POLITICAL.

THE FORCE BILL LAID ON THE SHELF.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—The republican senatorial caucus committee on the order of business met this morning and agreed to recommend to their colleagues that after the apportionment bill is acted upon, the eight hour bill and the copyright bill will be taken up in their order.

The caucus committee also disposed of other pending measures in this order: After the copyright bill is to follow the Indian depredation bill, Padlock's pure food bill, and the Nicaragua canal bill. Meanwhile the individual senators are to be allowed to call up measures not included in the above list in the morning hours, and it is believed that some advancement of business will result from the use of this privilege.

NEW JERSEY FALLS IN LINE.

TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 27.—In both branches of the legislature last night a resolution was made special order for Tuesday night, denouncing the election bill and declaring that the state will withhold an appropriation for the world's fair if the force bill becomes a law.

FIRES.

LODGING HOUSE BURNED—TWO LIVES LOST.

SAN JOSE, Cal., Jan. 27.—This morning a fire broke out in the Central lodging house wholly consuming it. Two men perished in the flames, John Foley, laborer, and Charles Nord, barkeeper. Michael Burns was badly burned about the side and face. Total loss on building about \$7000, the building is one of the oldest in the city.

MISCELLANY.

GOING TO OKLAHOMA.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Jan. 27.—There is a big exodus of negroes from this state to Oklahoma. Fifty families of negroes left here yesterday for Kingfisher, and they will be followed in a few days by 200 more families. A negro by the name of Foster, from Leavenworth, who has been among the negroes some time, is working up the business. He represents to them they can obtain rich farming lands in Oklahoma for almost nothing, and if enough of them go they can secure absolute control of the government of the territory. This latter seems to be the principal inducement. A number of negroes who had good farms have sold out everything and will join in the exodus.

SHOTGUN QUARANTINE.

Houston, Tex., Jan. 27.—The people on the east and west boundaries of Polk county, Tex., have established a genuine shotgun quarantine. Not only is no one allowed to get off on trains in the county, but through interstate passengers are not allowed to pass through it. The state or federal officers are liable to be appealed to.

WEALTH AND SQUALOR.

PARKERSBURG (W. Va.), Jan. 27.—A peculiar case was developed here this morning. A man named Williams was arrested for selling silverware without a license. When the officers visited his house a woman was found lying on two boxes, apparently sick. No food was in the house, and everything indicated the most abject poverty. Closer examination resulted in the discovery of an old trunk, and in it was a small fortune. It was filled in one part with costly lace curtains and shawls and expensive silks and satins. In another part were a great many sets of expensive silverware. The officers continued their search and found a box full of money, including a great many twenty-dollar gold pieces, silver dollars and a roll of greenbacks in hundreds and fifties. The whole amount was well up into the thousands, and yet in every other particular poverty reigned supreme.

FATAL GAS EXPLOSION.

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 27.—A special train from Pittsburg, Pa., says a gas explosion in the Mammoth shaft of the H. C. Frick Coke co's mine, about ten miles from this place, occurred this morning. Between fifty and eighty men were in the mine at the time of the explosion, eight bodies have been taken out. It is estimated that fifty of the men are killed. It is very difficult to get at the particulars of the explosion although it occurred at nine o'clock this morning. The mine are about half way between Latrobe and Mt. Pleasant, the machinery which runs the fan was not damaged, and plenty of fresh air was forced into the mine to sustain the living and allow the rescuing parties to enter

in safety and bring out the bodies. The mine was badly wrecked in places. It is not possible to get an accurate idea of the number of living or the injured who may be buried or imprisoned in the mine. There is no fire in the mine resulting from the explosion. It is said most of those killed are English speaking or German miners. The shaft is about 100 feet deep, and has a number of galleries. The superintendent has organized relief parties and is busily engaged trying to penetrate the mine.

A ballot taken to-day in the legislature of Kansas, resulted as follows: House: Pfeifer 96, Ingalls 23, Blair 5. Senate: Ingalls 35, Pfeifer 20.

Resolutions were adopted in both branches of the Wisconsin legislature this morning approving the action of the United States Senate refusing to consider the Force bill.

BENNETT LAW REPEALED.—MADISON, Wis., Jan. 27.—The democrats, in the lower house, this morning, passed, under suspension of the rules, a bill to repeal the Bennett compulsory educational law.

During a temporary insanity last night, B. B. Hopkins, a prominent Wall street broker, cut his throat in a horrible manner. He is still alive but cannot recover.

The Susquehanna has flooded its banks, and serious damage is feared from the overflow.

In the West Virginia lower house yesterday, a motion was passed that in the event of the passage of the federal election bill the state will make no World's Fair appropriation. Senator St. Clair, the World's Fair commissioner, is making a vigorous fight against it in the senate.

The Savings Bank of Wichita, Kan., is reported to have closed its doors. Liabilities \$31,600, assets given at \$75,000.

The lower branch of the Indiana legislature yesterday, the senate concurring, adopted resolutions deferring to consider an appropriation for the world's fair until the force bill is disposed of. A resolution to the same effect is under consideration in the New York legislature.

In the reichstag yesterday Herr Marlorff proposed that the German government open negotiations with America with reference to the re-negotiation of silver. Herr Bamberg and Dr. Koch, president of the reichstag, opposed it, holding that there was no ground for interfering with the present standard.

S. F. Chronicle: A discussion which arose some months ago relative to the power of counties in California to build and operate railroads is being renewed in some parts of the state and is exciting much interest. The Chronicle has already said that it knows of nothing in the constitution or statutes of California which would prohibit a county from building and operating a railroad within its territorial limits, and it has seen no reason to alter its opinion. Counties may certainly construct and maintain public roads and highways, and it is not doing any violence to the law to assume that public roads may be railroads as well as macadamized roads or any other kind. The railroads in existence uniformly claim themselves to be a public use, when it suits their purpose so to do, and the contention is generally recognized by law.

STATE NOTES.

The constitution of the state of Oregon was the recipient of an airing in the national congress, recently in which the old obsolete clause was brought up and discussed. The dead and long ago buried out of sight idea of excluding colored men from citizenship in the state, seems to be the live idea with Senator George of Mississippi. Oregon has progressed far enough not to observe the old obsolete clause although no repeal of it has been made, and leave it to less progressive states to haggle over such points of disagreement.—Albany Herald.

In control of the leading newspapers at Portland, at Spokane Falls and the Sound cities, the corporations will see to it that open rivers are an impossibility. They will remain so until the people make a political issue of open rivers.

Monmouth Democrat: A North Yamhill liverman reports snow twenty inches deep on the Tillamook road over the mountains, but it has been this winter unusually light. Several teams have gone over since it fell.

Some Union Pacific officials are in Milton, Oregon, seeking to obtain evidence to criminate the ringleaders in the late Chinese crusade. It is reported that the Chinese will be employed as section hands at Milton, and warning has been given the townspeople that if they molest them again trains will go by their city.

Training with the Wrong Band. It would seem that Stewart, the republican senator from Nevada, in openly opposing the cloture rule is in about the fix of the foolish hunter who, having wasted all his ammunition on small game, encountered a grizzly bear. The silver senator was relied on by California, Oregon and his own state to secure reimbursement of those states of large sums of money expended to aid the government during the war of the rebellion. The bill was on the calendar and in a fair way towards passage, when Mr. Stewart joined the democrats in their fight against the gag rule, and by so doing has the wrath of his colleagues in the senate, who declare they will defeat the appropriation bill. The Nevada senator would have done better to let the democrats fight their own battle.—Astorian.

Usually he is accompanied by two or three friends. Just why he deems it necessary to thus seclude himself is another of those things known only to Joe Simon, and he has given ample testimony that he knows how to attend to Simon's own business, and when he thinks it necessary can assist others also. There are times, however, when he comes out of this semi-seclusion mood and makes himself familiar to his brother senators. One of those occasions came up recently when it became evident that a strong feeling had set in in favor of the Australian ballot system, wherein he is liable to be defeated.
