WORLD'S FAIR.

CHICAGO, April 3.—The attack on the board of control took most of the time of the national world's fair commission yesterday. The board submitted a report outlining what it had been doing the past few months in the way of approving building plans of the directory, making changes in salaries, etc. The objectors, headed by Commissioners Williams, McDonald, Ryan, Lannan and Harris, contended the board had exceeded its authority that the questions of the site, salaries and appointments were in the jurisdiction of the commission alone. It is intimated to-night that the discontents may make an effort to abolish the board of control. This would open up the old fight between the local directory and the national commission and leave the affairs of the big exposition once more in chaos.

TELEGRAM FROM EX-CONFEDERATES.

KANSAS CITY, April 3.—The following telegram was sent to Secretary Blaine: "The Ex-Confederate Social and Benevolent association, of Kansas City, Mo., express the hope that in your official dealings with the Italian government it be not forgotten that our form of government is entirely satisfactory to the people who made it and that as to maintaining the integrity, honor and dignity of this government there is no division of sentiment among its people."

DEATH OF ALBERT PIKE.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—General Albert Pike, grand commander of the Scottish Rite of Masons of the southern jurisdiction, and chief of the royal order of Scotland, died last evening.

PROTESTED THEIR INNOCENCE.

SOMERSET, Pa., April 2.—The Nicely brothers, Joseph and David, were hanged yesterday. Both died game, protesting their innocence. Death resulted from strangulation. The case was an extraordinary one. On the evening of February 27, 1889, the house of David Umberger was entered by two men, who killed him in the presence of his family, robbed him of between \$10,000 and \$20,000 in cash, and escaped. Suspicion was directed toward the Nicelys, who belonged to a wealthy Dundark family. In spite of a fierce local fight, they were convicted on strong circumstantial evidence at the demand of popular opinion. Later the case was complicated by a sworn confession of John Reach that he and a man named Miller committed the crime. The board of pardons, however, declined to interfere. The brothers made two sensational attempts to escape, getting away once, but were recaptured.

CONNECTICUT'S GOVERNOR.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 3.—Judge Morris has concluded to institute quo warranto proceedings for the office of governor. It will bring to issue the question of Morgan Bulkeley's right to act as governor.

COAL MINE EXPLOSION.

LONDON, April 3.—A disastrous explosion in a coal mine took place today at Apedale at Staffordshire. Ten men were killed and several others severely injured.

WAGER WILL WALK.

PORTLAND, April 3.—Ex-State Senator J. P. Wager has announced his intention to start on April 15th on a pedestrian trip across the continent. He will start from Astoria and expects to reach New York City in about seven months. He is preparing lectures on several subjects, and expects to deliver them en route.

MUNT'S RAILROAD.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Lamotte, Putner & Co. have brought action for \$30,000 brokerage against G. W. Hunt, president of the Oregon & Washington Railway Co., for work in a deal not yet completed. They claim to have procured a loan of one million dollars from the Oregon & Transcontinental Co. through Henry Villard, in bonds of the Oregon & Washington Railway Co., at the request of the defendant who then declined to accept the loan.

Judge Ingraham has ordered plaintiff to give \$12,500 security on the attachment by which they have levied on \$100,000 on bonds and \$500,000 on stock of defendant's road.

LATEST FROM COKE DISTRICT.

Big Storm in New York, The Governor of Connecticut, Latest on Italian Question, Criminal Budget, Foreign, Etc., Etc.

RESERVOIR BURST.

ST. MARY'S, Ohio, April 3.—The bank of the reservoir is partly washed away, and the ground for miles around is flooded. The track of the Lake Erie and Western railroad is under water. Work is suspended at Oil Wells. Loss thus far has reached \$250,000.

NEW ORLEANS GRAND JURY.

NEW ORLEANS, April 3.—Judge Marra, the presiding magistrate over the section of the criminal district in which the grand jury is now serving, yesterday expressed a private opinion that nothing would ever be done to the lynchings which caused the killing of the Italians. It is impossible to criminally prosecute 5000 persons he said, and referred to the famous passage in Burke's oration, that there is no law under which a whole community can be indicted. Even if the grand jury were to indict the leaders, no jury could ever be secured to try them. Such publicity has been given to the affair that every one is conversant with the facts of the case, and no one is without a fixed opinion.

A close examination of the record of the eleven alleged assassins discloses that all but four of the eleven slain were registered voters, either by birth or naturalization. The four others, whom Consul C. Corte claimed as entitled to the protection of the Italian government, are Trahina, Bagnetto, Monasterio and Comitez. The first named is found to have been a voter in the parish of St. Charles. Bagnetto is proved to have been a fugitive murderer from Palermo and a member of the expositio band of highwaymen, Marchesi was a veteran of Garibaldi's army, but fled from Palermo while charged with murdering a female. Trahina was also a robber in Italy. Of Comitez no one seems to know anything. He and Monasterio were buried in the potters' field. Consul Corte is doing all he can to reach the facts of the affair, though he has not received that courtesy at the hands of Governor Nichols and Mayor Shakespeare that his position warrants. The grand jury is holding daily sessions.

THREE INDICTMENTS FOUND.

NEW ORLEANS, April 3.—The grand jury has found three indictments on blank, two against Seligman and Boren for bribery, and three against O'Malley for conspiring to bribe. Seligman is in Cincinnati, Boren is here, and O'Malley's whereabouts is a mystery, though it is understood he is on the Lake Christina shore, within 100 miles of New Orleans, surrounded by a heavy guard, which he has had since the killing of the Italian prisoners.

WILL STAND HIS TRIAL.

NEW ORLEANS, April 3.—Dominick G. O'Malley, a notorious detective, charged with having attempted to pack the jury in the Hennessy case and mysteriously disappeared, created a sensation this morning, by surrendering himself. He was admitted to bail.

THE ITALIAN QUESTION.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 3.—The cabinet has been in session—discussing the Italian situation. The tenor of the discussion has not yet been made public.

FROM COKE DISTRICT.

PITTSBURGH, April 3.—News of the riot at Moorewood and the subsequent order from the governor calling out the Tenth and Eighteenth regiments created intense excitement here. The Eighteenth regiment started for the scene of trouble at 6 o'clock last evening, accompanied by two companies of the Tenth.

As the men killed were all unnaturalized foreigners, the possibility of international complications arising has been freely discussed. The Austrian consul Shomberg received a dispatch yesterday afternoon from Parker, leader of the strikers, informing him that several of the men killed were subjects of Austria. He replied that he would investigate the matter, but declined to talk further.

MOUNT PLEASANT, April 3.—This morning word was received here that two more men concerned in the riot had died in a strike's house. Reports from all over the region indicate fear over the dangerous and

CRIMINAL.

MILLS ACQUITTED.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 3.—The case of William Mills, indicted by the grand jury on a charge of having had unlawful relations with his 17-year-old niece, Daisy Philpot, was called for trial in Judge Stearns' court yesterday morning.

Very little trouble was experienced in securing a jury, and, all the witnesses being present, it was thought by the prosecution that the matter would be speedily disposed of, and so it was. The first witness called was the girl, Daisy Philpot, who, after being sworn, mildly, but firmly, refused to testify against the defendant. She admitted that she was the mother of a three-months-old baby, but she declined to admit that Mills was the father. All the efforts of District Attorney Stephens to shake her in her determination failed, and he was obliged to move for a dismissal, for want of evidence. Much against his will, Judge Stearns was compelled to instruct the jury to acquit.

SECRETARY OF NAVY'S STATEMENT.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Secretary Tracy is quoted as saying yesterday: "What we want is more battle ships. We need fighting ships, and I hope they will be given us. I shall ask for all that I can get. We ought to have at least three additional, and more if possible."

"Your recent report, Mr. Secretary, portrays in strong colors the defenseless condition of our coast cities. It is not overdrawn, is it?" "It is not nearly so strong as I might have made it. Before I wrote my report I sent an officer of the navy on a reconnoitering expedition to and around New York City. If I had pictured the situation as he reported it to me, I should have been called an alarmist. It is absolutely true that a foreign fleet could send its gunboats into the East, North and Harlem rivers, and by destroying our railway bridges and other modes of communication, shut us off, first, from the mainland, and second, from all supplies of food. The situation would be simply appalling, if you will stop to consider it carefully. It would not be so bad in Boston or Baltimore or other of our American cities, for these are built upon the mainland, and our people could seek refuge in the interior, but New York and Brooklyn are built upon islands, and the 2,500,000 inhabitants of these cities would be absolutely helpless. I can not understand why all the people along our coast do not insist that the government shall give them the amplest protection in this respect. The present difficulty with Italy, while it is not expected to result in war, will emphasize the necessity on our part of greater precautions against attack."

MURDEROUS BURGLARS.

SPRINGFIELD, O., April 3.—Albert Midegley, whose mother is a resident of Portland, Ore., lies at the Cincinnati hospital with a fractured skull as the result of one of the most daring and mysterious assaults in the annals of crime in that city. It occurred about 3 o'clock yesterday morning in E. F. Robinson's cigar store. Albert Midegley, aged 15, employed in the place, who sleeps in the store at nights, was attacked and brutally beaten by three burglars. About 8 o'clock when the officers were attracted to the place by loud, piercing screams for help, they ran to the front door and saw the boy with blood streaming from several ugly gashes in his head standing at the front door. He made outcries, however, which were heard, and the burglars fled before assistance came. They had opened the safe door but had taken nothing. The boy's skull is crushed and he is at the hospital in a dying condition. He was assaulted while asleep in bed, and was removed to the hospital. "I know who they are, and I'll get even," were his last words as he fainted from weakness and loss of blood. At the hospital it was found that there were two big gashes in the back of the head that were apparently inflicted by some heavy instrument, since learned to be a chisel. His skull is fractured and his injuries are pronounced fatal. Several suspicious characters have been arrested on suspicion.
