Feb. 13, '91.

After roll call. Concurrent resolution.

No 22—By Armstrong, that the secretary of state be authorized to have compiled and published a history of the early Indian wars of Oregon and of the early pioneers, and to expend not to exceed \$1,500 therefor. That the work be compiled by Mrs. Francis Fuller Victor, and that the book be sold at cost of compilation and publication. That if a sufficient sum remain, a pamphlet showing the services of Indian war veterans be published for distribution among said veterans.

Minto favored the adoption of the resolution, for the purpose of getting the names of the veterans of such wars on record.

Armstrong said this measure would be a source of revenue rather than an expense, because the books when printed would sell very readily at \$2 each. The resolution was adopted.

Resolved, That not only as a capital during the nation's long and terrible struggle for the Union, as a patriotic and liberty-loving, but an ambitious citizen in times of peace, General Sherman has been entitled to the highest esteem and gratitude of millions of American freemen, and his name and the record of his deeds to render through succeeding generations that of a truly great soldier and excellent patriot. THE RACE PROBLEM.

The lecture at the University chapel on Wednesday evening, by Thos. Brown, the colored minister, of Portland, was well attended, and he gave an interesting address. The JOURNAL gives a short synopsis of this talk. "Education, wealth and religion are the only grand and sublime means by which the race problem can be solved, and this must be done by the colored man himself, and not by his friends. Let every colored youth have an education and a moral character, and he will solve his own problem. They are fast coming to the front in educational interests. When the colored race as a nation had no conception of the grand principles of education; only a faint aid of the Christian philanthropists of this and other lands, he has become learned and able in the professions of the day and in a great degree he is becoming able to cope with his white neighbors. We have over 16,000 colored school teachers in the United States; and we have over 25 colleges and seminaries founded, supported and taught by the race. These and other noble characters are fast solving the race problem of race problem. The negro's proficiency to occupy the various positions of trust should remove all doubt from the prejudiced mind as to his capabilities. The moral and religious progress is seen all along the line since his emancipation. The large number of churches and heavy members in show their eminent progress in this line. We have 250 weekly newspapers and not less than 400 authors of no mean reputation, and our professional and scientific men keep abreast of the times. The colored man has made a reputation for himself as a mechanic. He has shown himself active in all the great movements in reformation. He is active in all the orders of benevolent societies and many of them have accumulated great wealth and know how to handle it. Curly locks and black complexion cannot forfeit nature's claims. Sins may differ, but affection and abilities dwell in white and black the same."
