**FORCIBLY REMEMBERED.**—A year ago to-day there was general excitement in the Willamette valley on account of the high water in streams. The Willamette river was assuming the proportions of a great black river and logs and drift wood were coming down freely. In this city the general topic was, "will the bridge stand?" which many were then doubting. On the next day, a year ago to-morrow, the water was still rising, and at noon thousands of people were on the river bank near the bridge, and about two o'clock in the afternoon that great structure began to tremble and about forty minutes later one of the east piers gave way and the Salem bridge went down with a terrible crash. The river kept rising all that night and most of the next day. A few hours after the bridge went out the water works were compelled to shut down on account of the back water. The electric light plant was flooded and the city was thrown into darkness. Wells were overflowing and no water could be had for domestic use, though the city was almost flooded. About 1 o'clock, Feb. 4th, the river reached its highest and at 4 o'clock was beginning to fall. The 5th the steamer Bentley, which had been tied up at this city, went up Independence as a relief boat for the sufferers. The flood cut Salem off without any mail for more than a week. Bridges were out everywhere and reports were coming in from every available point of the destruction from high waters. Though it has only been a year Salem has a steel bridge over the Willamette where the old one stood, and the bridges over Mill creek have been replaced. In the face of all these the valley never was more prosperous than to-day.

**IN THE CLUTCHES OF THE LAW.**—Sheriff E. M. Croisan returned from Portland last night bringing Isaac Mozart, who is charged with stealing horses in this county. The sheriff, assisted by Detective Joe Day, found the three horses missing from this county. They had a difficult task to find them as Mozart had disposed of them to a band of gypsies who are camped in the suburbs of North Portland, and trade, buy and doubtless steal horses for a livelihood. The gypsies had sold the mare of Mr. Croisan to Dr. G. W. King, and that of Dr. Reynolds was still in their possession. The horse of George Rump was still in the care of Mozart and was at what is known as stable No. 1, in South Portland. The officers were two days in securing the stolen animals and were put to their wits' end to devise plans to beat the band of about fifty cunning gypsies, but they succeeded in doing that and securing the three animals. Mozart was up for a hearing this morning in Judge Batchelor's court, when he waived examination and was bound over to wait the action of the grand jury, which meets next Monday.

**WILL OPEN NEXT WEEK.**—Judging by the late news from Russia one might believe it was the land of epidemics, terrible storms, starvation and tyranny, but our Russia at the O. A. R. fair will be all life and gaiety. The bright and beautiful side of the picture will be presented. Scott and Pitcock in the Evening Telegram, and efforts will be made to induce the belief that the Oregonian people are out of the concern, in order to try and influence business. With this in view the office, etc., will be moved from the Oregonian quarters. —Portland Examiner.

## A CITIZEN HELD UP.

The City Raided by a Tough Element—Another House Ransacked—Sunday Night.

C. G. Given, the shoe dealer on State street, was held up Saturday night as he was going home from his store. He lives in North Salem a short distance on the other side of the street car barn, and as he was walking up the car track, within half a block of his home he was met by a man coming down the track. He turned slightly to one side to give the stranger his share of the narrow road, when to his great surprise a big revolver was thrust in his face with an order to give up his money. Mr. Given hesitated a moment and then said: "You want my money?" The robber responded: "Yes, or I'll shoot you." At this Mr. Given struck the arm of the man and at the same time seized him by the neck and in their scuffle they fell into the ditch by the side of the track and in going down they broke their hold and Mr. Given went to the bottom of the ditch. He immediately sprang to his feet, when the robber repeated the request for him to give up his money; he was on the point of complying, but instead he ran for life, expecting at every jump to be shot in the back. The man did not shoot. Mr. Given thinks that in the scramble the revolver was dropped, for the man remained at the spot for some five minutes seemingly hunting for something. The stranger secured Mr. Given's hat and umbrella and left his skull cap in their place. He had in his pocket about \$42 in money when attacked, but says he would not go through the experience again for that sum.

A large crowd of tough looking men have been in and about this city for the past few days. Saturday night Marshal Minto and Captain Dilly went out to the old slaughter house a short distance south of the Southern Pacific depot, and found something like thirty men piled up in those two old buildings. Last night they were out there again and not less than twenty men were there. They were given orders to quit this vicinity immediately. Their looks do not give the impression of their being law abiding citizens. Many of them are big, stalwart men able to do any kind of work. The men claim they are hunting for work and can't find anything to do. From their looks one would not think that they want honest employment.

Another house was entered by burglars in this city last night. This time it was the residence of Wm. Lovelock, on 218 Cottage street, and was entered in the early part of the evening between six and nine o'clock. Mr. Lovelock is in Albany and Mrs. Lovelock was out visiting, there being no one left at home. The burglars made their entrance through the window into the parlor and must have stayed in the house for an hour, for every room had been thoroughly searched. The only thing missing this morning was a gold necklace worth about twenty dollars. It seems money was all that was wanted, as they left a watch chain and some other jewelry, and they had also gone through the drawers containing the silverware and had taken none of that. Every drawer and closet in the house had been ransacked and pockets had been gone through, but the small sum of money in the house was not found. It seems some effort should be made to rid the city of an element that is very undesirable, and one that is causing no little trouble of late.

**DIRECTORS ELECTED.**—The Salem canning company held a meeting Saturday evening in the parlors of the Capital National bank and elected the following directors: J. S. Wallace, H. W. Cottle, J. H. Albert, Dr. J. Reynolds, J. A. Van Ealen; officers—president, R. S. Wallace; vice-president, Dr. J. Reynolds; secretary, Chas. Waller; treasurer, J. H. Albert. The company are well satisfied with their first year's work. The directors will hold another meeting on the 10th of February when the run for next season will be planned and the matter of contracting for the planting of vegetables will be looked after.

**ANOTHER ACCIDENT.**—Wm. Adler, a German employed at the Capital Lumbering mills, met with a painful accident Saturday afternoon. He runs one of the lumber trucks, or "carry all" at the mill which is moved about by one of the yard mules. He went to help one of the teams, which was over loaded, up the hill by hitching his mule in front. In some manner when the mule started the chain caught round his right thumb and pulled it almost off. It was so horribly mangled that amputation was necessary, which was performed late Saturday by Dr. J. N. Smith.

**GRAND CONCERT.**—At the university chapel, Saturday Feb. 7, by the Salem Jubilee singers, assisted by Mrs. Harris and Miss Steiner. **A DANGEROUS GUN.**—Marshall Hawkins, who was arrested Saturday night for assault on Henry Wilson, was arraigned before Recorder M. E. Goodell this afternoon, when he waived examination and was bound over to await the action of the grand jury with bonds fixed at \$250. It seemed impossible to get at the facts in the case as Hawkins is very reticent and talks but little on the subject. There is a wide gulf between the story of Wilson and his friends and that of Hawkins' friends tell. The friends of the latter claim that when Wilson went to the overland train he took a razor and Hawkins had been informed of this fact and armed himself with the razor as a matter of self defense. There has been an ill feeling between the two "niggers" for some time, and only two days before the row on Saturday night, they had some warm words and some threats were made. There was intense excitement in the room where the row occurred and not only Wilson but others thought their time had come. The revolver which was in the hands of Hawkins was a 45-caliber Colt, with a barrel nine inches long and is a dangerous looking gun. Wilson is a full blooded negro and Hawkins a mulatto, and doubtless both have figured in causing the disturbance.

**DANCING IN GOOD EARNEST.**—There is now no question but the Yakima Indians are dancing in good earnest, and those who are qualified to judge say it is more than the customary winter dance to ask the good spirit in favor of plenty of grass for the stock and a good run of salmon. The Yakimas number about 2800, divided into the civilized and the renegades. The former are much the greater in number and are mostly well-to-do farmers, some of them counting their wealth by the tens of thousands. These live near the agency headquarters at Fort Simcoe, own good stock and approved agricultural machinery. The renegades are the blanket Indians who live along the line of the railroad and who are well armed and under the control of medicine men. They have been obtaining much whiskey of late, and are more than usually quarrelsome. Piute runners have been among them and it is said they are combining with Chief Moses' Indians from the north. While no local outbreak is much feared, those who know the temper of the Indians denounce the wisdom of sending the arms from here. The real fear is that they will leave the reservation and join the hostiles.—Harney Valley Items.

## STATE NOTES.

**Columbian.** The prospects are good for a prosperous year in Astoria. A big fleet of ships is headed this way from all parts of the world, and each will disburse some money in this port. Loggers and farmers are all satisfied and the fishermen have high hopes of a good season.

The family of Jack Harlin, of Astoria, is having its share of trouble. A few weeks ago the accidental discharge of a revolver in the hands of his little son came near killing his four-year-old daughter, and on Saturday the little boy who did the shooting fell and broke his leg below the knee.

**Times Mountaineer.** Mr. J. B. Hofer, editor of the Wasco Observer, has been appointed school superintendent of Sherman county, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. C. F. McCarthy. He is thoroughly competent, and will no doubt make a very acceptable official.

Stock thieves abound in Gilliam county, and the stock men of Arlington are subscribing to a fund to employ detectives, who are expected to find out the depredators.

**Columbian.** At high water slack yesterday, the bay was covered with a layer of sawdust and shavings, which is contrary to the law and precepts laid down and ordained. This is doing our harbor an incalculable amount of harm and it should be speedily stopped.

**Mounmouth Democrat.** Last Sunday Mr. Catron had occasion to go to the warehouse very early and saw smoke coming from a box-car. A fire had been built in the car, evidently, but a short time before, whether by incendiaries or drunks is not certain. In the next car were 400 cans of coal oil, so it was a close call.

Misfortunes have followed one another in quick succession to the heads of the present administration. First Sec. Tracy lost his wife and daughter, they being burned to death; then Walter Blaine, son of the secretary of state and assistant to his father, died suddenly of pneumonia, and now comes the sudden death of Secretary Windom, which draws the sympathy of the American people, regardless of party, to the bereaved and afflicted.—East Oregonian.

**West Shore.** The Australian ballot bill has passed the house and been amended in the senate. If the senate had kept its hands off we would have a law that would deal a death blow to political corruption and boss rule in Portland. But that is too much to expect, where the interest in changing is so great. Under the pretext of purifying the primaries an attempt is made to draw its sting. Friends of purity of elections will oppose all efforts to tinker with this bill. Under its provisions the primaries lose much of their importance, since it is easy for any set of men who object to the manner in which a nomination has been secured to have an opposing candidate's name placed on the official ballot, where trickery cannot affect it and where it will be as prominent and as easily voted for as that of the corruptly secured nominee. Give us the law just as it is, without one word added or taken away, and the cause of genuine reform will have gained a lasting victory.

**Beef For The Asiatics.**  
The following sensational story was put on the wires at Chicago as a press dispatch: The English government through the British consul of this city, has been for some time negotiating with Armour & Co. for the establishment of a point in India of a big beef slaughtering and packing house. There is an immense population in India which, on account of caste prejudice, will not touch beef handled by Christians. In addition to this population there is an immense standing army of white men, a large force of clerks in all the government offices and a legion of servants who must be fed. The importation of beef, even for those who will eat it is expensive and hence the British government is seeking to induce Armour & Co. to set up a plant in India whereby the employment of native workmen and strict adherence to caste regulations all objections to the product may be removed. Mr. Darlington, representative of Armour & Co., would not be interviewed on the subject. He politely refused to talk about the report, being absolutely non-committal. It is evident, however, that negotiations of this character are pending.

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## A Correction.

SALEM, Jan. 31, 1891.  
ED. JOURNAL: Permit me to correct an error in your report of the proceedings of the house in yesterday's (30th) issue. My statement was that I had been informed by one of the railroad commissioners that the commission had informed Mr. Koehler of the defective character of the Lake Labish trestle nearly a year before the disaster occurred. I had heard by common report that the commissioners and Mr. Koehler had personally examined the structure.

I have examined the official report of the commission since noticing your error, and see on page 317 that the commission left Portland, Nov. 12, 1889, to examine bridges and trestles of the East side division of the Southern Pacific and among other needed repairs say: "The trestle near Brooks station needs renewal." There is no allusion to Mr. Koehler's presence or proof that he was ever notified or that the trestle near Brooks station was north or south. This portion of the commission's report contains reasons in its indefiniteness, for a single commissioner, so that the public and its representatives can prove with more certainty who are responsible.

A very natural question for readers of the report alluded to above is: Did the commission ever formally notify Superintendent Koehler of the need of renewal of the trestle near Brooks station, and if so what became of the correspondence?
