NEW CITY ORDINANCE.—There was recently a bill before the city council which provides that the drug stores and restaurants which furnish liquor to their guests shall pay a license of \$400 a year. The ordinance is, in fact, an amendment of the law regarding saloons, and the intention of it is to make it cover all the places which sell liquors in quantities less than a quart. The ordinance is quite lengthy; as it now stands it covers some eighteen pages of legal cap paper. It has passed the second reading and will come up for the final reading and passage at the next meeting of the council. What effect such a law will have on the drug stores is not known. In conversation with one of the drug men it appears that they care little about the bill. He stated that they were not allowed to sell liquors only as prescribed by a physician and the revenue laws protected them and the ordinance would not effect them in the least.

THE UNKNOWN DEAD.—It will be remembered that a young man was killed in the Lake Labish wreck and he has never been identified. W. H. Martin, of Creswell, has fears that the young man is his brother-in-law John W. Doak. Mr. Doak had been up in Morrow county and was expected home about that time. His home is on the Siuslaw. Mr. Martin says they have been unable to hear anything of him since then, and as the description of the young man who was killed answers Mr. Doak's description very well, it is feared he may be the unfortunate one. If Mr. Doak is still in the land of the living he will greatly relieve his relatives' anxiety by making his presence known. —Eugene Register.

FOGGY WEATHER.—The excessive foggy weather which has prevailed in the valley this fall is a violation to the ordinary rule of Oregon weather. The valley has not the fog that many of the new comers at first naturally suppose there would be from the location. This fall has been a notable exception to the rule. The valley seems to have been full of fog most of the time for the past month. The pioneers say that when the rains fairly set in the fog will disappear. While the weather for the past month has been pleasant the rain would be welcomed by nearly every one in the valley. It is not often that the people are unanimous on what kind of weather is desired, but now there seems to be no dissenting voice against a few weeks of Oregon's favored rainy weather.

THE NEXT QUESTION.—The question for discussion in the Alka Hesperian society on Saturday is as follows: "Resolved that the decision rendered by Chief Justice Field respecting the inherent right of a citizen to retail liquor is in accordance with the strict principles of right and law." The leaders are John O'Shea and S. T. Richardson. It was the intention to hold the meeting on Friday night, but owing to the A. O. U. W. desiring to use the hall on that evening the society yielded and will allow them the hall on that evening.

SCHOOL GIRLS' JOKE.—Misses Mattie, May and Rosie Barnes and Iona Dodson, who are attending school at Eugene, played quite a practical joke on their parents here, says the Ochoo Review. They spent Thanksgiving in Salem, and while there visited the penitentiary. They got some of the warden's letter heads and wrote to their parents that they were in the penitentiary and wanted help to get out. The information excited Mrs. Dodson considerably, and took considerable argument to convince her it was only a joke.

THE COMMITTEES ARE HERE.

The Portland Propositions—The Committees Viewing the Sites Near This City.

R. C. Houghton, John Kenworthy, W. S. Harrington and H. P. Satchell, of the Portland committee on the removal of the Willamette University, are in the city and are laboring with the committee of the city in endeavoring to settle that important question. The joint committee was out this afternoon looking into the sites that have been talked of here and tonight they will hold a meeting to discuss the matter. The session in the evening will be with closed doors, and nothing definite will be given out to the laborers of the committee until it goes to the board of trustees.

There are two locations near Portland that are before the committee. One is Portland, which is two miles north of Albina. In this location fifteen acres and eighty lots are offered as a donation. Then 300 acres, which are said to be worth, and would sell in small tracts, at \$1000 an acre, is offered to the University at \$500 an acre, in all making over \$200,000, as the inducement for the school to come to this city. The other site Portland offers is Cambridge, near Milwaukee. This one is of about the value of the other and is some five and a half miles up the river from Portland. The committee are very reticent about talking on the subject, and especially to representation of the press. Reporters were refused admittance to their meeting to night.

FROM SOUTH DAKOTA.—The board of Trade are in receipt of communications from a party of eight families in South Dakota who are expected to come to Salem during this month. They wrote to the board asking them to secure for them if possible, reduced rates. This the board managed to do. Among the party are two men who will go into the mercantile business of some kind, one mechanic, and the remainder will look for farms or fruit lands. They are represented to be industrious men and just the kind that Salem or any other thriving city, wants to locate in their vicinity.

IN PROBATE.—In the matter of guardianship of Edna Annie French, a minor, F. P. French, guardian, petitions the court for an order to sell estate, time set for hearing Dec. 31st, at ten o'clock a. m. In the matter of the estate of Henry Fox, deceased, Tressa Bell, formerly Tressa Fox, executrix, renders to court her final account, time for hearing Jan. 10, at 1 o'clock p. m. In the guardianship of Lydia L. and Nancy E. Dunn, minors, petitions the court for a guardian to be appointed. Ester A. Lewis is appointed guardian of said minors.

FROM COUNTY TO CITY CHARGE.—Tom McNary who was released from the county jail yesterday was lodged in the city cooler last night for being drunk. He said the past few months had been a very dry time and by accident he partook too freely of bad whisky last night and the result is he is languishing in the city jail for the next ten days. He was lodged in the county jail on the 14th last September for stabbing the bar tender in the Capital brewery and was given fifty days in the county jail by the court at the October session.

LACKED HOUSE SENSE.—The horse that is reported to have swallowed a shooting knife with a steel hook on one end at one of Salem's blacksmith shops Wednesday is still living. It was a miraculous occurrence and can only be explained by the only well-attested fact connected with the whole affair—the fact that the reporter lied. The reporter swallowed the story. The horse had more sense and did not swallow the knife.

A YEAR ON THE STREETS.—The subject of who shall be street commissioner, is being talked up among the members of the city council. This is a matter the city has a great interest in, and who that man may be, he should be one attentive to the city's best interests. The present commissioner has, as far as is known to the JOURNAL reporter, who made some inquiries on the subject, given good satisfaction, and his work stands as a proof to that fact. The year 1890 has been a hard one on the street superintendent. The high water last winter filled many of the streets with debris, the sidewalks and cross walks in many places, were washed away. In addition to these repairs all being done, five bridges have been built over the race and North Mill creeks. Many of the old mud holes have been filled, and the streets have been improved in general. While there is room for much more improvement in the same line, this year has seen more work done on the streets, probably, than any other year in the history of Salem. When a change is made, the people want to know, and rightly too, will it be for the improvement of the city. If there are other men who will do more and better work, the city demands that they be given the place; if not, no change is required.

THEY ARE COMING.—The representative of T. H. Hudson & Sons is expected to arrive in this city to night and at once satisfy the people of their ability to carry out the agreement to build and operate a manufacturing institution in Salem. The representative will very probably be T. H. Hudson himself, who will fully size up the situation and the location for their factory. It is the intention of the company to at once proceed to the construction of the building when the preliminary arrangements are concluded. They stated in their last letter that at least considerable time would be required to get such buildings as are necessary for such an enterprise in readiness for the machinery, and it was their desire to have work begun on them at as early a date as possible. On the arrival of the representative the board will call a special meeting to devise plans for carrying out the people's part of the agreement. The people may not be surprised at having an opportunity of aiding the enterprise.

He returned with it on Saturday, and immediately went to work setting it up. On Monday he again commenced sawing lumber. The engine is now in good working order, and the mill is turning out lumber at a rapid rate. Mr. Jacquot is much pleased with the way that the proprietor of the Salem Iron works, O. D. Hutton, had the engine overhauled and repaired. It was done in a workmanlike manner, and his charges were very reasonable, being about one-half that charged by Portland foundries for the same work, which is an inducement to those having work to do in that line to take it to the Salem foundry. Mr. Jacquot recommends all persons from this section who want engines repaired or castings made to go to the Salem Iron works."
