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IMPROVEMENT OF THE UPPER WILLAMETTE—EFFORTS OF A LIVE COMMITTEE

At the meeting held in Portland
 Sept. 20th, 1890, to organize a State
 Board of Commerce, among other
 matters of business, resolutions were
 presented by Mr. E. M. Waite, of
 Salem, asking congress to make an
 appropriation for the improvement
 of the bars on the upper Willamette,
 notably the one just below Salem,
 one near Wheeland, one near Inde-
 pendence and the so-called Half-
 Moon bend between Albany and
 Corvallis. The resolutions were
 referred to the executive committee.

At the meeting of the State Board
 of Commerce held in Salem, Jan.
 15th inst., the resolutions were
 adopted. Mr. J. H. Albert moved
 that a special committee of three,
 to-wit: E. M. Waite, of Salem, J.
 H. Nicholas, of Corvallis, and Mr.
 Robertson, of Independence, be ap-
 pointed a committee to wait upon
 Major Hanbury, U. S. engineer, at
 Portland, to secure, if possible, a
 portion of the last government ap-
 propriation for the upper Willa-
 mette.

The committee visited Major
 Hanbury on Wednesday last, and
 were informed that while a portion
 of the appropriation referred to had
 been already expended, that he
 would leave Portland on or about
 Feb. 1st, with a snag boat and com-
 pany of men for the purpose of im-
 proving the upper river, so far as
 the appropriation would go.

In regard to the bars in the river
 above referred to, he said a survey of
 each bar would be necessary before
 any substantial work could be done,
 in order to ascertain depth of water,
 velocity of current, condition of river
 bed, etc.
 Let us keep the matter warm by
 discussion and insist upon an ap-
 propriation sufficient to so improve
 the Willamette that boats can run
 from Portland to Corvallis at all
 seasons of the year.

MR. JOSEPH SIMON.

His New Scheme to Control the Poli-

tics of Portland and the State.

Until within a few days it has
 been thought that in obedience to
 the almost universal expression
 of the people of the state, in favor
 of the Australian system of voting,
 as expressed in the bill now pending
 in the legislature, that body would
 pass the bill as proposed by the bal-
 lot reform league. The bill has been
 published for months and universal-
 ly approved. Mr. Simon, it seems,
 wishes to amend the bill so as to
 have its provisions control the elec-
 tion of delegates at the primaries, so
 as to make it a crime for any person
 to pay or offer to pay money to in-
 fluence voters at primaries and to
 provide for the keeping of a registry
 of voters at the primaries.

Now Mr. Simon has the power to
 appoint the police in Portland, and
 they are his creatures and henchmen.
 If such an amendment should be
 added to the bill and become a law,
 then Mr. Simon's police can be di-
 rected by him to stand around the
 primaries and supervise the elec-
 tion of delegates to the county and
 state conventions. And as this
 police force arrests persons without
 complaint or warrant, on the simple
 assumption of the policeman that
 the arrested is guilty of burglary,
 Mr. Simon and his police force can
 remove all active persons not in
 their interest from the primaries, and
 have the primary voting places in the
 possession of their friends.

This scheme, if it can be made to
 work, will again put the primary
 elections into the control of Mr. Si-
 mon's police force and perpetuate
 their power in Portland and
 throughout the state; which control
 has for the last ten years been a
 disgrace to a free and enlightened peo-
 ple; keep the business of the country
 in the control of monopolies and im-
 pose unjust burdens and taxes on the
 productive industries of the state.

If any think it practicable to regu-
 late by law primary elections so that
 the records of such elections be kept
 in the various precincts, such laws
 should provide that no partisan po-
 lice force should supervise such elec-
 tions, and be at liberty to arrest citi-
 zens at such voting places. And as
 such a law and its practicability have
 not been discussed, it should not be
 allowed to embarrass the passage of a
 law which the people have de-
 manded.

TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE.

The Work of the Session Concluded

Thursday Afternoon.

Rev. S. P. Wilson at 1 p. m. called

the alliance to order, and the same
 was opened with prayer by Mr. S.
 Layman, of Woodburn. The min-
 utes of the morning session were
 read and approved.

An order for the sum of \$10 was
 drawn in favor of Rev. C. E. Clime,
 pastor of the M. E. church, to meet
 the expenses of janitor, fuel and
 lights during the session. The com-
 mittee appointed on the secretary
 and treasurer's report submitted the
 following:

To the members of the Oregon
 State Temperance Alliance: We your
 committee appointed to examine
 the secretary and treasurer's annual
 reports, find them to be correct and
 recommend that an order be drawn
 on the treasury for the sum of \$25
 in favor of E. E. McKinney, secre-
 tary, to meet the expenses he has
 paid and his services. Signed by
 committee.

The report as read was adopted.
 On motion an order for the sum of
 \$25 was ordered drawn on the treas-
 ury in favor of E. E. McKinney,
 secretary. The alliance selected the
 city of Eugene as the place for hold-
 ing the next session. On motion
 the legislative committee was named
 consisting of five members, to be
 appointed by the president during
 the interim of this alliance. The
 committee on finance submitted the
 following report, and on motion the
 same was adopted:

To the O. S. T. alliance: We your
 committee on finance, beg leave to
 report as follows: We realize the
 importance of providing funds in
 order that the alliance work may be
 carried out successfully. We would
 suggest that a system of pledges be
 taken from private individuals to
 whatever amounts they may feel
 willing to contribute. If the work,
 as contemplated by the alliance,
 shall be successfully prosecuted, the
 executive committee should be pro-
 vided with the means thereby en-
 abling them to employ a lecturer,
 keeping the lecturer in the field a
 greater portion of the year. We
 feel assured that there are one hun-
 dred persons or more in this state
 that have faith enough in this cause
 to contribute the sum of \$10 per an-
 num. And we would therefore recom-
 mend that the executive commit-
 tee be authorized to solicit from the
 temperance people of this state
 pledges as indicated above, and that
 said executive committee have full
 power to use their best discretion
 and judgment respecting this mat-
 ter. We trust however that in event
 the alliance adopts this report,
 the executive committee will give
 the people an opportunity to respond
 to this most urgent need. Respectively

Mr. W. T. Higdon, of Salem, offer-
 ed the following resolution:
 Resolved, That a committee of
 three be appointed by the chair to
 formulate a plan for organizing the
 Oregon State Temperance Alliance
 upon a more permanent basis look-
 ing towards the establishment of
 subordinate alliances wherein all
 delegates to the annual alliance shall
 be elected.

The same was on motion adopted,
 and referred to the executive com-
 mittee.
 The committee on resolutions sub-
 mitted the following:
 That we thank the late president,
 Rev. C. C. Bateman, for his able ad-
 dress; the secretary for diligent and
 efficient services; the S. P. R. H. Co.
 for reduced fare; the people of
 Salem who opened their homes for
 our entertainment. Signed by com-
 mittee.

The report was adopted. On mo-
 tion the alliance adjourned to meet
 the first Wednesday in December
 next at Eugene.
