BOARD OF TRADE IN SESSION.

The Salem Steamboat Question Being Discussed—The Boat is Needed.

The board of trade is holding a special meeting this afternoon, to consider the advisability of an independent steamer for the upper Willamette. Such a boat, owned by men in this city, and operated in a business-like way, could make money for her owners and to the people of the city, who have shipping to do.

While such a scheme would no doubt pay well, yet there are some difficulties to be overcome. The steamers Northwest and Modoc, which only draw thirteen to eighteen inches, have not been able to run to Salem during the summer months.

Notwithstanding these disadvantages, a good sized boat would pay, even if compelled to lay off for a month or so, while the people are at sea shore. It will only be a few years' time until the government will recognize the importance of the Willamette river, and it will be made a navigable river the year round.

TEN YEARS IN STRIPES.—Wm. Bradshaw and H. A. Glenn, who were convicted of larceny before the circuit judge in this county on the 18th of June 1891 and sentenced to the penitentiary on three five-year sentences, were today released by commutation of sentence by the governor.
