ALL THERE EXCEPT OREGON.

KANSAS CITY, April 15.—The first Western states commercial congress convened at noon yesterday with delegates present from the following states and territories: California, Washington, Idaho, Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming, Montana, Kansas, Nebraska, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Iowa, Mississippi, Louisiana, Georgia, Texas and Oklahoma. The convention was called to order by State Senator Keller, of Kansas. He introduced Rev. Dr. Hayes, of this city, who offered a prayer. The convention then proceeded to a temporary organization. Senator Keller was chosen temporary chairman. In a long speech of acceptance he explained the object of the congress be the consideration of various questions of peculiar interest to the West and South.

ARRESTED FOR BRIBERY.

CHICAGO, April 15.—S. R. Howells, head of the wealthy firm of Howells & Co. lumber dealers, with headquarters in this city and branches at Omaha and Atchison, Kansas, was secretly arrested by the federal authorities. He was held in \$5,000 bail for future appearance. It is stated there is evidence in the possession of the Interstate Commerce Commission which will prove Howells has systematically bribed certain weigh masters of the Western Railway weighing association at Mississippi river points to record false shipping weights.

FARMERS' ALLIANCE.

TOPEKA, Kan., April 15.—Frank McGarth, president of the Kansas alliance, has addressed a letter to the Southern alliance, urging them to act with a third independent party. In his letter he intimates that unless the Southern branch of the order takes this step, the Northern states will go back to the republican party.

GOLD STILL GOING ABROAD.

NEW YORK, April 15.—Gold coin to the amount of \$600,000 has been ordered for export. Total so far to go by tomorrow's steamer is \$1,100,000.

ALBANY, N. Y., DEMOCRATIC.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 15.—The charter election in this city passed off quietly, the democrats having things very much their own way.

EL PASO ELECTION.

EL PASO, Tex., April 15.—The democratic ticket was elected here yesterday against the combination of republicans, independents and union labor.

BASE BALL.

PORTLAND, Or., April 15.—The base ball season was inaugurated here this afternoon by crossing of bats between the Spokane and Portland clubs.

MRS. HALFORD DEAD.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Mrs. Halford, wife of the private secretary of President Harrison, E. W. Halford, died this morning. She died of bronchitis, from which, combined with asthma, she had been a sufferer many years. She was 42 years old.

CIVIL SERVICE IN INDIAN SCHOOLS.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—President Harrison has ordered a classification, under the civil service, of school superintendents, their assistants, school teachers, physicians, and matrons in the Indian service.

FOREIGN.

FROM CHILE.

PARIS April 15.—Dispatches from Chile state that a desperate battle resulting in a victory for the Chilean insurgents occurred at Capito capital of the province of Atacama.

RETIRED OLD OFFICERS.

LONDON, April 15.—Naval circles in Germany are agitated over the prospect that Admiral Vondergoltz and other prominent naval officers will soon be invited to retire, leaving their places to be filled, according to the Kaiser's programme, by younger men. The officers whose probable retirement is the subject of discussion both in naval and military circles are among the most experienced in the navy.

THEIR ROYAL HUSBANDS.

LONDON, April 15.—It is said that the Kaiser meditates a remembrance to Russia on the treatment of German princesses connected with the imperial family, whose husbands, with perhaps two exceptions, are either lunatics or brutes.

PORTUGAL'S CABINET RESIGNED.

LISBON, April 15.—The entire cabinet has resigned. The king will announce his action in the matter tomorrow.

THE PRESIDENT'S TRIP.

Arrested for Grave Robbing, Inter State Commerce Law Violated, Baseball, Foreign News, Etc.

BLAINE'S LETTER TO ITALY.

WASHINGTON, April 15.—Secretary Blaine completed his reply to the last letter from the Italian government yesterday and sent a copy of it to Marquis Imperiali last night for transmission to Marquis d'Adda. Secretary Blaine in his note has not withdrawn in the least from his original attitude in declaring that the law will take its course and cannot be hurried. That indemnity probably will be granted to families of the men killed at New Orleans where it is proven that they were Italian subjects.

THE COKE REGIONS.

SCOTTSDALE, April 15.—Evictions were begun yesterday in a determined manner. The families of two men, who took an active part in the labor demonstrations, were first thrown out. The evictions were carried on at the Summit and Adelaide, and the scenes on the road are likely to be repeated all over the region. Operators assert that the strikers' ranks are breaking at many points. A crowd of infuriated foreigners attacked the houses of several men who had returned to work, smashing windows and doors. One woman was badly injured. Thirty arrests were made. Bankers here say a steady run has been going on ever since the strike began. A great many of the Hungarians are drawing out their money. They save nearly all they earn, and, going home, some had as much as \$2500, and say they will be wealthy in their own country.

SWINGING AROUND THE CIRCLE.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., April 15.—The residents turned out en masse last evening to do honor to the president.

GREENVILLE, Tenn., April 15.—The home of Andrew Johnson was especially cordial in welcome to the president, the particular feature being the display of flags. The president, addressing the people said:

"I rejoice to see in the hands of children here that the banner of our glory is a symbol of our greatness and promise of our security. I am glad that by common consent of all our people, without regard to past differences, we have once and forever struck hands upon the proposition there shall be one flag and one constitution." (Great cheering.)

At Morristown the president was again taken to the platform and responded briefly. An old grizzled veteran forced his way through the crowd and grasped the president's hand with a remark, "I am one of those people who kept you back at Chickamauga, and now the war is over I am proud to take your hand."

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. April 15.—When the Presidential train reached here this morning fully 3,000 people were assembled at the station, a salute of 13 guns was fired. The station was decorated with national colors and evergreens. The party took electric cars which were covered with flags and bunting and were soon landed at the incline at Look-out Mountain.

GRAVE ROBBERING.

WHEELING, W. Va., April 15.—Dr. Piper one of the most prominent physicians in the city and Taylor Foreman superintendent of the county poor farm, have been arrested on a warrant charging them with grave robbery. Grave robbing has been a flourishing industry in this vicinity recently and the arrest of these prominent citizens has caused a sensation.

THE INTERSTATE LAW VIOLATED.

CHICAGO, April 15.—It is reported that flagrant violations of the interstate commerce law on the part of several railroads, have come to light through information furnished by a discharged employee of the packing firm of Swift & Co. The roads supposed to be implicated are the Burlington, St. Paul, Alton, Wabash and Canadian Pacific. Officials of these roads deny that they have been guilty of any infraction of the law.

TRAFFIC ASSOCIATION.

CHICAGO, April 15.—The advisory board of the Western Traffic Association met again this morning without a quorum. Dispatches were received from Jay Gould and S. H. H. Clark of the Missouri Pacific say-

ing that they are unable to attend because of ill health. The meeting adjourned subject to call of chairman.

BOYCOTT OF THE ALTON ROAD.

NEW YORK, April 15.—The war on the Chicago & Alton by the trunk line association and the Central Traffic association began yesterday. There are 67 roads in the boycott. All Alton tickets are taken off sale on these roads. Baggage will not be checked through at all.

SPOTTED FEVER.

MESQUITE, Tex., April 15.—Spotted fever has broken out here and is spreading rapidly, with fatal results.

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EPIDEMIC DISEASES.

Precautions to Be Adopted to Prevent Their Spread.

An important memorandum on the precautions which are advisable in places attacked or threatened with epidemic disease, which has been drawn up by Dr. George Buchanan, F. R. S., has been issued to sanitary authorities by the Local Government Board. In this memorandum, says the London Times, it is stated that whenever there is prevalence or threatening of cholera, diphtheria, fever or any other epidemic disease, it is of more than common importance that the sanitary powers conferred on sanitary authorities for the protection of the public health should be well exercised by those authorities acting with the advice of their medical officers of health.

Proper precautions are equally requisite for all other epidemic diseases. But it is chiefly with regard to the poor population, there fore chiefly in the courts and alleys of towns, and at the laborers' cottages of country districts, that local authorities are called upon to exercise vigilance and to render information and advice. Common lodging-houses and houses which are sub-let in several small holdings always require particular attention.

Wherever there is accumulation, stink or leakage of house refuse or of other decaying animal or vegetable matter, the nuisance should be promptly as possible be averted, and precaution should be taken not to let it recur. Especially examination should be made as to the efficient working of sewers and drains, and any defect in them and any nuisance therefrom (from any foul ditches or ponds should be got rid of without delay. The ventilation of sewers, the ventilation and trapping of house drains and the disinfection of cesspools, overflowing sinks and pipes from drains should be carefully seen to. The scavenging of the district and the state of receptacles for excrement and of dust-bins will require close attention. In slaughterhouses, wherever animals are kept, strict cleanliness should be enforced.

In the removal of filth during periods of epidemic disease it is commonly necessary to employ chemical agents for reducing or removing the offensive and noxious matter involved in the disturbances of the filth. In the removal of privy contents these agents are more particularly wanted if the disease in question be cholera or enteric fever. The chemical agent should be used liberally over all exposed surfaces from which filth has been removed. Unpaved earth close to dwellings, if it be sodden with filth or filth, ought to be treated in the same way.

Sources of water supply should be well examined. Water from sources which can be in any way tainted by animal or vegetable refuse, especially those into which there may be any leakage or filtration from sewers, drains, cesspools, or foul ditches, ought no longer to be drunk. Above all, where the disease is cholera, diarrhea, or enteric fever, it is essential that no impure water be drunk.

Drains of leaky pipes to act as land drains and to receive soil matter or spew as land drainage through their leaks is not to be overlooked. Aerial such leaky pipes, running full of water with considerable velocity, are liable to receive, by lateral infiltration, the contents of cesspools, drains, or other sources of pollution. This latter fact is not recognized so generally as it should be, and ignorance of it has probably baffled many inquiries in cases where water services have in truth been the means of spreading disease.

If, unfortunately, the only water which for a time can be got should be open to suspicion of dangerous organic impurity, it ought, at least to be boiled before it is used for drinking, and it is better to drink water that has been boiled for a few hours after it has been boiled, filtering of the ordinary kind can not by itself be trusted to purify water. It can not be too distinctly understood that dangerous qualities of water are not obliterated by the addition of wine or spirits. When there appears any probable relation between the distribution of disease and milk supplies, the cleanliness of dairies, the purity of the water used in them, the health of the persons employed about them, and the health of the cows that furnish milk should always be carefully investigated. Even apart from any apprehension of milk being concerned in a particular outbreak of disease, it is desirable that English people should adopt the custom, which is always followed in some continental countries, of boiling all milk at once upon its reception into a house.

The washing and lime-whiting of unclean premises, especially of such as are closely occupied, should be pressed with all practicable dispatch.

Overcrowding should be prevented. Especially where disease has begun, the sick should, as far as possible, be free from persons who are not of use to the patient.

Ample ventilation should be enforced. It should be seen that the windows are made to open, and that they are sufficiently open. Especially where any kind of infectious fever has begun, it is essential, both for patients and for persons who are about them, that the sick room and the sick house be constantly traversed by streams of fresh air.

The cleanliness of domestic habits should be enforced. Refuse matters should be speedily removed or destroyed; and things which have to be disinfected or cleaned should always be disinfected or cleaned without delay.
