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SENATOR SIMON'S TYRANNICAL

The Idea.

ED. JOURNAL: There are so

many ideas in Oregon, and especial-

ly in Salem just now, it seems every

one has an idea of his own. It is a

good idea our chief of police has

resolved to carry out the law. He

says no man shall have it to say he

has not done his whole duty. It

seems he has an idea his first duty

is to replenish our city treasury, and

that is right.

Again, concerning ideas, isn't it

an idea that the people's choice men

of our state, who come here to

make our laws, men whom we natu-

rally look to and expect will set an

example for us and for our boys,

that some of them, (of course there

are exceptions, just as soon as they

are placed upon a committee chose

for their clerk some stranger. Some

from California or some other state,

who pleads poverty, has three dear

little children to support and a big

lawsuit pending with her brother-

in-law, perhaps. Not even able to

pay her hotel bill while waiting here

for a position in our legislature, and

not even able to behave herself in a

lodging house, poor soul! What

deep trouble she has, no one can

describe it, no tongue can tell. So

this tender-hearted committee, after

hearing the plaintive wail and be-

holding the great tears as they fell

from those beautiful dark eyes hid-

den by the golden spectacles, down

to the pure white curls of the

Angora, almost moved to tears of

sympathy, give her the position.

They are so sorry for her, and right

they should be. But at the same

time look back a little farther, there

stand waiting untold numbers of

poor, honest girls and boys of our

own state who really need the po-

sition and deserve it, worthy and

competent. They are rejected by

those whose duty it is to help en-

courage them. What an idea! Is it

right? Would it not have been a

bright idea and a right idea for that

committee to have said to the former

described applicant: "We do really

feel for you, and with all our heart

but advise you to go home to your

own state or wherever you belong.

Look at our needy ones at home,

here our charity must begin, we

must assist our own first." Such a

decision would have been an honor

to that committee or any set of men

whom the people may have chosen

to fill a responsible place. The

principle would have been cherished

in our memories, for we have a right

to note their work while here

among us either for honor or dis-

honor.

PRINCESS PAULINE METTERNICH.

A Young Wife's Error and the Hus-

band's Revenge.

A Vienna dispatch of recent date

gives the following sensational de-

tails of a tragedy in high life:

No such sensation has occurred in

court circle here since the mysteri-

ous death of Crown Prince Rudolph

as that caused by the circumstances

surrounding the demise of the

daughter and son-in-law of the fa-

mous Princess Pauline Metternich.

out about it. When a few months

Waldstein, nee Metternich, was

found
