## THE UMATILLA RESERVATION.

After a delay of ten years the long-expected proclamation for opening that grand body of land known as the Umatilla Indian reservation has been received, setting the date of sale for April 1. The land to be sold involves rich farming, grazing and timber land adjoining the city of Pendleton, Oregon, comprising 140,000 acres. It sells at public auction to actual settlers only. There is tremendous excitement and the citizens of Pendleton are having a celebration over the good news. The people of Eastern Oregon have been laboring for many years to have this tract of land thrown open for settlement, and now justly feel elated over their success, or rather the prosperity it will bring to that district.

**PACIFIC COAST HOPS.**—In 1889 there were 3,955 acres planted in hops in Washington, which yielded 35,128 bales. In 1890 the acreage was increased 4,538 and the product 42,415 bales. In Oregon there were 16,908 produced in 1889, and 28,130 bales in 1890. Each of these states shows a handsome increase for the year 1890 over the preceding year. California's product for 1890 was less than for 1889, there being but 28,130 bales gathered as against 35,230 bales the year before. The indications are that more acres will be planted in hops in Oregon the coming season than there were last year.

**VISITING THE SCHOOLS.**—The school directors of district number 24 spent yesterday afternoon visiting the school in South Salem, and to-day were at the North Salem school. They intend to visit all the public schools in the city and make a thorough investigation of the methods of instruction in each school. They are well pleased with what they have seen so far. The schools are all full and in good condition. The attendance has been good when it is considered that there are about 1200 pupils in the schools. The health of the pupils has also been good.

**THE POTATO MARKET.**—Fruiters who are now holding potatoes for a high price have missed it. Portland dealers who a short time ago were paying \$1.20 per cental for them will pay but 70 cents per cental now, and will not buy large lots at that price. The price of onions has also taken a drop. The local market for potatoes has also dropped from 60 cents to 50 cents per bushel. Many have made the mistake this year of holding both their potatoes and wheat for a better market. Wheat is now only 62 1/2 cents, while in the fall it was 67 cents per bushel.

**HOW THEY LIKE IT.**—One of the most prominent and independent republicans in Marion county, in renewing his subscription has the following kind words for the Journal: "Your paper is the one published in Salem that deserves the support of the people and the only one that does not appear to wear a collar. The republicans of this county, will, I think, appreciate your efforts to purify the party and make it deserving the confidence of the people by giving your paper a hearty support."

**WILL HAVE A HOME.**—The bill has at last got through the Oregon legislature for a home on the state capitol. The bill which originated in the senate was scaled a little by the house committee. It now stands as it passed both houses, \$50,000 for home, \$20,000 for heating apparatus and \$10,000 for remodeling the representatives hall, so that a speaker can be heard. An effort has been made at each legislature for several years, to get such an appropriation, but all efforts heretofore have failed.

the credit to the state that it should be, and it did not make the favorable impression on strangers of the prosperous condition of the state that such a capitol should.

The question was thoroughly discussed by a number of members. The bill passed by a vote of 43 to 14. S B No 10—By Moore, to authorize Columbia county to construct and maintain certain bridges. Passed.

S B No 11—By Willis, to amend sec 2897 of the laws of Oregon, as compiled by W. Lair Hill, relating to guardians and wards. Passed.

S B No 48—By Watkins, to amend an act to appoint times and places of holding terms of the supreme court. Passed.

S B No 6—By Watkins, to appropriate \$60,000 for the construction of a portage railroad between The Dalles and Celilo. Passed.

S B No 131—By Sinclair, amending the laws regulating fees and per diem of assessors and commissioners. Referred to Multnomah delegation for amendments, to report at any time.

S B No 14—By Croso, to regulate the recording of town plats and cemetery plats, and to provide for the preservation of the same. Passed.

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## NEWBERG ITEMS.

Feb. 9, 1891.

Revivals seem to be the order of the day in the Friends church in Oregon this winter. Protracted meetings have been held at Newburg, led by Rev. J. H. Douglas, of Des Moines, Iowa, covering over three weeks; and at Middleton, led by Mrs. Anna Winslow, late of Kansas, but now a resident of Marion, Oregon. Others are expected to follow at Snooks, where a new church is about finished, and later at Marion and Salem and possibly at Portland. Immediate results, many conversions, and many additions to the church—though some join other churches. The preaching and teaching are purely evangelical; sectarianism plays no part in this work. Yesterday (Sunday) will long be remembered among the members, on account of the public reception of fifty-seven into the church at Newburg. These are mostly new converts, but some were received by letter from other churches and from Friends church in other places.

And these revivals and times of refreshing I think of our government, perhaps, the best form of government in the world, and tremble when I think of the judgments of God against the rulers of every age who led the people into wickedness. "Righteousness exalteth a nation; but sin is a reproach to any people."

I have watched with deep interest the political skirmishing of those intrusted with law-making power in the legislative halls of our own state and other states and in congress; I wonder if they realize the storm that is gathering—the popular indignation that is rising up all over our land which is liable to culminate in a reign of terror such as the world has never seen.

It seems strange indeed that political "bosses" and corruptionists, some of whom are on exhibition in our present legislature, do not know or care that the people are learning to regard them as the very worst class of anarchists; and if our country is to be saved from the reign of terror which will follow when the other class of anarchists and dynamiters spring upon them like tiger cats; it will be brought about by law makers heeding the injunction, "All things whatsoever ye would that others should do unto you do ye even so unto them."

I am glad to note that the CAPITAL JOURNAL, on the side of justice and the people's interests—Jesus, the Lord from heaven, said, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness"—and we need as a nation of free people, who elect our own law makers, to remember this always, and to apply it to our political life. Righteousness in politics, that is what we want. Not of the pharisaical kind, but the righteous-ness of God. When we lay our reforms on this foundation, we will soon find unity enough to cement all the reform factions into one political party, at the ballot box, and thus achieve the greatest revolution without one drop of bloodshed, save that shed on Calvary for us all, and which is the chief factor in every lasting reform.
