

THE DREI HUND.

BERLIN, May 1.—Paron Wettk, under secretary of Austrian ministry of commerce, has arrived here on a special mission for his government. His object is a unification of the German and Austrian railway systems by the enactment of common laws and adoption of common regulations. In the negotiations to be undertaken special attention will be devoted to the arrangements of military and strategic lines, with a view to the rapid mobilization of troops in both countries. Politicians see most important results if this negotiation is carried out successfully. It will bind Germany and Austria in closer union, and insure the permanence and greatly increased strength of the triple alliance.

ARRESTED FOR MURDER. AUBURN, Cal., May 1.—Henry Miller, a colored man, was arrested by Constable Dyer at Colfax, April 26, for vagrancy. While in jail he wrote to a woman in Marysville for money saying, "You know why I cannot go to Marysville." Yesterday Police Captain Lee, of Sacramento, came up and claimed Miller as one of the murderers of a deputy sheriff at Marysville last year.

TUNNEL COMMENCED. DETROIT, May 1.—The first sod of the tunnel between Detroit and Windsor was turned this morning.

THE PRESIDENT. SANTA CRUZ, May 1.—President and party arrived here at 8 o'clock this morning. They had an enthusiastic reception.

CAR SHOP STRIKE OVER. DETROIT, May 1.—The strike at the Michigan car shops is practically over. Every department is working and by Saturday full operations will be resumed.

BYRNES THEORY. NEW YORK, April 30.—Inspector Byrnes this morning made public a statement to the effect that the man known as "Frenchy" No. 1 is ascertained to have slept in the East River hotel on the night of the murder. The murdered woman, Carrie Brown, occupied room 31, while "Frenchy" slept in room 33. On the evening of the night of the murder Carrie Brown was seen to go into the hotel in company of a strange man. This man left the place before midnight. It is believed "Frenchy No. 1" then went to Carrie Brown's room, that they quarreled, and that the result of the row was the murder of the woman.

The body of Carrie Brown was shipped to her relatives this morning at Salem, Mass.

JACK THE RIPPER. NEW YORK, May 1.—Inspector Byrnes yesterday afternoon substantiated the story given out this morning as to the identity of "The Ripper" now under arrest. The inspector does not say positively that "Frenchy No. 1" is the murderer, but he gave a strong chain of circumstantial evidence that leaves no doubt but he is the man who committed the atrocious crime. He discovered he said, that Frenchy was with the woman "Shakespeare" Wednesday night, and slept with her in the East River hotel. During the following day he was in her company nearly all day. Tuesday, about midnight, "Shakespeare" left the bar-room where she and Frenchy were drinking, and a little later she was seen going upstairs with a strange man. Soon afterward Frenchy asked for a room and was assigned to one directly opposite that occupied by "Shakespeare." When Frenchy was arrested he had no underclothing on. He wore a coarse shirt, a pair of filthy socks. Blood was discovered on the shirt, and on the floor of the hallway between the rooms occupied by the Brown woman and Frenchy several spots were discovered. On the inside of the door in Frenchy's room were blood marks. The blanket in the room had a clot of blood upon it, as if a person had wiped his hands upon it. The inspector says Frenchy No. 2 was arrested early Sunday morning but it is discovered that he spent the night at a place nearly five miles distant. Late yesterday afternoon a mysterious prisoner was brought before District Attorney Nicol. Later he was removed to police headquarters. This man in all particulars answers to the description of the man who rented the room at the East river hotel with the murdered woman. It was afterwards ascertained that his name was John Franks, and that he is an Avard.

NEW ELECTORAL BILL. LANSING, Mich., May 1.—The bill providing for presidential election by congressional districts, passed both houses of the legislature; also a bill was drawn up by Democrats to divide the state into one hundred representative districts.

NEWS ABOUT MAY DAY.

All Quiet in Europe Except one Small Riot.

THE TRADES AND MINERS STRIKE.

News from all Parts About Strikes, Forest Fires in New Jersey, the Latest from India, Old Hutch is Found, Etc.

MAY DAY STRIKES. NEW YORK, May 1.—At least 4500 men, representing the different building trades of this city, are on a strike today for an eight-hour day.

JACKSONVILLE, Ohio, May 1.—Over 500 miners held a meeting this morning, and notified the bank bosses that no one excepting them would be allowed around the mines, until the question of wages was settled.

SHAWNEE, Ohio, May 1.—A message was received from Vice President Nigert this morning, instructing the miners of this district to stay out, as no settlement has been arrived at with operators. The news was received here with great surprise, as it was generally believed there would be no strike in this valley.

MINERS STRIKE. CHICAGO, May 1.—A Terre Haute special says that not less than 3,000 miners in Indiana quit work last night because the wage scale for the year beginning today has not been signed.

ANOTHER STRIKE. PITTSBURG, Pa., May 1.—The eight hour strike of the building trades was inaugurated today, and about 2,000 men are out.

AND ANOTHER STRIKE. TRIMBLE, Ohio, May 1.—All miners in Lucas district No. 9, about 11,000 men, are out today. They demand an advance in the scale of machine mining. There is division in regard to the eight hour question.

MORE STRIKERS. PITTSBURG, May 1.—This morning between 5000 and 6000 railroad miners in the Pittsburg district went out on a strike. A general review of the situation here at two o'clock this afternoon shows that carpenters, bricklayers and stonemasons to the number of 3000 are out on a strike.

A STUBBORN STRIKE. DU QUOIN, Ill., May 1.—About 1500 coal miners in this district struck this morning to enforce the law for an eight hour day and pay every Saturday. This will probably be one of the most stubbornly contested strikes ever held in this district.

RIOT IN CLEVELAND. CLEVELAND, May 1.—Today, at the lumber docks of Woods, Jenks & Co., a number of strikers attacked Ralph Gray, N. I. Fisher, Wilbur Fisher, and a non-union man, whose name is unknown. All were seriously injured. There were half a dozen policemen on the docks at the time, and when they charged the strikers, they were struck with bricks and clubs. Meanwhile a squad of seventy officers marched upon the docks, and the strikers retired.

BIG PARADE. LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 1.—Labor day drew out probably the largest parade ever seen here, today being made a general holiday.

MAY DAY REVIEW. NEW YORK, May 1.—The Associated Press dispatch from Europe shows that "May day" is passing off more quietly than was expected. In Paris and Marseilles there seems to be rioting, and in Belgium a large number of men went on a strike, but nothing serious has yet been reported. A dispatch from the districts in Eastern Pennsylvania show everything quiet and that no strikes have been inaugurated. Miners are reported to be uneasy in a few districts, but all are awaiting the outcome of the eight-hour movement in the west.

FOREST FIRES. PLEASANTVILLE, N. J., May 1.—The forest fires are assuming alarming proportions, and have not been exceeded in thirty years. Last night the sky was illuminated many miles. Yesterday morning Conover town and Port Republic were set afire from a locomotive, and a westerly gale fanned the flames so that by noon the whole forest south of Pomona was blazing and by 2 p. m. the flames had reached Conover town, and the citizens turned out to fight them. Their efforts were useless, and those living on the edge of town removed their effects to the open fields and watched their houses

burn. The greatest excitement prevailed, and for a time it was feared the town was doomed. All the wooded land in the direction of the Shore road was burned. The loss in timber alone will exceed \$1000,000. Last evening fire broke out again west of Pleasantville, and at a late hour the town was surrounded by fire.

MILLVILLE, N. J., May 1.—Hundreds of acres of wood have been destroyed by fire but most of the farm houses are saved. Last night the fire was burning furiously near Alico; hundreds of men are out fighting it, and endeavoring to save buildings in its course. Another branch is sweeping through the avenues. Residents have been fighting fire all day, and are fatigued and discouraged. This town and surrounding country are covered with a cloud of black smoke. Fire above Crew road yesterday destroyed thousands of acres of small wood and a great stretch of cedar swamp.

OLD HUTCH IS FOUND. EVANSVILLE, Ind., May 1.—B. P. Hutchinson, the missing board of trade man of Chicago, has been found here today by the police. Hutchinson is being held until word is received from Hutchinson's son in Chicago. The old man appears to be entirely unbalanced in his mind.

The remains of Von Moltke were interred at Kreuzau Wednesday with impressive ceremonies. A terrible tragedy occurred at Roanoke, Va., Friday. Nick Flood, a son of Major Flood, a prominent citizen, and Charles L. Rose, who recently went there from Washington, engaged in a duel. Rose was killed, and Flood shot in the mouth and breast, but will probably recover. The shooting was the result of a quarrel at gambling a short time ago.

WEATHER REPORT. SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—The forecast for Oregon and Washington today is light rain at Fort Canby, Olympia and Walla Walla.

FOREIGN.

ALL RIGHT IN ROME. ROME, May 1.—At 8:30 this morning all is quiet here and there is no sign that the peace of the city will be disturbed by labor riots.

ALL QUIET IN GERMANY. BERLIN, May 1.—The majority of people here are either peacefully at work this morning or preparing for a day of holiday making. There seems to be no possibility of any disturbance.

QUIET IN PARIS. PARIS, May 1.—Everything is quiet this morning and there are no outward signs that this state of affairs will be disturbed in the course of the day.

RIOT IN FLORENCE. FLORENCE, Italy, May 1.—At 4:30 this afternoon a crowd of about one thousand workmen gathered on the Piazza Savonarola. In the progress of the meeting one speaker gave a most violent incendiary address, calling upon the men present to plunder the houses of the wealthy classes. The police arrested the man who was making these remarks. Tumult followed, and the working men began to handle the policemen roughly in an attempt to rescue the prisoner. Finally two troops of cavalry charged upon the rioters and made the latter retire.

RELIGIOUS RIOT IN GREECE. ATHENS, Greece, May 1.—The Capital from Ionian Islands, brings news of a serious religious riot, which has taken place there. Today is observed by Greek Christians, as good Friday and pardonous day, and consisted of a procession. When they neared the Hebrew section, Christians besieged the section. Upon refusal of the Christians, they retired in peace. The soldiers fired upon them, killing and wounding several people. Christians are now pillaging houses of Hebrews at Senate, and threaten to burn the Jewish quarter in town.

FROM INDIA. MANIPUR, May 1.—Shortly after the British troops entered Manipur, the bodies of Chief Commissioner Quinton, Political Agent Grimwood and those other members of the commissioner's staff killed recently at the massacre were exhumed and now lie in state, pending an imposing military funeral which takes place Monday next in honor of the dead officials. A commission of army officers has been formed with the object of inquiring into the causes which led to the rebellion and into the massacre of the British officers.

THE HAWAIIAN TREATY. SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—The Examiner's Honolulu special quotes Queen Liliuokalani as stating that in the event of the rejection of the proposed new treaty between Hawaii and the United States, commerce between the two countries would greatly diminish and eventually pass out of American control. The queen intimated that Minister Car-

ter would resign his post at Washington, as his sympathy was with America and not with the islands, and he had been opposed to the new treaty.

NIGHT DRILLS. PARIS, May 1.—Newspapers of this city today announce that the French armies on the German frontier are to be exercised in night military drills. The department of Meurthe and Moselle will take up war positions along the frontier. Troops in Meurthe and Moselle will be reinforced by a large force of cavalry and infantry, brought together by an extensive mobilization of army reserves. The troops thus placed under arms will occupy all the vital positions which they would have to hold in an effort to repulse an invasion of German troops.

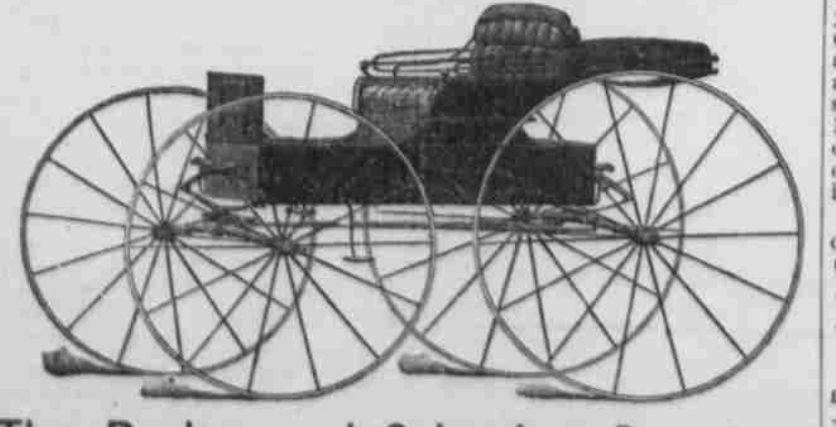
