A Farmer Reviews the Book of Trade. ED. JOURNAL: Last evening I went to the Board of Trade rooms. Seeing on the door in plain English "Walk In" I mustered courage to knock. Being invited in and seeing to all appearances at least, that the session was not secret, I went in and took a seat. My first impression was that it was about a fairly representative body of citizens, in intelligence and dignity. But what most impressed me was the lordly, imperious, self-complacent, nonchalant assertion of divine right to rule in formulating and presenting their demands to the legislature. A kind of "we own the earth, and Oregon belongs to us" manner. I was most forcibly reminded of a story of the French revolution. The deposed monarch, inflated by possession of long abused power, treated as nothing the premonitions of the coming storm. Looking from his palace he saw a commotion in the street.

"Is a riot," he said. One of his courtiers who flattered his master, had extolled his power, and concealed the danger, but now convinced that it could be concealed no longer, replied, "Sire, it is a revolution." And it was, and the monarch was swept from his throne. These are some of the dainty morsels this board demands and expects the legislature to grant them.

1. Repeat of the mortgage law, so that the money lender can loan money on farms and escape taxation.

2. Repeat of the usury law so that he can fix the rate of interest from 10 to 30 per cent., if desired, and as long as the farmer can pay it.

3. Repeat of the indebtedness clause so that the farmer, or owner of his little home, will have to pay not only on what he owns, but on what he owes.

Then having this little scheme fixed to suit their modesty (?) ask: Fourthly, for an appropriation of a cool \$250,000 for the Oregon exhibit at the world's fair. This is to be expended from five to seven commissioners, drawing each a salary of ten dollars per day!

Of course as the first three demands enable them to escape the demands of the tax collector, they can be supremely generous, with other people's money.

The legislature is to grant this and if vetoed must be passed over the executive No. Of course no man with a pumpkin on his shoulder and "haysed in his hair," must be appointed. This is a nice scheme if it will only work. But right here I am reminded of a little story. An inventive genius had perfected a milking machine. With loud clatter and bang he was exultingly turning the crank, exhibiting its wonderfully perfect mechanism, and eloquently dilating, to an admiring crowd of dairy dealers, pea farmers, and street loafers, on its predicted success in extracting the lactical fluid, and all was radiant with hope, when an unopinionated old farmer suddenly asked, "See here, mister, have you consulted the cow whether she's going to stand all that racket, or not?" The question now is have the farmers and producers been consulted? Will they stand the racket of the milking machine? We will see.

An Ordinance Bill.

To amend sections 1 and 2, title 3, section 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, of said chapter 3, of ordinance No. 31.

Section 1.—That section 1, of said chapter 3, of ordinance No. 31, be amended so as to read as follows: "All city taxes and license fees shall be paid in current gold and silver coin of the U. S. Treasury, except that city orders shall be received for taxes as provided in section 5, title 1, of said chapter."

Section 2.—That section 2, of said title 3, be amended so as to read as follows: "The city shall have the right to enforce the violation of city ordinances may be enforced by action against the offender in the recorder's court, which action shall be tried without a jury, and in case of conviction, the defendant shall be liable for the amount of the fine, or the term of imprisonment in default thereof, or of both, and the defendant shall be liable for the costs of the action."

Section 3.—That section 3, of said title 3, be amended so as to read as follows: "That no person, firm, company or corporation shall engage in, or purport to engage in, any business or profession within the limits of the city, without first obtaining a license as required by this ordinance, until he or she has obtained such license."

Section 4.—That section 4, of said title 3, be amended so as to read as follows: "The city shall have the right to enforce the violation of city ordinances may be enforced by action against the offender in the recorder's court, which action shall be tried without a jury, and in case of conviction, the defendant shall be liable for the amount of the fine, or the term of imprisonment in default thereof, or of both, and the defendant shall be liable for the costs of the action."
