide for a consideration of \$100,000. The treaty is now being signed. The number of acres purchased is 1,850,000."

MISCELLANY.

LEWIS DEFEATS WHEATLER AT ACTON.
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10.—Evan Lewis, the "strangler," and Joe Acton, the "little demon," wrestled at the Wigwam last evening in a catch-as-catch-can match, best three out of five falls, for a \$500 prize. Lewis won, taking the first, second and fourth falls, and Acton the third. Time, 14 minutes and 22 seconds, 58 seconds, 16 minutes, and 11 minutes. About two thousand people witnessed the match. Lewis weighed 180 pounds and Acton 192 pounds.

HUMBERT DEPOSES ROME.
ROME, Dec. 10.—Parliament convened to-day. King Humbert in his speech said: "Following my father's example I have always respected the rights of my ancestors' religion, but I will never allow the sovereign authority to be degraded in that religious name."

STATE.

PORTLAND OWNS ANOTHER PUBLIC BUILDING.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 10. Senator Dolph's bill for a public building at Portland, Oregon, was called up and passed among a lot of others yesterday. The bill is passed by the senate appropriated \$500,000, but the house committee cut it down to \$400,000.

LABOR.

COLLISION BETWEEN STRIKING MINERS.
BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Dec. 10.—Sheriff Smith with a posse of fifty armed men left here last night for the Blue Creek coal mines, twenty-five miles away, to quell a riot which is reported in progress there. No particulars are yet obtainable, beyond the fact of a collision between strikers and negro miners who had taken their places.

ATTEMPTING TO BREAK UP SAILOR'S UNIONS.
DETROIT, Mich., Dec. 10. At the convention of the American Federation this morning a number of telegrams were received from the secretary of the Seafarers' Union of the Pacific Coast, calling attention to the pending bill in congress for the enforcement of shipment of seamen. The secretary urged immediate attention to the bill, on the ground that if this passed any organization of seamen will become an impossibility. It is thought to be a move on the part of vessel owners to break up sailor's unions.

THREEDAYERS STRIKE.
NEWARK, N. J., Dec. 10. The entire forces of Clarke thread mills in this city and Kearney struck this morning. Over 3,000 men and girls out. The strikers have decided to remain out until some discharged men are reinstated and a limit put on superintendent Womsey's powers.

His Tour Is One Triumphant Reception.

IRELAND ENTHUSIASTICALLY FOR PARNELL

"United Ireland" Put in Charge of a New Editor.

PARNELL'S RECEPTION.
DUBLIN, Dec. 10.—Charles Stewart Parnell arrived at Kingston this morning. He was met by a large delegation. As the members of Parnell's party came ashore they were greeted with cheers. Timothy Healy, Maurice Healy and Kenny, opponents of Parnell, who traveled in the same boat, were met with hostile demonstrations by the crowd, while there were shouts for Parnell, mingled with cheers for Mrs. O'Shea.

Parnell was the last to quit the boat. As he proceeded to the train, the crowd became enthusiastic in its demonstrations. Replying to a number of addresses Parnell said: "He did not fear the result of the fight; he never had led the Irish party wrong in the past and he would not in the future." At Dublin the crowd was so dense that Parnell with difficulty reached a cab. The crowd surrounded the cab, unharnessed the horse, and drew the cab along the streets singing "God save Ireland."

SLAVIN AND MAULIFFE RELEASED.
LONDON, Dec. 10.—In the case of government against Slavin and McAuliffe, charged with prize fighting, a verdict of not guilty was today returned by consent of the prosecution. The prisoners were released.

AN EDITOR EJECTED.
DUBLIN. Owing to its advocacy of the retirement of Parnell "United Ireland," a newspaper, was seized today by Parnell, who is one of the directors of the company owning the paper. The current issue was stopped and the editor ejected. Parnell has placed Leamy in charge of the paper.

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WOMEN'S ROUND TABLE.

A woman's love for talking is proverbial. Many are the jokes and proverbs about women and their tongues. Some people would almost blame them for being intelligent beings, by the way they are constantly prepared to plump down a rude witicism every time a woman opens her mouth. But, in spite of it all, woman and her words are rapidly coming to the front, not only by word of mouth, but her pen point is surely and swiftly engraving on the tablets of fame a proud record for women.

The Western Journalist, of Chicago, the official organ of the Coast Press Association of women, has recently been illustrating sketches of the lady journalists of the west, and it is a proud list and a very full one also. The city dailies, if it were but more generally known, are compiled in a great degree by feminine pens. Woman's Press clubs are quite as numerous as those composed of men.

By no means an unimportant body is the Pacific Coast Woman's Press Association, combining all the strong literary workers of the great West. They are working in a thoroughly organized way, having canvassed the entire field of feminine writers, and those who have not already joined the ranks must in time feel the advantage gained thereby and knock for admittance.

Woman as a writer is everywhere being acknowledged as having a peculiar power and sweet depth that can never hide its light under the bushel of any new de plume or peculiar style. And why should it? That half of the world which has for centuries had the supreme right of preserving purity, love, truth and gentle self sacrifice to the other half, is able after so long a course of training to speak the sweetest, most ringing syllables of this great century.

INTERESTING ACQUAINTANCES.
What a charming thing it is to know charming people. We all love to tell of some one we know to be of interest all around, because they happen to be connected "so and so." For instance one will say, "my room-mate who traveled in Europe with Mrs. Cleveland," "my friend the tea merchant, whose mother was a great friend of Hans Anderson has told me how when he was a little fellow in Denmark, etc."

"Why! don't you know who Mrs. McKee is? The president's daughter, of course; an acquaintance of mine met her in the mountains last summer," and so on. It would be a very poor conversationalist, indeed who could not weave into an evening's chat every great name that he or she had ever dared to associate with in his thoughts.

And all this reminds me of a very interesting acquaintance made the other day (and not at second-hand either). It was a young lady from Finland who has come over from that little un-thawed country to tell us that her country-women are not one whit behind their American sisters in progress. Leaving a professorship in one of their national institutes, she is trying to awaken an interest here in the Slavic work—a product of the genius of her own country and a method of education that has never been equalled in its many-sidedness. Miss Merri Toppelius has opened an institute in Chicago and is lecturing before teachers' conventions this winter. She has learned since September, to handle our language sufficiently to make herself very clearly understood, and presents her theme with an enthusiasm that is very catching. Miss Toppelius is especially interesting to our American autograph-sensation-seeking nature, in that she is the niece of the celebrated Finnish poet and novelist, T. Zoppelius, whose books have had a wonderful sale in America. Miss Toppelius has in mind some translations of children's stories from her uncle's latest writings, and it certainly would be a great addition to our literature, if they were all flavored as sweetly as some that we have already tasted.

THE WOMEN'S PROBLEM OF TO-DAY.

How to secure good health therefore is one of the problems for the generation of women. This is the demand their subjects will make of those they are crowning as queens of the hearth and home. Any society, called by whatever name, that so begins and so goes on begins at the root of noble living, and may be sure, that however slow their growth, that every step planted firmly on a hygienic fact will be a step towards not only personal physical well-being, but towards uplifting of the race as well.

If women once arouse themselves to the danger, and take hold of the matter in earnest, we shall not be long in seeing a more hopeful sign in the sky. Already there is a morning glimmer flashing in the columns of the press. No man who stops to ask himself the question how many healthy women he numbers among his acquaintance but will welcome the gleam of this dawn.

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
