THE PRESIDENT IS COMING.
WASHINGTON, April 2.—That the president does not believe the Italian embargo will take a serious turn, is evinced by the fact that he is making arrangements for his trip South and West, during the present month.

RHODE ISLAND ELECTION.
PROVIDENCE, April 2.—There was a large vote at the state election yesterday, and the result cannot be definitely determined for some hours yet. Indications are that there has been no election of any officer upon the general list by popular vote. The general assembly, with four cities and several towns to hear from, stands: republicans 48, democrats 23; no election for fifteen seats. The republicans need seven votes more to obtain the requisite majority on joint ballot, by which the governor and general officers are elected after a failure to elect by the people.

PROVIDENCE, R. I. April 2.—The election returns at 1 o'clock made it sure that there has been no choice by the people for any office upon the general ticket. Republicans have carried a sufficient number of towns to give them the 55 necessary on joint ballot.

J. B. GRINNELL DEAD.
DES MOINES, Iowa, April 2.—Hon. J. B. Grinnell, one of the oldest and most prominent citizens of Iowa died at his home in Grinnell yesterday morning. He was the founder of the city of Grinnell and college. He preached the first anti-slavery sermon heard in Washington, D. C. He was a republican in politics, state senator in 1868, delegate to the republican national convention in 1880, member of congress four years, and held other offices.

T. C. BERING DEAD.
ROME, April 2.—Thos. C. Bering, one of the partners in the famous house of Bering Bros. & Co., of London, died this evening.

CRIMINAL.

MEXICANS KILLED.
WEATHERFORD, Texas April 2.—News has reached here of the killing of a Mexican at Ranger, on the Texas Pacific railway. While a man and the Mexican were engaged in an altercation the Mexican tried to use a knife, when the white man shot him. Other Mexicans then engaged in the attack and two more were killed.

STATE.

STRIKE AT MARSHFIELD.
MARSHFIELD, April 2.—Forty drivers of the Oregon Coal and Navigation company quit work yesterday. The company had reduced the wages from \$2.75 to \$2.50. About two hundred and fifty men are affected by the strike.

UMATILLA LANDS.
PENINSULA, April 2.—The sale of the Umatilla reservation lands began yesterday and will continue about forty days. A large crowd is present. At the first sale only one section was offered for sale. Three quarters of it were disposed of at a total amount of \$240.

PRICE OF SUGAR.
PORTLAND, April 2.—The effect of taking off the duty on sugar here was felt by a decline of three-fourths of a cent on the granulated article and five-eighths on powdered sugar. The prices on yellow sugars advanced about one-fourth of a cent. No further decline is expected soon.

FOUND DEAD.
PORTLAND, April 2.—W. L. Pickett was found dead this morning at his home in East Portland, cause of death unknown. It is supposed to be due to alcoholism.

MINERS KILLED BY SHERIFFS

The Strikers and Deputy Sheriffs Have a Row.

THE BLAINE AND FAVA LETTERS.

Our Minister Insulted, The Price of Sugar at Portland, Umatilla, Lands, The President is Coming, Latest on Italian Question, Etc., Etc.

CONFLICT IN COKE DISTRICT.
PITTSBURG, April 2.—A desperate battle is reported between the strikers and the armed guards at Moorewood this morning. At 3 o'clock 300 or 400 strikers approached the works of H. C. Frick's coke company and began to batter down the gates. When ordered to desist they fired on the deputy sheriffs slightly wounding several of them. The latter replied with Remington rifles and killed seven rioters instantly while many were wounded. The rioters have cut the telegraph and telephone wires.

THE NUMBER KILLED.
PITTSBURG, April 2.—A private dispatch from Greensburg says: Eleven men were killed and twenty-seven wounded in the Moorewood riot this morning. The dead miners are all foreigners.

MORE DETAILS.
MOUNT PLEASANT, April 2.—At 2:45 this morning a mob of 500 men began rioting at the Standard works and destroyed some of the company's property, they also cut telegraph lines so no warning could be sent to the people at Moorewood. About 3 o'clock the party marched to Moorewood. In the meanwhile the wires were hurriedly repaired, and word sent to Moorewood that strikers would attack the works in three places and had a well laid plan to destroy them. The sheriff was soon in readiness to receive the attack. His men were divided into three parties, Captain Lauer having charge of one party placed behind the big gate of the barn and stable enclosure. As the rioters passed the company's store they raided it and then marched to the barn and attempted to break down the gate. They succeeded in doing so, and as they entered Captain Lauer called out to them to halt or he would fire. There answer was, "fire." A rattling volley was fired in the direction of the deputies, some of whom were seriously wounded. Captain Lauer then gave the word to fire. Two volleys were fired before the mob broke and ran. Eleven men fell dead in the road and the wounded are estimated as high as twenty-seven. None of the dead were naturalized.

The deputies who took part in the riot are all experienced men armed to the teeth. Last night Superintendent Pickard told them a raid was contemplated on the works and presented each man a Winchester. "I have promised protection," he said, "to our men and I must give it to them. When the rioters come obey me. Fire first shots in the air. If they do not retreat, then fire a second shot, and keep firing while you have ammunition. Protect property, protect the men at work and protect your lives. Any man in the employ who runs, I will shoot dead, any man who is not willing to accept my terms will please drop into the rear and I will send him home under guard." "Is everybody satisfied," asked the superintendent. "Yes, yes," rang out all along the line. Each man was supplied with twenty bullets. Some strikers say today that there was no intention of doing any damage, but they marched to the works to intimidate the men at work. The dead this morning were carried into the company's store at Moorewood. Strikers demanded the bodies, but were refused, and the place is now surrounded by an armed mob, 2000 men, who say they will burn everything on the premises unless the dead bodies are given up. The feeling is very bitter among workmen who denounce the action of the deputies, in no uncertain terms.

Slaves and Huss are wild all over the region and the most intense excitement prevails. Great crowds are coming in on every train and the highway is thickly peopled. It is openly declared by strikers that they will have revenge for their companions. Warrants have been issued for the arrests of all the deputies, including Capt. Lauer who was in command, on charge of murder. They were served this afternoon. They all gave bail at once. General Manager Lynch, of Frick

& Co., and Supt. Ramsey, of the Moorewood plant, were made accessories before the fact. Physicians say forty strikers are wounded. The prospects for another outbreak are growing every hour. The report of a second attack in which four more were killed, is pronounced untrue, but another raid is expected at any time.

THE GOVERNOR ACTING.
HARRISBURG, Penn., April 2.—Governor Pattison has summoned his cabinet this morning to consider the situation in the western coke regions.

LATEST FROM COKE DISTRICT.
GREENSBURG, Penn., April 2.—A special says that at 9 o'clock another attack was attempted. Three more were killed and twenty-five wounded. The report is not confirmed.

TROOPS FOR THE DISTRICT.
PITTSBURG, April 2.—The governor has ordered the tenth regiment to aid the sheriff of Westmoreland county, in quelling the trouble in the Coke region. The eighteenth regiment here has been ordered to hold itself in readiness.

OUR MINISTER INSULTED.
ROME, April 1.—United States Minister Porter yesterday called to see Marquis Di Rudini, the Italian premier, who however, was absent from the city. Mr. Porter then saw the under secretary of foreign affairs, Signor Darco. The United States minister expressed regret at the fact that the Italian government had thought fit to recall Baron Fava, and generally speaking, thought the United States government would not deny any request of the Italian government if there were reason and fairness in such demands. Incidentally Porter also suggested that the Italian government should wait before taking further action, in the hope that a satisfactory answer might be received from Washington. Before Mr. Porter left Signor Darco's office the latter said: "Suppose a dozen American citizens were murdered in an Italian city, and we pleaded impotence to punish the murderers because the city in which the murders occurred enjoyed an autonomous form of government. What opinion would you in the United States and what opinion would the civilized world at large have in regard to our plea?" Porter thereupon tried to make clear to Darco the relations of the federal government to individual states as fixed in the constitution, but Darco was not satisfied, and replied with heat: "We have nothing to do with your constitution. If it is found wanting, you must mend it. You know it is no constitution worthy of a free, civilized country, if it does not insure punishment for crime and protection for the weak."

THE FAVA LETTER TO BLAINE.
WASHINGTON, April 2.—The following correspondence between Secretary Blaine and Baron Fava was made public by the department of state last night:

"Royal Legation of Italy, Washington, March 31.—Mr. Secretary of State.—By my two notes of the 15th and 18th inst. I had the honor to call your excellency's attention to occurrences of exceptional gravity which took place at New Orleans on the 14th, whereby four subjects of the king of Italy, who were confined in the prison of that city, were massacred by the crowd under the leadership of two American citizens. After having formally protested against the unjustifiable conduct of the local authorities, which were evidently recreant to their duties on that occasion, I reserved to the government of his majesty the right to demand such satisfaction as it might think proper, since the occurrence in question constituted a patent violation of the treaty in force between our two countries, which secures to Italian subjects residing in the United States the same protection enjoyed by American citizens, and which has always been extended to the latter in Italian territory. The reparation demanded by the government of the king, as I have had the honor to inform you in our interviews held during the last few days, were to consist of the following points:

"First—Official assurance by the federal government that the guilty parties should be brought to justice.
"Second—Recognition of the principle that indemnity is due to the relatives of the victims.
"Your excellency was pleased to declare to me that as the federal government did not think it could take this view of the matter, it declined to take the aforesaid demands into consideration. Under these circumstances, the government of his majesty, considering the legitimate

BLAINE'S ANSWER.
WASHINGTON, April 2.—"I beg to express the sincere regret with which the government of the United States receives the intelligence of Baron Fava's speedy departure from this capital. Though he has more than once intimated this purpose, the government of the United States has been unable to see adequate reasons for such step. The baron's service here for the past ten years has been distinguished at all times by the most agreeable relations with the executive department of this government. Regret at his leaving is enhanced when, as the president believes, he has been recalled under misapprehension of facts by the government of Italy. The cause of his sundering his diplomatic relations with this government is thus given in his note: 'The reparation demanded by the government of the king, as I have had the honor to inform you in our interviews held during the last few days, was to consist of the following points:

First, of the fairest assurances by the federal government that the guilty parties should be brought to justice; second, by the recognition in principle, that an indemnity is due to the relatives of the victims. I have endeavored to impress upon him, in the several personal interviews with which he has honored me, that the government of the United States is utterly unable to give assurance which the Marquis Rudini has demanded, even if the national government had entire jurisdiction over the alleged murderers. It could not give assurance to any foreign power that they should be punished before being tried by a jury. In Baron Fava's second point he demands the recognition, in principle, that indemnity is due to the relatives of the victims. He is assured under grave error when he declares that the United States government declined to take this demand into consideration, and I shall regret if he has communicated such conclusion to your government. I have repeatedly given to Baron Fava the assurance that under the direction of the president all facts and incidents connected with the unhappy tragedy at New Orleans should be most thoroughly investigated. I have also informed him that in a matter of such gravity, the government of the United States should not permit itself to be unduly hurried. The impatience of the aggrieved may be natural, but its indulgence does not always secure the most substantial justice.

LATEST ON THE ITALIAN QUESTION.
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 2.—Nothing new in the Italian situation. Baron Fava has not yet made an application for a passport nor has Marquis Imperiale acknowledged the receipt of Blaine's letter, sent him yesterday evening.
