LABOR VICTORY.
PITTSBURG, Mar. 6.—The long strike of the coal miners of the Monongahela valley, has ended in a complete victory for the men. The advance in mining rate is one-half cent per bushel. The men will resume work on Monday. The strike lasted ten weeks and the men have lost in wages alone over \$1,000,000. The absence of this great sum of money in the valley causes suffering among not only the miners and their families but also other persons dependent on mining of coal for their living.

A FLY WHEEL BURST.
DANBURY, Conn., Mar. 6.—The breaking of the governor's belt on an engine in Green's hat factory yesterday afternoon, caused the engine to "ace," and the three-ton flywheel wrecked the building, and sixty girls in the adjoining room were terror-stricken. Two of them jumped from a window, sustaining fatal injuries.

BLOCKADE BROKEN.
SANTA FE, N. M., March 6.—The snow blockade which has prevailed on the Denver and Rio Grande road for the past ten days is broken, and the first through train since Feb. 25 reached here last night.

PIERRE, S. D., Mar. 6.—The legislature killed the World's Fair bill. They could not get a two-thirds vote. The amount asked for was \$15,000.

CHANGED THEIR MINDS.
PHOENIX, A. T., Mar. 6.—The territorial council, Wednesday, passed an act granting suffrage to women. Yesterday morning the matter was reconsidered and the measure killed. The lobby had hardly recovered from the shock when a message was received and read by the chief clerk, from Frances E. Willard, at Philadelphia. It was as follows:

THE OCEAN DALENE.
SPOKANE FALLS, Wash., Mar. 6.—The passage of the bill opening the Cour d'Alene reservation to the settlement has caused a stampede. Settlers are coming in by every train and are waiting for the president to issue a proclamation. Trouble is expected as the Indians object giving up their land.

UNKNOWN MAN KILLED.
TACOMA, Mar. 6.—An unknown man was killed at the steamship wharf about 6 p. m. Wednesday. Little is known of how the accident happened except that after a switch engine had shifted its position from where it had been standing for some time the mangled corpse of a man was found directly where the engine had been standing. The body was horribly mutilated and so disfigured about the head that it would be impossible to identify him by his features. He was about forty years of age with a full beard and dressed as a workman. From papers found on him his name is supposed to be Henry Herman, but no one by that name is known around the water front or freight yards.

SUICIDE.
LONDON, Mar. 6.—Robert Lindsay Antrobus, the second son of Sir Edmund Antrobus and a junior partner in the well known banking house of Coutts & Co. was found dead in bed this morning, with a pistol by his side. It is believed to be a case of suicide. The cause is unknown.

BEHNSON AYRES, Mar. 6.—The Argentine Government has ordered a general suspension of business for two days. The decree announces that the days are to be observed as holidays, but the reason for suspension of business is to try to save the provincial bank. There has been a run on the bank for several days and it is believed it did not dare to open its doors.

FOR AMERICAN IRISHMEN.
LONDON, March 6.—Next week Parnell will issue a manifesto to American Irishmen.

THE ELECTION IN CANADA.
TORONTO, Mar. 6.—At midnight the vote by provinces shows a total of 111 conservatives and 94 liberals. Majorities for the conservatives, 17. There are 217 constituencies in the dominion, which returns 215 members to the congress. Of these, 205 have been heard from. The general conviction is that the government has secured a fair working in dirty.

COMMITTED SUICIDE.
SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 6.—Chas. Norton, captain of the schooner, Free Trade, now lying off Meigs' Wharf, committed suicide this morning, by cutting his throat and then jumping into the bay.

TWO CHILDREN BURNED.
NEW LIMERICK, Me., Mar. 6.—The dwelling of Geo. White burned down during the temporary absence of him and his wife, and their two children perished in the flames.

BOW AT SCHOOL MEETING.
UNION, Or., Mar. 6.—A serious difficulty arose at the school meeting at Telocast last Monday. The primary cause seems to have been on the matter of locating the school house of the district, but the trouble was directly brought on by a dispute over the time at which the meeting was convened. Words were exchanged and a scuffle ensued, in which Louis McMaugh drew a knife and rushed towards Jasper Mitchell. Ben McKeever caught hold of Mitchell, and drew him back. The assailant made a thrust with the knife, which was warded off, not, however, without leaving a long cut in Mitchell's coat, and inflicting a slight wound in McKeever's jaw. Warrants have been sworn out for the arrest of L. McMaugh, H. Lynch, J. Sharp and B. McKeever.

NOT LIABLE FOR FORGERIES.
LONDON, Mar. 6.—The House of Lords yesterday in handing down a decision reversing all previous judgments, holds that the bank of England is not liable for the sum of £71,000, the amount obtained by the forgery of a clerk in the employ of Vagliano Bros., of this city.

PREFER UNITED STATES.
LONDON, Mar. 6.—The British immigration returns show that the United States is still regarded as the promised land by the greater number of British emigrants. During the month of February alone, the emigration to the United States far exceeded that to all other countries combined, being 10,000 to a total of 14,000. Australia comes next, Canada ranking after Australia. The attempts to obtain emigrants for new territories in Canada has been a complete failure as after one winter they all desert to the United States.

KOCH'S REMEDY A SUCCESS.
BERLIN, Mar. 6.—Official government statistics have been prepared of 2172 cases of tuberculosis treated by Dr. Koch's method. Of the cases of internal tuberculosis 13 are reported cured, 171 considerably improved and 46 died, while of the cases of external tuberculosis 15 are reported cured, 148 considerably improved, 538 improved and 9 died. The success of Dr. Koch's remedy has exceeded all expectations.

BISMARCK IN POLITICS.
BERLIN, Mar. 6.—The national liberals of Giessen have decided to run Bismarck for the reichstag. CHURCH AGAINST PARNELL.

BELFAST, Mar. 6.—Right Rev. William Reeves, a bishop of the united diocese of Down, Connor and Dromore, who issued a letter amounting, practically, to the excommunication of Catholics who support Parnell, which letter caused considerable excitement in this city and elsewhere, says in that epistle: "These men who are supporting Parnell have become the propagators of public scandal, and by their own acts, place themselves in company with those to whom it is unlawful for the priests to administer the sacrament."
