FOREIGN.
CANADIAN PARLIAMENT DISSOLVED
TORONTO, Feb. 3.—The Empire,
chief organ of the Dominion govern-
ment, announces this morning that
the governor general has dissolved
the house of commons and issued
writs for a new parliament. The
Empire says it is understood the
Dominion government has, through
her majesty's government, made
certain proposals to the United States
government looking to the exten-
sion of our commerce with that
country. This proposal has been
submitted to the president for his
consideration, and the Canadian
government is of the opinion that
these negotiations will result in a
treaty which must be drafted by
parliament. It is evident the gov-
ernment wishes to deal with a
parliament fresh from the people,
rather than the present body.

POLITICAL.
WANT FREE SILVER COINAGE.
BOSTON, Feb. 3.—The United labor
alliance, composed of leading mem-
bers of trades union, knights of labor,
nationalists and socialists, last night
adopted a resolution setting forth
that the sentiment of the people of
Boston on the free silver coinage bill
was misrepresented by bankers and
money lenders at the meeting re-
cently held in Faneuil hall.

MISCELLANY.
SNOW IN NEW MEXICO.
ALBUQUERQUE, Feb. 3.—Snow
has been falling all day in the
mountains east of the city, and
rumor has it that it is the
heaviest experienced for years. On
the mountain division of the Santa
Fe road an immense snow storm
is prevailing and passenger trains
are delayed many hours. While it
is predicted that great suffering among
the cattle will come from the pierc-
ing cold that always follows a snow-
storm in that high altitude, still
the snow will nourish the ground
and grass be in abundance in the
spring.

GREEN GOODS MEN TAKEN IN.
EURE, Pa., Feb. 3.—Charles and
Eugene Bureau, two "green goods"
swindlers, were arrested by constable
Shirley near Union City last night
in a very clever manner. They had
audaciously appointed with Miles
Watrod, a butcher, to meet him in
the woods near that place and for
\$500 deliver to him \$5000 in spurious
currency. Watrod concealed the
constable in a large meat box on his
wagon, where the officer overheard
all the conversation. At the proper
time, with Watrod's aid he captured
the swindlers.

A COAD WANE.
ST. PAUL, Feb. 3.—Last night all
over the Northwest and in this city
the mercury fell from 15 to 20 de-
grees below zero, and this morning
it was about 7 below.

STOLEN POOL.
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 3.—A
joint committee of the house and
senate has adopted a resolution re-
fusing to recommend any appropria-
tion for the Columbian Exposition
owing to the large deficiency in the
treasury caused by the speculation
of the state treasurer.

ATLANTA, Feb. 3.—The fast of
George Harris has come to an end,
but as expected by his death.
He has finally yielded to the impor-
tunities of his friends and agreed to
try to recover his health. When on
the 21st he first awoke, he was
apparently in the last stages of
a chronic stomach disease with
which he has suffered all his life.
Now it is said by physicians that
his long fast may have had the
effect of doing what forty years of
medical treatment could not accom-
plish. It has cured him of a mal-
ady which has made his life a
burden.

LEGISLATIVE REVIEW.
The members of the house are get-
ting their voice.
The house voted down Rep. Jen-
nings' bill for greater publicity to the
delinquent taxpayers.
Rep. Minto has the honor of being
the man to first win applause from
the house.
The house Police Commissioner
bill, to destroy Jo Simon's perpetual
grip upon that city has gone to the
sleep that knows no waking in the
senate," said Rep. Hall.

It was announced Tuesday morn-
ing that the senate would at an early
hour retreat from its amendments to
the Australian ballot law. So be it.
Rep. Moore suggested that as the
governor had the power to appoint
all the regents of the state agricul-
tural college, it was no one's fault if
they were not farmers and mechan-
ics.
The senate carried out its orders
this morning, and stood by the Si-
mon amendments, asking a confer-
ence committee. If the conference
of representatives and senators on
this committee result in disagree-
ment, the Australian ballot law is
killed. If the conference agrees,
"mid or midout" the Simon amend-
ments, one house or the other will
refuse to receive the report. The
chances are ten to one that the bill
will be killed.

Reference by members to the
JOURNAL'S supply of free reading
matter for the state prison probably
defeated the appropriation of \$1,000
for a state prison library. The ben-
eficial report of the Supt. contains
this in the chapter on "Reports":
"The legislature should provide funds for
the maintenance and increase of the
prisoners' library. Many of the
prisoners are not only able to read,
but are men of much more than av-
erage education. Every man of in-
tellect has realized the uplifting
power of a good book. The Salem
CAPITAL JOURNAL has very kindly
assisted materially increasing the
present library by donating and sol-
iciting donations of books and mag-
azines."

PARAGRAPHS.
Supt. Keighly, of the ill-fated

McCreary, of Kentucky has intro-
duced a resolution in the house set-
ting aside Feb. 15 for the considera-
tion of the senate silver bill to be
considered from day to day until
disposed of.
Michael Eyraud, murderer of No-
tary B. Gouffé, was guillotined in
Paris this morning. He met his
fate with fortitude and resignation.
There were but few witnesses of
the execution, owing to the fact
that the time it was to take place
was not generally known.

Senator Fair while on a visit to
one of his ranches, caught his foot
while walking and fell accidentally.
He struck the side of his head on a
broken bottle, cutting his ear en-
tirely into two, his head was also cut
badly back of the ear.
L. B. Imboden, president of the
England Trust & Savings bank, at
Fort Worth, Texas, has been in-
dicted for forgery to the amount of
\$12,000, and embezzling and embez-
zlement for \$10,000 more.

Mr. Plimmo, champion of the
rights of seamen and of the humane
treatment of cattle on ships, had a
grand reception in Liverpool Sat-
urday. He was met by a throng of
300 and conveyed in a carriage
with outriders, bands, and banners
to the station, where he made an
address to a vast and attentive
throng.
Gen. H. A. Morrow, commanding
the 1st United States Infantry, died at
Hot Springs, Ark., a day or two
ago. His station was at Fort Sid-
ney, Neb., but he had gone to the
Hot Springs for the benefit of his
health.

for some time. On Friday he ordered
some liquor and carried it to his

and went for a drive, and it was
with the utmost care that he was
kept from falling from the sleigh.

He returned to his hotel shortly
after 3 o'clock and went to ascend
the stairway. When near the top
he reeled over and fell, head down-
ward, a distance of ten feet, striking
on a pile of trunks. After being
carried to his room an examination
was held and his nose was found to
be broken. Three of his ribs were
broken and his spine was injured.
It was not until 9 a. m. that he could
be aroused from his stupor. He is
now conscious at times and may
recover.

The Horrors of Sweating.
Every reader has heard of the "sweat-
ing system," but no one can realize what
it is unless he or she has seen it in
operation. I have been of it only in
connection with the manufacture of
clothing, which flourishes in the dirtiest
and meanest and most poverty stricken
section of the east side. The wayfarer
in the streets abutting on the east side
of the Doreway, where the population is
densest and the laborers and their
surroundings the filthiest, can hear at
almost every hour of the day and night,
week days and Sundays, the whir of the
sewing machines in the tenement houses.

The "sweater" is usually a man who
has been long enough in this country to
acquire sufficient money to purchase a
few sewing machines. He knows he can
get any number of ignorant male and
female immigrants to do the work at his
prices, and he never hesitates to take
advantage of their poverty and igno-
rance, which he turns to his own advan-
tage. He pretends to pay his hands
stipulated wages, but imposes a task,
to accomplish which requires continuous
work for twelve or fourteen hours and
more a day.

He uses his apartments in a vile tenement
for his work rooms, and all the
functions of family life are performed
in three or four cramped rooms, in many
of which I have seen a score of men
and women, half clad, at work. The
garments are piled on floor, bed and
tables. The rugs are usually a foot deep,
for there is no time for cleanliness.
Every sanitary law is violated and the
health of the operatives is never consid-
ered. Disease of every kind stalks
through the district, but is unheeded in
the desire to make money, and there is
no doubt that the germs of all sorts of
diseases are transmitted throughout the
land in the garments made in the dens
of the sweaters.

The labor leaders have time and time
again started agitations against this sys-
tem of tenement house work; its evils
and miseries have been written about in
the newspapers. But still it exists. The
only power to break it up is that of the
manufacturers, and it does not seem to
suit their purposes to interfere either on
behalf of the public whose health is at
stake or of the poor benighted creatures
whose necessities force them to accept
such revolting conditions.—J. T. Mc-
Keachie in New York Press.

Hotted Down.
The gentleman who has charge of the
labor column of The New York Evening
World mixes some gems of thought
with his news items. Here are some
samples, taken at random:
All earnest agitators feel it to be their
duty to create a sense of dissatisfaction
among the laboring classes, as discontent
is the only incentive to make the
masses move.

We have reached the point in this
country where the condition of all classes
of workmen—agricultural, mechanical
and unskilled—begin to feel the pressure
that is bearing them down, but do not
realize what the power really is.
While labor organizations have accom-
plished much in ameliorating the
condition of the workmen through
organization, the main lever that must
ultimately lift them out of serfdom has
remained unused. That lever is the bal-
lot box.

Without bureaus of labor statistics
the labor movement would not have one-
tenth part of the ammunition of fact
and argument wherewith to demolish
the sophistries of the flunkies of capital-
ism who from pulpit and desk attempt
to controvert the logic of political econ-
omy.
Between the years 1870 and 1880 the
number of children employed at pro-
ductive industries in this country in-
creased 58 per cent, while the number
of grown persons increased but 24 per
cent. Over 64 per cent of the whole
number of children at work had not at-
tended school twenty weeks in any one
year.

It is not many years since labor unions
were sneered at, the leaders denounced
as demagogues, and the rank and file
scolded at by the wisacres. But a won-
derous transformation has been brought
about, all in a few short years—because
the unions have become a power, and
yet, the power of all the hundreds of
thousands of organized workmen will be
naught when compared with the power
of but three men—Vanderbilt, Gould
and Astor—as long as the workers ab-
stain from using their power politically.

K. of L. Miners Prepared.
The miners' assemblies of the Knights
are preparing for the general strike in
May for eight hours. A prominent
Knight says: "Our plans are all laid,
and when the word comes we will be
organized in a fashion that will astonish
the country. Powerfully do not like
striking, but he cannot help going into
this one. Pat McBride, of the National
miners, has his end ready, and there can
be no hitch. We have accumulated
money rapidly lately, and can hold out
a year at least. The strike will be in
every coal region in this country; not
one is missed. We have big assemblies
in localities where it is not known that
there is a Knight. Things have been
kept very secret, but we are ready."—
Detroit News.

Very Bad If True.
Last summer the London county council
acquired in the eight hour demand,
and made eight hours a day's work for a
large number of men employed in the
drainage works. A short time ago it
was compelled to pass a regulation for-
bidding these men to spend their leisure
hours in earning money elsewhere.—
New York News.

Congressman Amos J. Cummings, who
ought to know, says that without the
aid of the National Typographical union
and its printers the copyright bill could
not have passed the house.

The labor organizations of Pennsylvania
will keep a sharp eye on Harrisburg
during the session of the state legisla-
ture. They want several labor bills
adopted.
