POLITICAL.

SENATE EXTRA SESSION.
New York, Feb. 7.—The Sun has no editorial saying a proclamation from the president may be expected, probably before the 20th or 25th of this month calling an extra session of the senate to meet in Washington on or about the 4th of March. The business will be of more than ordinary importance.

WASHINGTON.

AN INDIAN POW WOW.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—A conference began this morning between Secretary Noble and the Indian delegation. The Secretary of war and Mrs. and Miss Procter, Mrs. Noble and Miss Halstead were present. John Grass, speaking through an interpreter, said the Indians did not desire to be driven back to their wild life, but wished to consult with the president so as to determine upon the future. The Indians thought the agents should be civilians rather than military. The agents of late years, he said, are good men.

MISCELLANY.

FATAL PRIZE FIGHT.
SEATTLE, Feb. 7.—John Shaffer, local boxer, engaged in a seven round contest with Billy Doyle at the People's theatre late last night. Doyle succeeded in administering considerable punishment to his opponent, and in the seventh round knocked him out by a right hander swing on the jaw. Shaffer never regained consciousness and died a few hours later. Joe Watkins, proprietor of the theatre, has been arrested. Doyle has thus far eluded capture.

PARAGRAPHS.

The elders of the United Brethren church, in Abeline, Kansas, have expelled Bishop Engel from the ministry for "indecent financialing." The bishop speculated in Kansas real estate, and failed for \$50,000. A jealous man attacked his wife with a hatchet and knife, in Philadelphia on Friday. He escaped with no fatal injuries. He then fatally cut his own throat.

Chas. Knothe, a clerk in the employ of Handy & Co., New York jeweler, got away with \$5,000 worth of their stock. He was traced to San Francisco and there lost. On Friday he returned to New York and was arrested with pawn tickets for \$200 in his pocket.

Several prosecutions are pending in Germany for the violation of the law prohibiting the importation of American hog products, it being alleged that had been imported by way of Holland.

In Montreal a fund is being started by wealthy manufacturers who desire a high protective tariff, to furnish money to re-elect McDonald and oppose reciprocity. It is stated that one merchant alone subscribed \$50,000.

The Alabama legislature on Friday passed a bill levying a special tax of half a mill for the relief and care of disabled ex-confederate soldiers and the widows and orphans of the dead.

Mike Wilkes, a famous pacer, while racing on the ice on Friday at Stillwater, Minn., dropped dead. He was fourteen years old and valued at \$5000.

The Indiana state senate has passed a bill against trusts, being a measure. A violation of its provisions is made punishable by fine of \$10,000 to \$100,000, and two to five years imprisonment.

It has now come to light that a young man, (Patsy Devine) hanged in Alton, Ill., for murder, is the wrong man. The evidence was purely circumstantial and he protested his innocence to the last. Fresh facts have since come to knowledge, and the real criminal is now known.

Some evil disposed persons having started an Indian scare, the settlers in Kitson, Co., Minn., and Lake of the Woods are leaving their homes, and abandoning their cattle. Many are in destitute circumstances.

LEGISLATIVE REVIEW.

JOURNAL Editorial Headquarters.
Legislative Assembly.

The senate acted wisely when it refused to appropriate money for a state law library at Pendleton. The proper place for the state law library is at the state capitol.

Friday afternoon Senator Veach's bill failed to pass the senate providing for the repeal of the act creating a railroad commission. Veach supported his measure with a long argument for retrenchment and reform, and when placed upon final passage the bill lacked but two votes of going through. The JOURNAL favors the republican idea of a good, strong and competent railroad commission, with powers to enforce existing laws regulating railways. Such a bill has, we believe, been introduced into and will pass the house.

Friday evening, at the special session of the senate, Mr. Fullerton, chairman of the conference committee on the Australian ballot bill, reported that the house and senate members of that committee had failed to agree. Senator Cogswell then moved that the senate recede from its amendments to that bill, and in support of that motion began to impugn the motives of the members of the committee from the house, but this was promptly checked by Senator Tongue, who had so nobly championed the people's rights. The motion to recede was then agreed to unanimously.

The Australian ballot bill without amendment has passed both houses, and will become a law as soon as it receives the governor's signature.

The (bug commission) bill, relating to the horticultural commission, was made special order for Tuesday evening. If this commission is continued, it should be made more effective. Its duties should be more distinctly outlined. Ample provision should be made for dissemination of knowledge pertaining to fruit growing, and examination of orchard pests.

House Bill, No. 277—By Armstrong, by request. This is a general amendment of the "moral laws" of Salem, increasing powers of city to improve and extend streets, construct and repair sewers, sidewalks, drains, to collect taxes, establish a city hospital, prevent introduction of contagious diseases, "to provide for the health, cleanliness, ornament, improvement, peace and good order of the city." The bill is practically a new police charter and financial regulation of the city. City Attorney Richardson has drawn this new charter.

House bill No. 279—By Baker, by request. Defines new boundaries of city of Salem as follows: Runs north along middle of slough, to Myers street; then east to Bush tract; then north to present limits; then east along Bush tract; then south between Bush tract and Yew park; then east to railroad; north along track and east around Capital park to Mill creek; east on creek to state penitentiary lands; then north to Parrish tract; then west to Capital tract; north on Capital to Market; west on Market to 9th; north six blocks on 9th west to 4th street; south on 4th to Oak; east on Oak to 5th; south on 5th to Mill; east on Mill to 8th; if extended; then south to Creek on Winter street; down center of Mill creek to river; then south to place of beginning. This bill leaves out tracts of A. Bush, R. P. Boise, and all of North Salem west of 4th street and Highland park.

The Oregonian, Feb. 6, exultingly announces: "A complete victory scored by the anti-Simon leaders in the senate yesterday! ALL THEIR amendments adopted!" Yet the Oregonian has day after day told the people that no one but the Multnomah delegation would oppose his amendments in the house. Here, Simon knocked out in the senate, and the amendments of the anti-Simon men adopted. If he is knocked out in the senate what show will he stand in the house? While the Oregonian has sought in every way to hold up the hands of bossism, the JOURNAL was found on the side of the people. The Oregonian exults over a triumph which it did its best to avert.

THE HAWKINS CASE.

How the Colored Row Originated.

BOTH HAWKINS AND WILSON CARRIED WEAPONS.

Both Will Have to be Indicted or the Case Dropped.

THE HAWKINS-WILSON COLORED IMBROGLIO.

Feb. 2, Hawkins was charged before the city recorder with carrying a dangerous weapon and assaulting one Wilson therewith. Hawkins waived examination. Wilson, who was the only prosecuting witness, gave out that Hawkins had been before tried for a criminal attack and had served a term in the Spokane penitentiary. But there is absolutely no evidence of this character, and the reports are undoubtedly put in circulation to prejudice his chances.

THE POLICE.

The police were interviewed and said that they had no trouble with Hawkins. He was quiet, sober, orderly, industrious, and bore a good character among his fellows, who had implicit confidence in him as a laborer and a gentleman. They are all of opinion that he has been provoked into his criminal conduct and that his provocation was great, and that he is not criminal in any way.

HAWKINS'S STATEMENT.

On the evening of 29th Wilson was sent by the landlord to tell Hawkins that he was not wanted in the house. On Jan. 13 Hawkins had quit work voluntarily. Wilson ordered Hawkins out in an abusive manner. Then Wilson stepped into his bedroom and came out with something in his pocket and his hand upon it. After coming out of the room he said Mr. Wagner ordered him to go. Wilson had told other help that he would make Hawkins jump out of the house like a rabbit. In going down stairs Wilson followed Hawkins closely, threatening to use force, and on the way down he kept his hand in his pocket. Hawkins then asked Mr. Wagner if he had forbidden him the house, and was told that he had. Hawkins then avoided the house, and Wilson kept on his abusive talk "about mauling him in the mouth," etc., if he, Hawkins, ever approached him again on the subject. A few nights before the trouble, Hawkins asked Wilson what he meant by such abusive talk. He said he only discharged his duty in obeying orders, and again talked very boisterous, and repeated that he had made him jump out of the house like a rabbit. It feeling continued between them. This was known to all the colored men and Wilson continued to boast of making Hawkins take to his heels repeatedly.

The Saturday night of the row, Hawkins happened to be on the walk near the hotel and as the feeling between the two was red-hot by this time, as Wilson left his saw Hawkins and, as the latter believes, immediately reached for his weapon. Hawkins would not run and claims he only put himself on the defensive, as he was certain Wilson had a razor ready and would have cut him as Hawkins' friends knew Wilson had a razor for that purpose.

Hawkins came to Portland from Spokane and refers to officials at either place as to his standing. His mistake was in going into the hotel to settle a grudge entirely personal to himself, and if he has committed a crime it was in creating a disturbance in The Willamette. If anyone has a case against him it is Mr. Wagner and not Wilson. It will appear that Hawkins only defended himself against Wilson, and never wanted to shoot him, as he had plenty of opportunities to do so, but did want to meet him in a fist encounter if a fair chance had been given him.

The JOURNAL has no interest in the matter but does not want to see the city and county and state put to great expense over a personal feud between two colored men, whose conduct shows both were excited to fury over almost nothing. The expense of trial and conviction should not be incurred, if it appears that this was only a personal feud for which both were equally to blame, and when for similar quarrels, other classes of citizens would not be even arrested.

The grand jury should not make a state case out of a petty jealousy and strife between two half-crazed "coons," who are otherwise peaceable hard working men.
