### WASHINGTON.

**SENATE PROCEEDINGS.**  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—The credentials of Wm. F. Vilas, senator from Wisconsin, for the term commencing March 4th next were presented and placed on file. A resolution reported yesterday, authorizing the selection of a committee on relations with Canada to continue its investigations during recess, agreed to.

**BILLS SIGNED.**  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—The president has signed the act for the cancellation of the contract for the improvement of the Columbia river, in Oregon and Washington; also the act for the disposal of Fort Ellis reservation; the act to ratify agreements with the Sac and Fox Indians, also 63 private pension bills.

### MISCELLANY.

**PORTAGE COMMITTEE.**  
PORTLAND, Feb. 14.—The meeting of the two special committees appointed by the Oregon and Washington legislatures to consider the feasibility of joint action in building a portage system at the Cascades and The Dalles resumed to-day at 10 a. m. Several engineers appeared before the committee and gave estimates and views as to the practicability of the scheme. No definite action was taken. The committee is still in session.

**TO BE COURT MARTIALED.**  
ST. LOUIS, Feb. 14.—A special from San Antonio says Captain Harry Wessels, Co. H, 3d Cavalry, is to be court martialed under orders from the secretary of war, on the charge that he accused his superior officer, General Stanley, of drunkenness and incompetency, because the latter refused him a furlough when ordered to be in readiness to go to the Sioux country.

**A VENAL JUDGE.**  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—The house committee on judiciary today adopted unanimously a report of the sub-committee that investigated allegations of corruption in the United States courts, recommending the impeachment of United States Judge Boardman of the Northern district of Louisiana, for converting to his personal use moneys paid into his court.

### CRIMINAL.

**MEXICAN BANDITS.**  
MARFA, Texas, Feb. 14.—A band of Mexicans visited the ranch of Victoriano Hernandez last night. They killed Oscar Duke, an 11 year old boy, and wounded Victoriano Hernandez, 75 years old. A son who was concealed, wounded one of the desperadoes. Ranchmen trailed about 20 miles going toward Rio Grande.

**DYNAMITER TO BE TRIED.**  
CHICAGO, Feb. 14.—It was decided today to lay the case of George J. Gibson, the alleged dynamiter and secretary to the whiskey trust, before a state, rather than before a federal grand jury, as under the state law it is possible to inflict more severe penalties than under the federal law.

## SURRENDERED AT LAST.

Gen. Sherman Draws His Last Breath at 1:50 This Afternoon.  
NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—12 noon: Gen. Sherman's condition is unchanged—since the last bulletin. The family is still at his bedside, and death momentarily expected. At 10 Gen. Thos. Ewing, Jr. said no more bulletins would be issued until the final one. The general remains at the point of death, and his dissolution is a question of a few minutes.

During the forenoon the Louis passed every inquirer who called at the General's house was told that all hope was abandoned, and that his relatives and attendants were merely waiting for the end and endeavoring to make his last hours as free from suffering as possible.

Among those who called were Cyrus W. Field and Mrs. U. S. Grant. As on preceding days since it became known that Gen. Sherman lay at death's door, knots of people gathered in the street near his home talking to each other in low tones of the dying soldier. At 1:50 p. m. a servant came out of the house and told the policeman on guard that the end had come and that the general had at last surrendered. From Secretary Barrett it was learned that General Sherman remained unconscious to the last, dying with no visible pain.

The time for the funeral is not yet fixed.  
NEW YORK, Feb. 14. (3 o'clock).—The General passed away without speaking to any members of his family gathered about his bed. Four daughters were present and his son P. T. Sherman, with his brother the senator and the attending physician, Secretary Barrett and some other friends were in the room below. The funeral services of the remains will take place on Thursday from his late residence, though it may be deferred if his son does not arrive on that day from Europe, on the Majestic.

On Thursday evening the body will be taken to St. Louis on a special train and be interred there. It will be in charge of General Schofield and will be accompanied by a delegation from Post Lafayette G. A. R. of this city.

## PARAGRAPHS.

Ben Ali Haggis, the well known horseman, who has been very ill since the first of the year and who was recently reported out of danger, is growing worse.

The strike at Cardiff, Wales, against the dock companies continues. The docks are partly in operation, but owing to the attitude of the strikers, non-union laborers are deterred from offering freely.

The Montana legislature is wrestling with the eight hour question. Mining superintendents object to the measure on the ground that the low price of silver will not warrant increased expense, while a petition is in the hands of the committee signed by 4000 miners asking for an eight-hour law. The question will create a hard fight.

W. L. Owens was arrested at Anacosta, Mont., on Friday for forging a \$100 check on a Chippewa Falls bank, Wis. He carried a letter of introduction purporting to be from Governor Boies, which he showed at the bank and endeavored to borrow \$150.

A Washington special says: Col. Forsyth's appointment to the next Brigadier Generalship in the army, which occurs by the retirement of Brigadier General Gibson, two months hence, is now practically assured.

Another man has been arrested in Whitechapel, London, on the suspicion of being the murderer of "Carrotty Nell." Blood was found upon his clothes. The prisoner was taken with the murdered woman a quarter of an hour before the crime was committed.

The work at Jackson Park, fixing up a site for the World's Fair, was again stopped to-day by the crowd of men unable to obtain employment.

The last spike connecting the New Westminster, Southern, Fairhaven & Northern railways was driven to-day. (Saturday.)

## DEATH OF SHERMAN.

Our dispatches to day convey the mournful intelligence, which has been painfully looked for the past two or three days, of the death of Gen. Sherman. His dangerous sickness was first announced on Wednesday, and since then the wires have reported the alternations in his condition, but have never given any hope of his recovery. This elected chief of the army has passed away, and passed from this earth to be ministered into the army of the Supreme Commander above.

With this chief passes away the last of the three great generals in whom the trust of the American nation rested during the war. When Grant was placed in command of the armies of the United States, all discord and bickering at once ceased. Beside military genius he was endowed with true patriotism. He saw his country torn with a powerful rebellion, and the task committed to him to destroy its power. With this end in view he took counsel of his chief captains, and when a plan was agreed on, all went to work with their best energies, and with the sole aim of accomplishing the end.

How important a part Sherman played in this grand drama is gratefully retained in the minds of his countrymen. A sagacious commander whose military instinct seemed to protect him from error, he became eminently known for his daring originality of design, his fertility of resource, his brilliant strategy, and unflinching energy, which caused Gen. Grant to pronounce him "the best field officer the war had produced."

He was the darling of his men; he was in camp he was always approachable, and in action they knew he would lead them into no needless slaughter. He was the idol of the American people, since, having the good sense to keep out of politics, for which he was not fitted, the luster of his military achievement was never dulled by mixing up in party strife.

He retired from the army ten years ago, and has since lived in modest retirement, illustrating the best qualities of the private citizen, and only being seen on those civic occasions when distinguished men were called on to appear.

The deceased general was born in Ohio, in 1818, he was educated at West Point, took part in the war with Mexico, where he was raised to the rank of captain, and on the breaking out of the late war, took the field in command of a regiment.

For a Portage Railroad.

The Times Mountaineer: The Oregonian, in an able editorial yesterday advocated portage-railroads as a means of temporary relief to the producers of the inland Empire, and it gives great satisfaction that the leading journal in the northwest is in favor of the speediest manner of relieving the farmers of the northwest from the unjust taxation of railway corporations. As far as the members of the present legislature have expressed themselves they are not averse to granting a liberal appropriation for these railways at the Cascades and between this city and Celilo; and if public sentiment throughout the state will make an urgent demand for the construction of these roads there is not much doubt the "powers that be" at Salem will grant the request. Therefore, Eastern Oregon has received little if anything from the state, and in such an emergency as now exists and has existed for a number of years, we can see no reason that a deaf ear should be turned to these supplications. They pertain to the advantage of the yeomanry of the country, without which the commonwealth would lack one of its greatest factors of development, and with which it will grow and prosper. The region east of the Cascades is not asking for any public institution, which will be simply a drain upon the public treasury; but a loan from the state to the farmers who have become almost impoverished by high freights, and which will be more than paid back in a few years by the decrease of transportation rates and the increase of producers and home-builders.

## TAPE IN BANKS.

An Emphatic Protest Against the Identification Nuisance.

How a Man May Have Millions in His Pocket and Be Unable to Buy a Meal—Banking Experiences in Our Cities and Abroad.

A rich man compelled to pawn his watch for a square meal and a night's lodging. That, writes the New York correspondent of the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, was the strange situation in which a young Englishman who had just landed in New York found himself the other day. He had arrived from the West Indies, where he invested nearly all the money on his person in a draft for £200 on a New York bank. Anxious to get a train for St. Louis the same day, he hurried to the bank for his money. The teller refused to pay the draft until he was identified.

And the young man was an absolute stranger in New York! "Your people in the West Indies took my good money for that draft and I was left back again. Am I to infer that this is a bankrupt institution?"

He got no satisfaction, lost his train and had to pawn his watch for a meal and a bed. A fellow-passenger identified him the next day. In discussing this matter the other day with a very liberal American who has had much banking and mercantile experience here and abroad, "Americans," said he, "are the worst bankers in the world. They don't know the first thing about banking. Even to the smallest details foreigners can give us points. The methods pursued in the more paying and receiving of money in New York suggest the idea that every man who enters a bank is a possible thief. This," he continued, "judging from the numerous defalcations, might apply to the officers of the bank, but it is most unjust to the public. A person who goes into a store where he is surrounded on all sides by valuable goods is not supposed to be there for purposes of robbery—and why should it be different in a bank? Indeed, New York in this respect never seems to have gotten beyond its village days. Nothing looks more ridiculous to a London merchant than to see a long string of persons with books in their hands waiting to make a deposit through a cubby hole with a solitary receiving teller—and it is the same with the payment of money. A bank with a large business ought to have half a dozen receiving and many paying tellers at large, wide, open counters. Why all these cages and railings and bars and people through which you are occasionally permitted to catch a glimpse of the teller's face who suddenly and unwillingly hands you your money? They don't have these things in England, and robberies in banks there are rare. Here, despite all these precautions, they are frequent, and a large proportion are committed by those inside of the railing and not outside of it.

"I don't like to be looked upon when I enter a New York bank a stranger as if I had a natural predilection for perjury and forgery, for the teller is not satisfied if I tell him your right name and even sign it, you must be identified. In England checks are usually made payable to bearer. 'Shall I cross it?' asks the drawer, which means that by drawing across the check and inserting the words 'Bank and Co.' between the lines the money can only be collected through a bank or banking firm. Otherwise any 'bearer' can get the cash at the bank without any questions being asked except, 'How will you have it?' I may send any body with my check payable 'bearer' for \$5,000 to a bank and he will get the money without any trouble. In a New York bank such an amount would create the utmost consternation. All the detectives in New York would be immediately rung up to aid the officers of the bank, from president down to janitor, in watching the rash intruder. Here a check of \$5,000 is usually made payable to order, but a stranger may induce it in the presence of the teller and he'll never get the money without identification, no matter what ordinary proof in the way of letters or cards the holder or of the check may have about his person. Of course if a paying-teller has good reason to think that a check or draft has been stolen or found he would be justified in refusing payment and holding the party who presented it; but in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred there are no grounds for suspicion. Forcible are always grumbling at our stupid rules, and if it were once known abroad that there was a banking house in New York that would pay drafts to people without identification such a concern would soon have the cream of the 'traveler's draft business.'"

This attack on the system pursued here, which is certainly unworthy of a great metropolis, recalls an experience of my own. A friend of mine some years ago gave me for a Christmas present a check on the Sixth National Bank of New York. I presented it. "Don't know you," said the teller. "Neither have I the pleasure of your acquaintance," was the answer, "but there is no money on the check. I am also the bearer." "Can't help it; it's too large an amount to give to a stranger, and you must be identified." "My friends are out of town," said I, and President Arthur is in Washington. I can't vouch for any one for him." "Well, I won't give you the money." "Then write your reasons on the check." "No, I won't do that." "Then," said I, "I am a newspaper man. I shall protest this check and proclaim in Wall Street this afternoon that the Sixth National Bank refuses to honor the checks drawn on it." I got the money.

**Heat in the Constock Mines.**  
"The Constock mine in Nevada is a wonderful work," said Mr. Cecil Morgan, of Aspen. "It is 2,300 feet in a vertical line to the bottom of the shaft, and one can make the descent in three or four minutes in the cage which is used to haul ore to the surface. This cage will lift about one ton, or three or four loads of 5,000 pounds each. Work on the Constock is now confined to the upper levels, the workmen having been driven from the depths by the steam generated through the action of the air on the sulphurous rock penetrated by the different levels. The temperature averages about 180 degrees down there, and it is simply impossible for the miners to work under such conditions. Whether science will ever be able to overcome the difficulties met with in those lower levels remains to be seen. I think, however, it will not, for the reason that such intense heat denotes the near presence of subterranean heat."
