ABOUT HOP PESTS .- The Agricultural college is heading a move A Synopsis of the Markets-Buying and to have a vigorous fight made against the hop pests in this valley. Last year it was found that the hop louse was making his appearance in some of the yards, but fortunately little damage was done and a good crop was had and fair prices were obtained. This will stimulate a larger acreage for this year. From investigations made by the Agricultural college and by individuals who are acquainted with the habits of the hop louse, it is strongly inferred that they will be in numbers this year sufficient to do much damage. The English and New York crops were greatly damaged last year. A sterenuous warfare is urged against these pests. The last builetin of the college estimates that the crop of some of the yards, but fortunately college estimates that the crop of last year in Oregon and California was worth \$4,000,000, of which 5-12 was produced in this state. It further estimates that the loss from hop lice was \$340,000, or one-twelfth the entire out put. Thus it is easily seen that steps should be taken to exterminate these pests.
