It appears that Salem is the second city of Oregon by a good round majority in more ways than one.

Give the people a clear financial balance sheet for a starter, gentlemen of the new city administration.

Athens suffered a destructive fire the night of Jan. 3. A high wind was blowing and for a time the town was in danger.

Everyone of the 5000 Birds-eye views of Salem sent out, conveys an erroneous impression of the resources of Salem.

A number of exchanges are debating why eggs spoil. At our house we don't debate that question and we don't allow any to spoil.

There is a splendid location for the new Salem opera house right where the postoffice now stands, if location is all the projectors are looking for.

Is it not time for the several sections of our suburbs that have inducements to offer for a new site for the Willamette college of the future to show up?

Tillamook Headlight: The politicians don't care who has a mortgage on the farmers' farms so they can get a mortgage on the Farmers' Alliance vote.

The right management of the Board of Trade means a successful year for Salem in 1891. There should be no strings on, or side-issues connected with, the office.

In connection with its report of the church dedication the Albany Democrat says: "Rev. C. C. Stratton's sermon in the evening was a bright effort greatly appreciated."

University addition property sells at about the best figures of any in the city. The new University addition will be fully as desirable. Why could it not easily be made more so?

The city of Albany received from licenses and fines \$5083 in 1890; taxes, \$10,351; from all sources, \$17,235; disbursements, \$17,224; warrants outstanding, \$7290; no bonded debt. A good showing.

As the committee have practically decided to let the Methodist college remain in Salem, but make it a larger and better school, why not start a citizen's movement to find a new and suitable site and erect a \$100,000 building ahead of Portland?

The furniture factory is not materializing, and a good many business men are outspoken in denouncing the way the matter was managed and will no longer pay to sustain it. Incompetence in management on Salem's part seems to be the weakness this time.

Too many irons in the fire will spoil anything. The Board of Trade needs the support of all Salem business men and no factional feelings should be encouraged. It should be run on a square business basis, and the secretary's office can not be run in connection with a newspaper, railroad ticket office, real estate, loan and collection office, etc., and give satisfaction. Let this be got right.

Oregon State Journal: The Salem CAPITAL JOURNAL opposes the new tax law proposed by the legislative committee on assessment and taxation. We cannot understand how any intelligent person who has any respect for the rights of the people can favor such a scheme, and presuming that the members of the committee are honest and intelligent it seems strange, indeed, that they got up such a scheme. But we can't all think alike, which accounts for this perhaps, as well as for many other strange things.

LET US BUILD A FRUIT PALACE.

The wonderful growth and prosperity of Sioux City, Iowa, dates from the inception of its corn palace enterprise and that city has grown year by year, until it is now the phenomenal feature of that state.

Ottumwa, Ia., has also succeeded in attracting the world's attention by a coal palace. By emphasizing the leading industry and, in a manner forcing it upon the attention of the whole people and United States, the two cities have coined out of the natural resources of the surrounding country a mint of wealth.

Salem can do the same in 1891.

Salem can get up, in connection with the State Fair, a fruit palace that will turn the eyes of the world upon this valley. The fair comes at a season of the year when the climate is dry, and when the supply and variety of fruit is unlimited. A committee to consider the feasibility of this enterprise should be constituted at an early day and the opportunity not let slip to awaken enthusiasm for our fruit interests and the fruit-growing capacity of our wonderful soils.

The plan would involve the construction of a building to be entirely covered with fruit inside and out, and that would display the wealth and variety of our fruit industry in all its forms. Here is a field for the employment of unlimited local enterprise and ingenuity to the greatest advantage.

Granger Humility.

BUILDING ASSOCIATION.—The Salem Building and Loan Association met in the secretary's office last night, and made a loan of \$1000 to one of their members, with interest in advance. The period of the loan was four and one-half years. A meeting of the stockholders will be held next Monday night, to make a change in their by-laws, and submit some supplementary articles so as to issue a new series of stock. A large number of shares of the new stock have already been pledged. The association is doing a flourishing business.
