AN ISSUE TO BE MET.
Senator Mitchell's Argument for the Popular Election of Senators.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—The Post says: The question of electing senators by the people has become a prominent one in political circles. On the senate side of the Capitol the idea has a strong supporter in Senator Mitchell, of Oregon, who made a logical and able speech in favor of it about a year ago. In this speech he pointed out that the election of senators by the people was considered by the founders of the government and that the election by the legislature was fully adopted only as a compromise between the appointment of the senators by the president on the one extreme and the election by the people on the other.

Senator Mitchell believes that the movement will result in benefit to all concerned, because it looks to the right of the people to be heard directly in the election of senators. "It will bring the people," says Senator Mitchell, "and the senate into more amicable relations. It will remove the prejudices now existing and which are fast becoming deeply fastened upon the public mind; it will invoke a spirit of forbearance and respect as between the senate and the people, which unfortunately does not exist to that degree that is desirable; it will dissipate all cause and excuse for unjust criticism; it will tend to elevate the character, advance the dignity, increase the usefulness and extend the influence and justly magnify the power of the senate, and at the same time promote the welfare of all the people of the republic."

ITEMS FROM THE RURAL PRESS.

I confidently believe that its restoration to a perfect equality with gold as to coinage, bullion and certificates, based upon the ratio fixed by our laws, will be greatly beneficial in restoring prices of farm products to an average that will be remunerative, if not profitable, to the producers."

Tacoma Globe: The political success of the granger movement is becoming to have its influence upon the legislation in the several states. The rate of interest is one of the first objects of attack. In Missouri a bill has been introduced making the legal rate six per cent, and providing that where usury is charged the principal shall be forfeited to the school fund. In Illinois a similar bill reduces the rate to six per cent. In Nebraska a bill makes all contracts for usury void, and usury an indictable offense, and in Minnesota a bill makes the maximum rate eight per cent.

Albany Herald: The question of the election of the United States senators by a direct vote of the people is gaining ground all over the country. Recent peculiarities regarding the election of certain United States senators has caused some discussion of the proposition in Washington. This proposition has a strong supporter in Senator Mitchell, of Oregon.

Oregon spent \$15,000 last term for such luxuries and as much more will go that way this year.
