MEMPHIS' GOVERNMENT.

How the Metropolis of Tennessee Ceased to Be a Municipality.

Charles Dudley Warner, writing in *Harper's Magazine* about Memphis and her principal troubles, explains: Under these circumstances the city resorted to a novel expedient. It surrendered its charter to the State, and ceased to exist as a municipality. The leaders of this movement gave two reasons for it—the wish not to repudiate the city debt, but to gain breathing-time, and that municipal government in this case was a failure. The Legislature enacted the former measure into a law, and tested it of Shelby County, and provided a government for it. This government consists of a legislative council of eight members, made up of the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners, consisting of three, and the Board of Public Works, consisting of five. These are all elected by popular vote to serve a term of four years, but the elections are held every two years, so that the council always contains members who have had experience. The Board of Fire and Police Commissioners elects a president, who is the executive officer of the taxing district, and has the power of a mayor; he has a salary of two thousand dollars, inclusive of his fees as police magistrate, and the other members of his board have salaries of five hundred dollars. The members of the Board of Public Works serve without compensation. No man can be eligible to either board who has not been a resident of the district for five years. In addition there is a Board of Health, appointed by the council. This government has the ordinary powers of a city government, but carefully in the fact, but it can not run the city debt, and it does not appropriate the taxes collected except for the specific purposes named by the State Legislature, which specific appropriations are voted annually by the Legislature on the recommendation of the council. Thus the government of the city is committed to eight men, and the execution of its laws to one man, the president of the taxing district, who has extraordinary power. The final success of this scheme will be watched with a great deal of interest by other cities. On the surface it can be seen that it depends on securing a non-partisan council, and a non-partisan president of the taxing district—that is to say, given the choice by popular vote of the best eight men to rule the city. Up to this time, with only slight hitches, it has worked exceedingly well, as will appear in a consideration of the condition of the city. The slight hitch mentioned was that the president was accused of using temporarily the sum appropriated for one city purpose for another.

The Supreme Court of the United States decided that Memphis did not evade its obligations by a change of name of form of government. The result was a settlement with the creditors at fifty cents on the dollar; and then the city gathered itself together for a courageous effort and a new era of prosperity.

AN ARRANT HUMBUG.

The idea that Age lends Great Value to Wines Without Foundation.

Now that are the real facts about old wines? asks the *Miller*. After fermentation, which is a process of decay, wine will deteriorate unless preventive measures are taken, such as keeping the wine in a cool or even temperature, the addition of alcohol, boiling (the vinum cotta of the Romans) and the complete exclusion of the ordinary atmosphere by good corks, by sealing with wax, or by oil. The most common method of preserving wine in modern times is by adding alcohol and by sealing and sealing. The alcohol in wine prevents the wine from becoming stale and sour.
