MARKETS.

WHEAT. SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 16.—Wheat buyer for 1891, \$1.40.

LABOR.

THE STATION AGENTS' STRIKE. MILWAUKEE, Jan. 17.—Superintendent Collins says this morning there is no new development in the strike, except that about a dozen more telegraphers quit work last night.

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—The striking telegraphers on the St. Paul road claim to be gaining ground, and that fifty men left work at noon today. Chief Thurston says the road is running passenger trains on comparatively good time, but freights are greatly impeded.

FIRES.

COTTON MILL BURNED. PALMER, Mass., Jan. 17.—The main part of the dye house of the Palmer mills, owned by the Otis Company, at Three Rivers, burned this morning, and two employees perished. Loss on the mill, \$20,000.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 17.—Loss by fire at Dobson's Carpet mills last night, is approximated at \$1,250,000 to \$1,750,000; insurance, \$1,000,000.

MISCELLANY.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS. PORTLAND, Jan. 17.—Judge Deady today denied the application of Wm. McDonald for release on habeas corpus. In the contested guardianship case of the children of the late Ben Holladay, County Judge Moreland today ordered that Linda, a daughter, appear in court on Monday, and choose a guardian.

THE SCARE ABATING. PINE RIDGE, Jan. 17.—A council between the friendly and hostile Indians, has tended to quiet the anxiety of many white people, and to assure the Indians their fears of being massacred by the soldiers are without foundation. Everybody today seems to feel that the trouble is brought to a close. Up to noon today, seventy-one guns had been turned in by the hostiles. More weapons are expected to-morrow. Another council will be held this afternoon to consider the separation of the tribes.

BUSINESS FAILURES. NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—The business failures reported to Bradstreet's number 396 in the United States this week, against 391 last week, and 455 this week last year. Canada had 51 this week, against 46 last week. The total number of failures in the United States from January 1 to date is 933, against 1018 last year.

REVENUE FACTIONS. BISMARCK, N. D., Jan. 17.—Several weeks ago Editor Raymond, of Dawson, with his friends, was assailed and terribly beaten by a rival political faction. A number received serious injuries, and one man will probably die yet from their effects. Raymond had two of his assistants, Deputy Sheriff Pettibone and Joe Coulter, arrested, and the case came up for trial yesterday. During its progress the defendant's friends rushed in with firearms, drove the justice of the peace away and took possession of the courtroom. The excitement is at fever heat and bloodshed is feared.

PARAGRAPHS.

The export of wheat from Tacoma during the week aggregate 88,000 bushels.

A. P. Hammond, postmaster of Ashland, is confined to his bed, in consequence of an apoplectic attack. The postoffice business is attended to by his son and daughter, both regular clerks in the office.

A Dublin dispatch says in the event of Dillon being elected for the new parliamentary leader, O'Brien will return to the United States and resume work.

The first train over the Jacksonville-Medford road reached Jacksonville amid the greatest demonstrations of joy. J. D. Howell, one of the contractors, and all the prominent business men of Medford were on board the train.

STATE.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

The Baker City Democrat takes the ironical nomination of Penroyer for the chief magistracy by the Oregonian, for sober earnestness. It says in support of the motion: "Nominate Oregon's governor for president and the wave of victory will be in 1892 as it was 'where rolls the Oregon' in 1890."

Dallas Chronicle: We still hear of the unknown disease prevailing among horses and cattle in Sherman county. A good many have died and many are sick. So far a remedy has not been discovered. It would be well for the state veterinary surgeon to look into the cause and see what can be done to abate the disease.

Oakland Observer: Our local physicians are of the opinion that we are about to have another epidemic of la grippe. Many of our citizens are afflicted with severe colds, and the doctors assert that the symptoms are in every way identical with those preceding the influenza.

Forest Grove Democrat: The daughter of Taylor Raines, of Gales creek, aged thirteen, died Sunday night last from an attack of pneumonia, following measles. Mr. Raines' family has been extremely unfortunate, it being but about three months since they lost one of their children. The entire family, with the exception of Mrs. Raines, are at present prostrated with the measles.

The tail end of a cyclone, as the Astorian describes it, struck Astoria on Friday, and stormed from the southeast at the rate of 52 miles an hour. A few signs and rickety board fences were blown down, but no serious mischief was done.

Henry county is again in the throes of a county seat war. When the county court met at Burns in the early part of the month an order was made directing the clerk to remove his office and all records, books, paper files, etc., in his custody pertaining to the courts of that county to the town of Harney.

The Albany Journal condemns the mock-heroic boom of Gov. Penroyer for president, in which so many journals have had a say, as the outcome of a united effort all over the country to turn aside attention from Cleveland.

The Corvallis Times started the report that J. R. N. Bell and E. C. Pentland of the West side, had dissolved partnership owing to some disagreement in the editorial control of the paper. Now the Albany Democrat clips in with the declaration that "the statement that Messrs. Bell and Pentland of the West Side had dissolved partnership is untrue," and calls upon the Times to retract its statement. This thing is getting badly mixed up.

Albany Democrat, the 16th: A deputy sheriff from Pendleton passed through Albany this noon with a typical cowboy whom he had arrested on Coos Bay for forgery committed in Umatilla county. The deputy evidently knew his man for he was thoroughly shackled and closely watched.

UNIVERSITY NOTES.

Rev. Rouk was present Thursday and led the devotional exercises in chapel.

D. C. Rosebrook who has been sick at his home, at Toledo, will return soon and assume the leadership of the band.

The Song Tournament, to be given by the Philharmonic Society, promises to be one of the most interesting entertainments of the season. With this week the advance work in the university closes, and a review next week will prepare for the examinations that will occur at the close of the half year.

The recital given in the chapel, under the direction of Prof. Parvin, was largely attended, and a success in every particular. Many members of the legislature and others invited, as well as nearly all the students were present.

The Philharmonic Society have the following discussion for this week. Resolved, that "Civilization is the Outgrowth of Christianity." A. A. Stafford and C. D. Schneider as leaders.

The University, as well as the Conservatory, is so crowded that it is hard to make room for more students.

The history and biography class of the conservatory was organized last week. They meet each week and study points of musical history and biographies of the great masters.

FREE COINAGE BILL. WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—The free coinage bill passed by the senate is substantially as follows:

An act to provide for the free coinage of gold and silver bullion, and for other purposes.—That from and after passage of this act the unit of value in the United States shall be a dollar, and the same may be coined of four hundred and twelve and one-half grains of standard silver, or of twenty-five and eight-tenths grains of standard gold; and said coin shall be a legal tender for all debts, public and private; that hereafter any owner of silver or gold bullion may deposit the same at any mint in the United States to be formed into standard dollars or bars for his benefit and without charge; but it shall be lawful to refuse any deposit of less value than \$100, or any bullion so base as to be unsuitable for the operations of the mint.

Sec. 2.—The provision of section 3 of "An act to authorize the coinage of standard silver dollars, and to restore its legal tender character," which became a law February 28, 1878, is hereby made applicable to coinage in this act provided for.

Sec. 3.—That certificates provided in the second section of this act shall be of denomination not less than \$1 nor more than \$100, and such certificates shall be redeemable in coin of standard value. A sufficient sum to carry out the provisions of this act is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated. So much of the act of July 14, 1890, entitled "An act directing the purchase of silver bullion and the issue of treasury notes and for other purposes," as requires the purchase of \$4,500,000 silver bullion per month, and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 4.—Certificates provided for in this act and all silver and gold certificates already issued shall be receivable for all taxes and dues to the United States of every description, and shall be a legal tender for the payment of all debts, public and private.

Sec. 5.—Owners of bullion deposited for coinage shall have the option to receive coin or its equivalent in certificates provided for in this act, and such bullion shall be subsequently coined.

The American Brewery Association of San Francisco was organized Thursday. Adolphus Busch, of St. Louis, was elected president. Other prominent brewers and capitalists were elected directors. Between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000 will be expended in the plant. The brewery is started in opposition to the English syndicate which recently bought all the breweries in San Francisco.

After sitting all night the senate is still in session at 10.30 a. m. Faulkner concluded his speech against the elections bill, having held the floor for almost twelve hours. Stewart has given notice of a motion to re-commit the elections bill, with instructions to report it back with a provision for the election of members of congress on days when no other elections were held in the several states.
